

Baseball Men To Meet Again

Naming New Commish Not Likely, Report

NEW YORK, Aug. 20 (AP)—Election of a commissioner in the major league club owners' meeting here again tomorrow appears unlikely, say a majority of the baseball executives.

A previous meeting Aug. 7 resulted in cutting down the list of candidates to 11, including the following: Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, Gen. Douglas MacArthur, Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor, Gen. Hoyt S. Vandenberg, Ford Frick, president of the National League; and Warren Giles, president of the Cincinnati Reds.

The owners recognize that some or all of the generals may not be available. Gen. Vandenberg is reported to have notified the four-man screening already committee of his unavailability.

Still Weeding Out
Brooklyn club owner Walter O'Malley said he is practically certain a commissioner will not be chosen because "we're still in the weeding out process."

Before an effort is made to elect the game's third commissioner, the committee on contract revision, composed of Branch Rickey, William DeWitt and Giles, will turn in its report.

The committee also may recommend that the commissioner's salary be increased to \$75,000. The late Judge Landis received \$50,000, which is what was paid to Chandler until the owners decided to give him a \$15,000 increase for the final three years of his seven year term.

Betty Norton of Salem scored 29 points, good enough for top place among the ladies, while Dorcas Burnett, Salem, was second with 23.

In the pee-wee division for kids under 10 years of age, Bobbie Norton of Salem won with 110 points over a short course, while Dick Garrett of Salem was second with 94. Winners will receive trophies during an October 27 banquet.

State Fair Hoss Race Meeting to Lure Leading Thoroughbreds

When the call to the post echoes along Lone Oak Track, marking the 1951 horse race meeting starting September 1 at the State Fair, leading thoroughbreds from throughout the Northwest and California will be racing for the top money, according to Charles

He added that all 300 stalls at the state fair's barns have been spoken for.

Top handicaps include the Insular on Saturday, Sept. 1, offering \$800; the Labor Day, offering \$800; the Governor's on Wednesday, Sept. 5, with \$900 added; the Oregon State Futurity for 2-year old colts with \$800 added and with nomination and entry fees bringing the top money of \$1200 possible for the winner; and the Au Revoir on Saturday, Sept. 8 giving \$800 for the winner.
