

# Staters Stop Portlands 20-13 Yankees Slam Indians 7-3, Again Close Gap in AL Race

## Last-Quarter Score Clincher Shrine Prep Series Evened at Two Each

PORTLAND, Aug. 25 (AP)—The Up-State All-Stars, packing an appreciable weight advantage, bested the Portland All-Stars 20-13 in the fourth annual Shrine Benefit football game here tonight.

The win evened the annual series which began in 1948 at two games each.

The Portland All-Stars scored in the first quarter on a blocked punt and in the third on a 14-yard run after a pass.

State tallied twice in the second quarter and won the game on a touchdown in the opening minutes of the final period.

State was driving for a fourth touchdown in the closing seconds, but an intercepted pass ended the threat on the last play of the game.

## Casey Credits Phil Rizzuto With Yank Rise

CLEVELAND, Aug. 25 (AP)—The defending champion New York Yankees once again are breathing down the necks of the league leading Cleveland Indians, and Manager Casey Stengel gives most of the credit to "the little fella."

"The little fella," of course, is Phil Rizzuto, last year's most valuable player, and still the best shortstop in the American league, especially when the chips are down.

Glum and non-communicative for two days, Casey once more is his old talkative and wise-cracking self, all because of two straight triumphs over the Indians. Today's 7-3 win which gave them the rubber of the three-game series, boosted the Yankees to within a game of first place.

"If we should be lucky and win the pennant for the third straight time," said Stengel after the game, "you can attribute it to the fact that I finally woke up and gave the little fella a much-needed rest. He's something I should have done a long time ago. But I used bad judgment."

## Minor Status Irks Fagan, Seals on Block

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 25 (AP)—The San Francisco Seals, one of the top clubs in minor league baseball, will be put up for sale shortly. Future disposal of the valuable Pacific Coast league outfit was announced today.

From his home in Hana, Island of Maui, Hawaii, Paul I. Fagan, sole owner of the multi-million dollar plant, franchise and players, announced he was quitting baseball.

He said he was quitting because the league "would not go far better baseball in San Francisco."

Fagan, who has been one of the leaders in the battle to have the Triple A Coast loop raised to major league status, added, "Everything is first class in San Francisco except baseball. You can't operate a minor league in a great town like this."

Damon Miller, secretary of the club, said that Fagan would retain the 25,000 seating park.
