

Bevens Loses in Bid for 21st Win As Senators Split Pair with Vics

McNulty Tosses 3-Hit Victory

Loop Finale Tonight;
Series with All-Stars
Starts Here Friday

VICTORIA, Sept. 3. (Special)—Salem's Senators split a Labor Day Western International League doubleheader with Victoria's Athletics today, grabbing the seven-inning second game 6-1 behind Ray McNulty's three-hit hurling after Bill Bevens lost a heart-breaking 6-5 decision in the opener as he made his bid for his 21st pitching victory and a new team record.

12th Loss for Bill
Bevens, in taking his 12th setback against 20 wins, gave eight hits while the Salems were biffing 14 off a pair of Vic twirlers.

The Canuck crew stashed the tilt away with a deciding marker in the bottom of the eighth as Flip Jackson doubled and tallied on Bill Dunn's single. The Solons had climbed back into contention in the top of the eighth with a three-run burst, chief blow being Dick Faber's 10th homer of the season over the center field fence—a terrific clout. Doubles by Glen Stetter and Dick Bartle and a single by Jim McKeegan filled out the "rally" frame.

Big Day for Stetter
Stetter contributed three singles also for a perfect four-for-four in the opener.

But three of the six runs Bevens gave up were earned.

McNulty, gaining his 14th victory against nine losses in the finale, blanked the foe until the seventh while the Salems were belting over six runs in the initial three frames off big John Tierney. Bill Spaeter and Stetter each knocked in a pair of runs in the mix.

The Solons and Vics collide in the season's finale Tuesday night after which the Salem club returns home for a three-game set with a group of league all-stars at Waters park, starting Friday night.

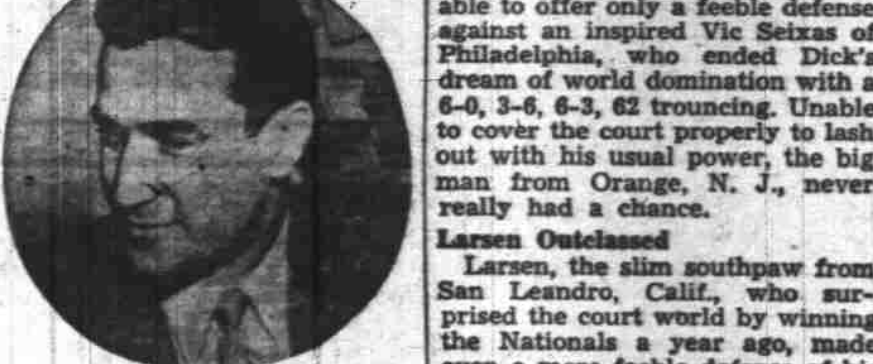

Probe Planned Into Flores Boxing Death

NEW YORK, Sept. 3.—(P)—The district attorney's office plans to have the grand jury investigate the death of boxer George Flores, it was learned today.

At the same time, the state athletic commission announced it will hold an "immediate public hearing to take testimony, receive and collect data, and sift suggestions that might help eliminate further permanent physical disabilities" to boxers.

Flores, a 20-year-old welterweight and father of a three-week-old boy, died at 12:30 a.m. (EST) today as a result of a brain injury suffered in a knockout loss to Roger Donoghue in Madison Square Garden Wednesday night.

Hogan to Act
At District Attorney Frank Hogan's office it was learned that Hogan plans to subpoena witnesses to testify before the grand jury in mid-September. In a statement, Dr. C. B. Powell, acting chairman of the state athletic commission, said that a preliminary investigation of the accident revealed that every regulation of the state athletic commission had been complied with.

It wasn't enough to help Flores, though. The stocky youngster never came to after collapsing in his dressing room following his knockout defeat. He had been unconscious for over 97 hours and had undergone two operations.

It was the first boxing death in New York since the death of Sonny Boy West from the same sort of brain injury in the St. Nicholas arena on Dec. 31 of last year.

Rich Go Won By Curandero

CHICAGO, Sept. 3.—(P)—Curandero sped to victory today in the \$150,150 Washington Park handicapped, richest mile of all time, while the chances of Calumet Farm's Bewitch and four other contenders were marred by a starting gate failure.

King Ranch's Curandero, property of Robert Kleberg of Kingsville, Tex., finished a scant nose ahead of Oil Capital. County Delight was third. The winner's time was 1:34 3/5.

The largest crowd of the Chicago racing season, 41,055, groaned when some of its favorites were caught at the start. The two starting gates failed to open simultaneously to spring the big field of 19.

Curandero, with A. Gomez of Havana, Cuba, guiding him, earned \$113,950 and paid \$8.60, \$4.80 and \$3.80 across the board.
