Justice Douglas Silent on Cry For Resignation

SEATTLE, Sept. 3—(AP)—Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas today refused to make any comment on the uproar that followed his proposal that the United States recognize Red China.

The justice, just back from an expedition along the southern frontiers of Russia and China, made the proposal in an interview at San Francisco Friday.

It touched off an angry senate debate in which Senator Connally (D-Texas) accused the justice of making "fool statements." Senator Welker (R-Idaho) charged his views might portend recognition of communist regimes in Asia and Europe. Administration spokesmen denied it.

Rep. Roy O. Woodruff (R-Mich) later urged President Truman to request Justice Douglas's resignation. He declared Douglas had given "aid and comfort to the foes of the United States and democracy."
