

Iowa Governor Pays \$13,000 In Back Taxes

DES MOINES, Sept. 12—(P)—Gov. William S. Beardsley said today he has acknowledged the federal government's claim for additional income taxes and has sent a check for \$13,000 in settlement, the Des Moines Register and Tribune company reported tonight in a copy-righted story.

The check covers \$8,000 in additional taxes due and \$5,000 in penalties and interest accrued in six years covered by a federal audit, the Register said.

The Iowa governor this afternoon dictated the following statements to two Register writers:

"Federal internal revenue agents, after an audit of my income tax returns on farm and business transactions covering six years, requested payment of additional income tax.

"Adjustments between the agents and an accountant I employed fixed the amount of additional tax due at approximately \$8,000. I have tendered to the internal revenue collector my check for \$13,000, including the additional \$5,000 tax, plus interest and penalties accrued.

"This is a purely personal matter, which involved conforming to federal farm and business accounting requirements for income tax purposes.

"Even though it is a matter of personal business, I recognize that it behooves the governor to give the people of his state an honest statement of fact concerning it."

Atom Test Site Minus Craters

LAS VEGAS, Nev., Sept. 12—(P)—Twenty newsmen toured the atomic proving grounds at Frenchman's flat near here today and not one of them could find any evidence of the series of blasts that rocked this area last January and February.

There were no craters in the ground, nor any areas of scorched earth.

This was regarded by most of the men as an indication that the explosions were set off high in the air. Officials of the atomic energy commission refused to confirm or deny this conjecture.

The tour was the first public glimpse of the proving ground.

Communists Use German Castle

BERLIN—(P)—The East German government has turned over to the Communist "Young Pioneers" a Hohenzollern castle in Dresden to be used as a recreation center.

The Hohenzollern castle, built a century ago for the brother of Kaiser Wilhelm I, has been used as a Soviet tourist hotel-restaurant since 1945.

The "Young Pioneers" are the age group from six to 14 from which East German youth graduate into the blue-shirted FDJ.

TV FINDS SUNKEN SUB

LONDON, Sept. 12—(P)—Britain revealed tonight that the sunken submarine Affray, lost for almost two months at the bottom of the English Channel, had been found by use of underwater television. The sub disappeared after it made a training dive April 16, carrying 75 men to their deaths.

PLANE OVERDUE WITH 35

ORAN, French North Africa, Sept. 12—(P)—A French DC-3 plane carrying 35 passengers from Perpignan in southern France to Oran was reported hours overdue by airfield officials tonight.

Springfield Plans To Freeze Rates Of Power Firm

SPRINGFIELD, Ore., Sept. 12—(P)—The city council has indicated it plans to freeze for five years rates of the Mountain States Power Co.

The plan was reported in a resolution addressed to Public Utilities Commissioner George Flagg which was adopted last night at a joint session with the utility board.

Mountain States was one of the northwest power firms which last week petitioned the PUC for permission to boost rates in anticipation of the necessity for using steam generators to produce more power this year.

Mountain States competes with the city in the power business.

MIT Professor Indicted on Red Charge

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Sept. 12—(P)—Prof. Dirk J. Struik, 56-year-old mathematics professor at Massachusetts Institute of Technology, today was indicted on a charge of advocating overthrow of the governments of the United States and the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

Shortly after the Middlesex county jury handed up the indictment Prof. Struik was suspended from his post at MIT.

A similar indictment was returned against Harry E. Winner, prominent Malden businessman. They were accused of conspiring with Martin H. Fletcher of Boston and Margaret Gilbert of Cambridge.

Prof. Struik could not be reached for comment.

The Holland born mathematician has denied in the past that he was a communist although describing himself as a "good Marxist."

The maximum penalty under the indictment is two and a half years in jail and a fine.

The indictments followed testimony before the grand jury yesterday by Herbert A. Philbrick, Melrose advertising man who joined the communist party as an undercover agent.

Compton May Head 'Voice'

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12—(P)—The state department said tonight it is discussing with Dr. William Compton, retiring head of Washington State college, an important position in the international information operations of the department.

SPOKANE, Sept. 12—(P)—Dr. Wilson Compton, retiring president of Washington State college, will be named to head the Voice of America, the Spokesman-Review said tonight, quoting an unnamed Washington source.

Failure to Show Papers Results In Jail Term

PORTLAND, Sept. 11—(P)—Circuit Judge McCormack Snow today sentenced E. R. Errion to 10 days in jail for contempt of court after he failed to produce certain documents in an accounting suit.

Errion, for several years, managed the Pendleton property of Mrs. P. R. Plamondon, Salem.

When the case went to court July 2, Circuit Judge James W. Crawford ordered Errion to give Mrs. Plamondon's attorneys contracts, checks and other papers. Later Errion was ordered to show cause why he should not be held in contempt, and when he failed to produce the papers, Judge Snow sentenced him to jail.

Errion said "he documents are not now in his possession. He claims he advanced to Mrs. Plamondon more money than she claims he owes her. Trial has been set for October 15.

Copter, Dynamite Combine in Effort To Save Salmon

VANCOUVER, B.C., Sept. 12—(P)—A dynamite-loaded helicopter, carrying fisheries experts, will leave here shortly for the Skeena river now blocked by a rock slide.

Thousands of salmon have died in attempting to make their way up the river to spawning beds, and other thousands, bruised and bleeding, have ended back to die in waters below the slide.

The slide is in inaccessible territory north of Hazelton in northern British Columbia.

Fisheries authorities estimate the slide disaster will cost the B. C. salmon industry more than \$2,000,000, but the full effect will not be felt until 1955 when the spawn of this year's run start to return from the sea.

Crime Doesn't Pay—Very Much

DOVER, N. H., Sept. 12—(P)—Burglars who visited the Fritchard Grain company Monday night did it the hard way.

First, they had to climb to the top of a freight car, then jump across to a loading platform roof, scale a barbed wire fence, force a window, and finally break open a metal drawer.

The crime didn't pay off very well—a dollar in change.

MANHATTAN, Kan., Sept. 12—(P)—Five football players ousted from the U. S. military academy, began enrolling today at Kansas State college. The former West Pointers, all linemen, are: Ray Malvasi, 190-pound guard; Bob Volonking, 205-pound guard; Jack McShulski, 210-pound end; Jerry Hart, 215-pound tackle; Ed Stahura, 195-pound guard.

5 Boys Missing At Training School

State police early today were searching for five boys who escaped from the state boys' school at Woodburn Wednesday.

Two of the boys walked off the grounds at about 6:30 a. m. Wednesday. They are Donald Lee Mulberry and Nelson, both 16.

Three boys left the school at about 9 p. m. Wednesday. They are Richard Wolfgram, 15, Jack Trullinger and Leo L. Arns, both 16. All the youths are from Portland.

Start Made on New Biblical Encyclopedia

NEW YORK, Sept. 12—(P)—Religious scholars tonight unveiled the first of a 12 volume series cataloging all that mankind has learned about the Bible from ancient times to the present.

It's called "The Interpreter's Bible."

Top theologians from various Protestant denominations in this country and abroad have been at work on the project for seven years. About \$1,900,000 has been invested in research and assembling material.

"Unquestionably this is the most important publication in the religious field for over half a century," said Dr. Halford Loomch, a leading biblical expert, of Yale divinity school.

The initial volume of the 8,000,000-word work was presented tonight to some 200 religious leaders and educators at a dinner addressed by Bishop Henry Knox Sherrill, president of the National Council of Churches of Christ in the U. S. A.

Almost in encyclopedic fashion, the new work presents each verse of the Bible, along with all data concerning the verse that has been dug up through archeological excavations, new-found manuscripts and historical and geographical research.

Questions like these are answered: Who wrote this book of the Bible? When was it written? Where? Under what conditions and in the midst of what events?

Dr. George A. Buttrick, pastor of New York City's Madison Avenue Presbyterian church who had headed a staff of 146 biblical scholars and preachers in preparing the material, said:

"It is the publication which has been most needed by the Christian church for the last 100 years."

IRAN LAUNCHES ULTIMATUM

TEHRAN, Iran, Sept. 12—(P)—Premier Mohammed Mossadeq today started his ultimatum to Britain, via Washington. He says Britain must resume talks within two weeks or face expulsion of the 350 British refinery technicians remaining in Iran.
