Fifty Turner School Students Recover from Food Poisoning

TURNER, Sept. 20—Laboratory tests are underway to determine the cause of food poisoning that struck about 50 pupils who eat at the Turner elementary school cafeteria, School Principal Richard Gwillim reported today.

The students, approximately one-third of those who ate in the cafeteria, became ill near the close of school Friday, according to Gwillim. He said five were treated by doctors.

Mrs. Leha Johnson, first-grade teacher, and her son Dustin, were hospitalized briefly.

The noon menu at the cafeteria that preceded the wholesale illness included mashed potatoes, hamburger, gravy, butterscotch pudding, milk and vegetable salad, Gwillim said.

Samples of all foods, as well as ingredients used in preparing the meal have been turned over to Dr. Willard Stone, Marion county health officer, who in turn has dispatched them to laboratory.

Gwillim said it may be several weeks before a report is received. The principal said he suspected many of those who became ill were "sympathy cases," stricken after noting the distress of others. He said many persons who ate the food, including himself, did not become sick.
