Historic Elm Saved in Oil

NEW CASTLE, Pa. (AP)—One section of the American elm tree under which George Washington stood to take command of the Continental Army is now preserved in linseed oil.

It is owned by Charles N. Giddings, of New Castle, Pa., a forester for the Pennsylvania Power Co.

After the Revolutionary War, the elm was encircled by cement pavement and an iron fence as a national shrine. In 1924, the tree had decayed to such an extent that it was decided to fell it for safety reasons. Giddings, then a forester in Boston, was one of the men hired for the job. He salvaged a part of the tree and has kept it ever since—in linseed oil.

PENANG, Malaya (AP)—The last batches of Japanese war criminals in the Federation of Malaya have been sent to prisons on Singapore island for eventual transfer to Japan. All are to continue serving their long prison sentence in Japan.

The number going to Japan from Malaya and Singapore totals about 120. Prisoners taken to Singapore from Malaya included Japanese Captain Terate Isamu, who was head of police in Penang during the Japanese occupation. He was sentenced to life imprisonment by a British War Crimes court.
