DALLAS, Sept. 20 (Special)—The Dallas high Dragons, champions of the Willamette Valley league last season, open defense of their crown here Friday night with the team they beat out for the 1950 title, Woodburn's Bulldogs. Game time is 8 p.m. To make the clash even more interesting, Coach Ken Jacobson's Dragons and Chuck Sheron's Bulldogs were the only teams able to score in the WVJ jamboree at Estacada Tuesday. Both teams scored two touchdowns.

CANBY, Sept. 20 (Special)—The Canby Cougars, sailing under the direction of new Coach Hank Ercolini, open their Willamette Valley league season here Friday night with Muri Anderson's Silverton Silver Foxes. Game time will be at eight o'clock and the outcome looks a tossup.

SANDY, Sept. 20 (Special)—The Sandy Pioneers start their Willamette Valley league football season Friday night here with the Mt. Angel Preps. Neither Coach Buck Woodward's Pioneers or Gene Barrett's Preps were able to score in the league jamboree Tuesday, but prospects point to an interesting opener.

Valley Sports Promoter Mike Carty yesterday announced the cars and drivers lineup for the 1951 midget championship auto racing card at Salem's Hollywood bowl, and included are not only the roaring runt hotshots of Oregon but those from the Seattle-Tacoma area as well.

Twenty-four cars, with possibly two or three more, will roll in the dual helmet dashes, the four heat races, the 20-lap Class B mainer and the 75-lap Class A grande finale, the latter the longest race of the speed season here.

Leading the Oregon pack are Bullet Bob Gregg, Gordy Livingston, Lou Sherman, Gordy Youngstrom, Frankie McGowan, Bob Christie, Don Olds and Wild Bill Hyde. From Washington will come the six fastest cars in that area, same to be piloted by Shorty Templeman, Wade Althuser, Jack Turner, P. E. Peterson, Cliff Spaulding and Mel Magaughy.

Offys vs Fords
The eternal Offenhausers vs. Fords midget auto racing argument will be in full bloom Saturday also, as about half of the field will be the swift Offys. Carty has installed two trophy dashes—one for Fords and the other for Offys.

Time trials will start at 7:30 p.m. half an hour earlier than usual. A large gold trophy, emblematic of the 1951 championship, will go to the gent winning the marathon 75-lapper.

Willamette university's 33-man football squad will depart for Spokane via bus at eight o'clock this morning, headed for the 1951 season opener Saturday afternoon with Whitworth college. A total of 20 freshmen will be included in the traveling squad named by Coach Chester Stackhouse earlier in the week.

"If the Cats arrive in the Inland Empire city in time tonight they will hold a light drill in the Spokane stadium."

Stackhouse's tentative starting lineup, offensively, lists Freshmen Tom Collier and Elmer Haugen at ends, Veterans Dorrance Noteboom and Don Hoofard at tackles, Freshman Bill Cody and Letterman Ken Cooper at guards, Veteran John Markoskie at center and Bob Walker, Bob Hall, Rick Bingham and Bob Shangle in the backfield. Walker is a freshman.

Equipped with numerous veterans, Whitworth will be the Saturday favorite.

'Poor to Fair' Fishing Outlook Forecast for Weekend

PORTLAND, Sept. 20 (AP)—The state game commission's weekly fishing report:

Northwest: Fishing in the Willamette area and lower Columbia for crappie and catfish continues to be good. The McKenna river is still producing some good catches in the upper section. Tributaries are very low and fishing is poor. Dorena reservoir is fair. Trout angling at the north side and fair to good in the upper tide with more salmon being taken. Jetty fishing is poor to fair.

Southwest: Salmon fishing at the mouth of the Rogue is fair. Steelhead fishing in the lower

Rogue is fair to good. Poor catches of rainbow and cutthroat are reported in the coastal trout streams. In the upper and middle sections of the Rogue river trout fishing continues good. Steelhead fishing is poor to fair in the Grants Pass to Galice area, with catches made mostly on flies. Salmon fishing at Winchester bay is poor; steelhead angling continues good at Winchester and fair at Steamboat. Trout angling is fair in the Upper Emquas.

Central: Angling in the central region is reported to be very good in most lakes and streams. Three creeks lake is very good but you will need your own boat as the concessions have been

closed as of September 17. Big Lava lake is also reported good. Crane Prairie reservoir is producing limit catches. East lake is very good on fly fishing and also on troll. Steelhead fishing on the Lower Deschutes is reported to be excellent.

Southeast: Lower Emigrant creek is yielding excellent catches of 10 to 15 inch rainbow. Upper Silver creek is good. DeWintment lake is very good on bait. Deer creek is producing limits of 8 to 10 inch rainbow. In the Steens mountain area, Fish lake, Indian creek, and Upper Billman river are very good. Malheur county angling has been fair to good. In Lake county fish-

ing continues fair with some large fish being taken from Cottonwood reservoir.

Northeast: Early September high lake fishing in the Wallows has been good. Limit catches of eastern brook are reported from Horrocks, Anecord, Green, and Steamboat lakes. Large rainbow have been taken recently on the Lower Imnaha and Wallowa rivers. Eagle creek has produced excellent catches of rainbow. Magone lake continues to be good on troll. Strawberry lake has been fair. Limit catches of rainbow are being made on the south fork of the John Day river.

Idaho opens up against Wyoming. The Cowboys, while beaten by Florida last week, have at least had a game and figure to make it two in a row over Idaho. Of the independents Loyola faces a rough time in Pasadena's Rose Bowl against the San Diego navy training center, with its collection of professionals and college-age players. College of Pacific gets a fierce baptism from Hardin-Simmons, and San Jose State and San Francisco university offer a close affair in the Bay region.

Brooklyn has 10 to play, the Giants only seven. They do not meet.

Gil Hodges' 39th homer in the sixth helped the Dodgers home but they needed a run in the ninth to offset a Card rally that produced a score in the last of the ninth. Cliff Chambers' six-game win streak was broken as Brooklyn made it 18 out of 22 from the Red

Birds this season. Cincinnati bunched four of its 12 hits in the eighth inning with an error and a pair of walks to chase Jim Hearn with a three-run blast. Kenny Raffensberger, with ninth inning help from Sewell Blackwell, registered his 15th win. It was the Reds' fifth victory in 22 starts against the Giants.

In the only night game, the St. Louis Browns shaded Washington, 4-3, as Satchel Paige struck out five men in a three-inning relief chore. Cliff Mages' first-inning homer and three singles led the 13-hit attack on Don Johnson and Tom Ferrick. Sherm Lollar drove home the tie-breaking run in the eighth with a single scoring Earl Rapp who doubled.
