With one round on the books in Willamette Valley league football play, all eyes are again focused on Ken Jacobsen's Dallas Dragons as the heirs apparent to the 1951 championship. Dallas won the toga last season and looked nothing short of championship caliber again Friday night as they rolled to a 33-14 victory over Woodburn.

Mt. Angel, Molalla and Canby came through with opening wins over Sunday, Estacada and Silverton, respectively, but failed to show the all-around power and speed possessed by the Dragons.

With veteran backs George Curtis, Lyn Luthe, Bruce Sjolund, Lamar Tilgner and Larry Cook running wild, the Bulldogs proved no match for the hustling Dragons.

Angels showed much improvement over their earlier showings by blanketing what was considered a strong Sandy outfit, and Hank Ercolini's Canby Cougars, after being stormed by Lake Oswego a week previous did a fine piece of bouncing back to upset Muri Anderson's Silvertons 20-12. The Molalla Indians, darkhorse threats under new coach Marv Hiebert looked impressive in subduing Don Bryant's Estacadas 23-8.

Games the coming Friday night find Sandy at Estacada, Molalla at Mt. Angel, Canby at Woodburn (afternoon) and Dallas at Silverton, the latter being the feature of the week in the circuit. Dallas' Curtis took a big lead in the individual scoring parade with his three touchdowns against Woodburn.

Woodburn hopes were given a sharp rise over the weekend when X-rays revealed no fracture in Halfback Len (Swede) Pavlicek's leg, injured in the Dallas game. It was at first believed that the big back, one of the finest in the league, suffered a broken leg early in the second half. Diagnosis proved only a bad bruise, however, and Pavlicek may see some action for the Bulldogs this week.

Cardinals Eye 3rd Straight Grid Victory

Sacred Heart Academy's Cardinals, undefeated, untied and unscored upon after two games, look for a third straight football victory this week in a game with the St. Francis (Eugene) eleven. It will be Sacred Heart's first home game of the season after having tangled with Mt. Angel and Jefferson in road excursions.

Just where and when the clash will be played was still up in the air Monday. Sacred Heart had hoped to play Friday night in Waters field, but the Salem Vikings have their game with Albany slated for the ball park that night. Consequently the Cards may play Saturday night, or even next Sunday.

Father John O'Callaghan, SHA athletic director, expects to have site and time of the game straightened out sometime today. Coach Leo Grosjacques' Cards have turned in victories of 14-0 over Mt. Angel and 13-0 over Jefferson on successive weekends.
