Mrs. Addison, Pioneer Scion Dies in Salem

Mrs. Effie Addison, 87, daughter of Oregon pioneers and long-time resident of Salem, died in Salem Friday morning.

Death came at a local nursing home. Mrs. Addison, who resided at 869 N. Church st., had been ill for the past three years.

The deceased was born at Ashland on April 25, 1864, of parents who had crossed the plains in covered wagons. She grew up at Ashland and married William A. Addison there in 1882.

The family moved in 1908 to the Independence area, where the Addisons farmed until 1928. That year Mr. and Mrs. Addison moved to Salem where Mr. Addison died two years later.

Mrs. Addison was a member of the First Methodist church in Salem.

Survivors include two daughters, Mrs. Mildred Brant of Independence and Mrs. Anna Deahl of Portland; sons, Roy W. of Los Angeles, Calif., Elmer E. of Independence, Frank G. of Roseburg, and Carroll F. Addison of Salem, and by nine grandchildren and 14 great-grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held Monday at 1:30 p. m. at the Clough-Barrick chapel with Dr. Seth Huntington officiating. Concluding services will be at Mt. Crest Abbey mausoleum.

Salem Flyer Adds 100th Korea Mission

Lt. Col. Stephen A. Stone, 34, Salem man, completed his 100th combat mission in the Korean conflict while piloting RF-51 aircraft for the fifth air force's 67th tactical reconnaissance wing.

Col. Stone is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Stephen A. Stone, 373 Leslie st. His job is aerial reconnaissance of communist fortifications and Col. Stone observes and photographs enemy strategy. Evaluation of these photos and reports is used to plan fighter and light bomber attacks north of the 38th parallel.

During World War II Col. Stone served with the air force in North Africa, Italy and the Aleutians. In that conflict he tallied 37 combat missions. When not participating in aerial missions, Col. Stone commands his RF-51 squadron, a flying member of the 67th wing.

Disgruntled Buyers Sue Realty Firm

Suit for \$7,800 damages, involved in a real estate transaction with allegedly fraudulent misrepresentation of facts, was filed Friday in Marion county circuit court.

The complaint was made by Clarence W. and Grace E. Smith, who purchased the Terminal Auto court in Jefferson, and is directed against G. E. and Anna Zirk and E. M. Hunter, doing business as Salem Realty company.

It alleges that misrepresentations were made by defendants in the transaction, involving the property's plumbing facilities and its financial returns.

The Smiths ask that the contract be rescinded and that they recover \$5,300 which they allegedly put into the court in repairs and \$2,500 exemplary damages.

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Pearson Plans Plea for Bonus Bond Bidders

(Story also on page 1) Assurance of funds for processing Oregon veteran bonus applications, but not for paying the bonus, was given Friday by the state bond commission.

The members, some of whom previously had indicated they would urge state purchase of the \$40,000,000 in bonds to pay veterans, modified their stand with a vote to "explore" the entire project of providing funds.

State Treasurer Walter J. Pearson, a member along with Gov. Douglas McKay and L. O. Arens, is to represent the group in conferences with Defense Mobilizer Charles E. Wilson and Secretary of the Treasury John Snyder in an effort to gain permission to sell the bonds to private investors. Pearson is to leave today for Washington, D. C.

Wilson had ruled Thursday that such a sale would add to the country's inflationary tendency. He had conferred last week with the governor.

Wilson's action was criticized yesterday by the commission. Arens called it a federal invasion of state's rights.

Deputy State Treasurer Fred Paulus told bond commission members that government bonds are selling below par and that the state would suffer a loss of \$400,000 by selling \$20,000,000 of these bonds, now held by the state industrial accident commission, which had been suggested as a source of funds for state purchase.

"We just couldn't justify selling government bonds at such a loss," Gov. McKay said.

Three methods were suggested to provide the \$500,000 previously estimated for administrative costs of the bonus division. One involves borrowing the money from the state's general fund and another borrowing money from the sinking fund set up by the legislature to pay interest and principal on the bonus bonds. If money was not available from these two sources then not to exceed \$500,000 of bonds could be sold to some state agency.

William F. Gaarenstroom, veterans department director, told the bond commission that not more than \$375,000 would be required for administrative costs during the two-year period but a continuance of the activities would necessitate additional money. He said some of the funds are essential by November 1.

Pearson suggested that Paulus investigate and determine from various state agencies having surplus trust funds how much money they could invest in bonus bonds and what rate of interest they would demand.

State Rep. J. O. Johnson, Washington county, appearing before the commission in behalf of the American Legion, urged the commission to take definite action toward disposing of the \$40,000,000 of bonus bonds.

Driver Held After Running Into Smashup

James Morton Irwin, resident of a Portland road motel, was held in Salem city jail in lieu of \$100 bail Friday on a reckless driving charge following an early morning collision at Lana avenue and Portland road, city police said.

City police said an auto driven by Irwin collided with an auto involved in a previous accident and careened into the front end of a truck stopped at the scene. He first drove past two flares and narrowly missed a policeman flagging traffic at the scene, police said.

The auto previously involved in an accident was owned by Joseph M. Devers, Stayton, police said. The truck was driven by Richard Clive Bigelow, Portland.

Brooking Population Established at 1,525

The population of the city of Brooking Friday was announced as 1,525 by Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry, following completion of a recent state census.

Brookings was incorporated July 10, 1951, and, on the basis of the census count, will participate in state liquor and highway revenues, Newberry said.

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
