Just Like Mother Made

Orange Cake, Long a Favorite Makes Hit with Judges; Men Like Puffy Pie

Here's another in a series of stories about recipes found in our mother's recipe file. Here, for instance, is one we've had in the family for ages, and which wen a huge prize in a national contest last winter as something "new." It's called cake, but really more of a pudding.

GERMAN ORANGE CAKE

1 cup sugar

1/2 cup fat

teaspoon soda 1 cup sour milk 21/2 cups flour I cup ground raising

Grated rind grange and lemon Mix orange, lemon and sugar for topping, and set aside. Mix and bake cake in a sheet pan.

While still hot, pour first mixture over the cake and let cool.

Serve with whipped cream.

And while we are on the subject of oranges let's look at this sauce to serve over sauteed bananas or French toast: ORANGE SAUCE

½ cup sugar 2 tablespoons flour ½ teaspoon salt

1/2 cup orange juice

1 cup sugar

2 tablespoons lemon juice 2 tablespoons orange rind 1 tablespoon butter

1 tablespoon lemon rind,

Juice of 1/2 lemon

Mix sugar, flour and salt and add remaining ingredients. Boil 3to 4 minutes and serve hot. From a magazine page titled "Pies Men Like" we find, among other less unusual ones, this which is handy because you make it the day before it's to be eaten. More lemon, too. REAVENLY PIE

11/2 cups sugar 1/4 teasp, cream of tartar 4 eggs, separated

% teaspoon salt 1 pint heavy cream, whipped 3 tablespoons lemon juice Sift one cup of the sugar with cream of tartar. Beat whites stiff but not dry, gradually add sugar and cream of tartar mix-ture. Beat until thoroughly blended. Now, line bottom and sides of a well greased 9 or 10 inch pie tin, hollowing out most of center, and being careful not to put meringue too close to rim. Bake at 275 for 1 hour. Cool, beat yolks slightly, then fold in remaining sugar, lemon and salt. Cook in top of double boiler over water until thick and lemon colored, about 8 or 10 minutes. Remove, cool, and combine with half of cream. Fill meringue shell with this. Cover with remaining whipped cream. Chill in refrigerator for 24 hours be-

fore served. Lemon dumplings are another dessert: LEMON DUMPLINGS.

Put % cup sugar in the bottom of a baking pan. Add juice and grated rind of one lemon. Dot with butter and sprinkle some flour over generously. Place 8 or 10 rich baking powder biscuits on this and gently pour boiling water between biscuits until they swim. This makes the sauce. Bake in hot oven.
