

Colleges Lax

Judge's Accusations Denied by Schools

NEW YORK, Nov. 20-(AP)—The judge who handed out jail sentences in the basketball bribery scandal told the nation's colleges today it was their task—not the district attorney's—to keep their athletes clean.

Judge Saul S. Streit followed up his sentencing of a fixer and former player by declaring: "Unless the colleges take heed, all the efforts of the district attorneys, the state and the entire exposure will serve no purpose whatsoever."

Schools Make Denial
The tall, 53-year-old bachelor jurist commented to newsmen in his chambers in the face of disclaimers from officials of some of the colleges he named yesterday as over-emphasizing commercialism or winking at athletes' scholastic abilities.

"The condition exists," Streit said, "and denials, reports and surveys will serve no purpose unless the college administrations change their present methods."

He scarcely had spoken before the College of the City of New York announced it was adopting a rigid new policy that automatically would eliminate GCNY "as an athletic power in the future."

Streit yesterday named Maryland, Oklahoma, Texas, Texas A & M, Southern Methodist, Pennsylvania, Tennessee and Kentucky as examples of schools over-emphasizing football—and drew quick reaction concerning some.

Maryland Probe Due
In Maryland, Gov. Theodore McKeldin asked for an investigation of aid to athletes at the University of Maryland.

In Knoxville, Coach Bob Neyland said Streit's remark that academic standards of athletes are a laugh "does not apply at Tennessee." Neyland said the scholastic average of the Tennessee football squad in 1950-51 "was 20 per cent above the average of all male students for the year."

Veterans Shy On OCE Quint

OREGON COLLEGE OF EDUCATION, Nov. 20-(Special)—With but three veterans "in which to build his squad around, new OCE Basketball Coach Bob Livingston is daily sending his Wolves squad through pre-season workouts.

The three lettermen are Forward Howie Sullivan at 6-2, Forward Hal Pitcher at 6-0 and Guard Bob Bushnell at 5-8. Other top prospects include 6-3 Frank Rosenstock, 6-0 Jack McRae, 5-10 Roger Dauch and 5-11 Chuck Pinion. Livingston will be using numerous inexperienced freshmen the coming season also.

OCE opens play with Linfield at McMinnville December 1. Linfield also opens the local schedule December 7. Southern Oregon will play here December 14-15, and then the wolves go idle until after the first of the year.

Tulsa Eleven Continues To Head Offense List

NEW YORK, Nov. 20-(AP)—The Tulsa Golden Hurricane, with three games remaining, can become the only team except Notre Dame to repeat as the major college football offensive leader of the year.

For the second straight week figures of the NCAA service bureau showed the Hurricane tops in total offense, with a 482.3 yards-per-game average. Tulsa also leads in rushing attack with an average of 359.1 in eight games.

The passing offense leader is Loyola of Los Angeles. Loyola has averaged 210.5 yards by passing in eight games.

Princeton is in a position to set a new record for passing accuracy, breaking the 1945 Alabama mark of 60.7 per cent on 71 out of 117. Princeton now boasts a 62.2 per cent average, with 79 completed of 127 thrown, almost all by Dick Kazmaier.

The University of Washington is in fourth place in forward passing offense with an average of 173.8 yards in nine games. Oregon is ninth with an average of 163.8 for nine games.

SEATTLE, Nov. 20-(AP)—The University of Washington football squad went back to early-season fundamentals today in preparation for Saturday's traditional tilt with the Washington State Cougars.

NORTH MARION HIGH SCHOOL, Nov. 20-(Special)—Faced with what looms as the impossible—beating the Astoria football juggernaut—the North Marion Huskies are nonetheless going at their daily practice drills with much gusto while looking forward to the state football playoff clash with the Fishermen at Astoria Friday night.

Coach Hal Ellmers and Principal Pat Beal of the Huskies scouted Astoria in the latter's game with Hillsboro last week and saw the power and smoothness of the Fishermen in their 32-7 conquest.

North Marion advanced in the playoffs by out-firsting Canby after playing the Cougars to a 14-14 tie.
