

Feds Stymied On TV Matter

'Cast Restrictions Held Illegal Though

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23 (AP)—The justice department made it clear tonight that it regards restrictions of big time college football games illegal, but that it cannot do anything about it immediately.

The department made public a telegram to Governor Lawrence W. Wetherby of Kentucky. The governor had asked that Attorney General McGrath move against the National Collegiate Athletic association for refusing to permit the televising of tomorrow's Tennessee-Kentucky game at Lexington.

The department's wire, signed by Newell A. Clapp, acting chief of the anti-trust division, asked that the governor take note of the anti-trust suit filed in Philadelphia on October 9 against the Professional National Football league and its member clubs for similar broadcasting restrictions.

Action Hinges on Suit

Clapp said it was hoped that such case will establish the applicability of the anti-trust laws to such situations and clearly indicated, in talking to reporters, that action will be taken against collegiate groups if the department can win the Philadelphia suit.

Victor Kramer, who directs anti-trust litigation, told newsmen that when department officials held conferences with N.C.A.A. officials several weeks ago, they gave it as their opinion that the ban on telecasts "is unlawful." He said this was not an official ruling, but represents the views held by the anti-trust experts.

N.C.A.A. instituted an experimental program this fall of limiting the number of telecast games in an effort to check on TV's effect on the games generally.

Pacific, Cal Aggie 11s Collide In Pear Bowler

MEDFORD, Nov. 23 (Special)—The sixth annual Pear Bowl football classic, an annual benefit game involving the champions of the Northwest and Far West conferences, will get under way in Medford high stadium Saturday night at eight o'clock. Marching units and bands will start a 30-minute performance of pageantry at 7:30 p.m.

The annual game, played for the benefit of the Shrine Hospital for Crippled Children in Portland, will see Pacific University of Forest Grove opposing the California Aggies of Davis. Dr. Paul Stagg's Badgers are co-champions of the Northwest conference with Lewis & Clark, and the Aggies swept through the Far West conference in easy fashion.

Lewis & Clark defeated San Francisco State in last year's game and in 1949 Pacific thumped the Aggies 33-13. According to dopers, the Saturday clash looms as a tossup, however.

A crowd of around 5000 is expected for the struggle which is under the sponsorship of Hillah Temple of the Shrine. This will be the first year the game has been played at night. In the past the Pear Bowl clash has been a Thanksgiving Day feature.

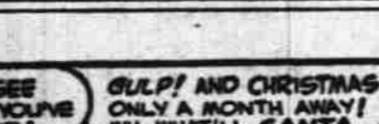
