

Wildcats Back

versity of Kentucky's basketball team received a welcome Christmas present today when it was chosen the No. 1 college quintet in the country in the weekly Associated Press poll.

The selection of the powerful Wildcats hardly came as a surprise. Beaten only by Minnesota in an upset, the perennial Southeastern conference champions' return to the top rung practically was assured when they came through with a smashing 98-60 triumph over DePaul after crushing St. John's, 81-40.

Exactly 106 sports writers and sportscasters from all parts of the nation participated in the poll and 41 of them named Kentucky as their top team. St. John's, on top a week ago with 36 first place nominations, received none this time and skittered all the way down to seventh. Only a rebounding 69-54 win over previously uncounquered Vanderbilt prevented the Redmen from dropping out of the top ten altogether. **Big Edge for 'Cats**
