'Kid' May Continue Fighting Heavies

SEATTLE (AP)-Harry Kid Matthews' manager anounced Thurs-day night his rejection of the International Boxing Club offer for a light-heavyweight title fight Feb. 22 with Joey Maxim.

Manager Jack Hurley said he sent this wire to Matchmaker Al Weill in New York:

"Date, terms and other dictates connected with Maxim offer rejected. Matthews will continue his independent campaign, your ultimatum notwithstanding.

Weill's "ultimatum" had been for Hurley to sign for the match by the end of this week or lose the chance. Hurley refused to elaborate on his reply to Weill. Hurley, a canny man in the fight

business, would not say whether his objection was to the terms or the tone of the IBC proposition or whether he preferred to keep Matthews hammering at the heavyweights. He has been reaching up into the heavy class for some of his recent victories.

Hurley, in refusing yesterday to comment on the Weill offer, had said: "I'm working on a deal or two right now, and as soon as something jells I'll have an announcement to make."
