Buying for Your Home

Work Savers are Space Savers; Handy Type Appliances Convenient

 If you are pressed for space in kitchen, the small handy type appliances are very convenient. A number of them are made by a company that specializes in precision motors.

The portable electric mixer, when it is not in use, can be hung on the wall in a bracket that comes with the appliance. There are no extra bowls to wash and you can carry it to the stove for mixing hot dishes such as gravies, puddings or icings. For a one-egg or any other operation that is best done in a small glass or mixing cup, you just remove one of the two beaters since both are detachable for washing.

A double action electric knife sharpener is another small appliance that takes up little space. The sharpener hollow grinds the knife, does a special job on knife tips and sharpens both sides of the blade at the same time. Whether you are right or left handed, you can use this sharpener. Safety factors include low speed grinding and a plastic housing that fits close enough to the grinding wheel so there is no danger of catching the fingers in the mechanism.

Not strictly a kitchen appliance, but a good gadget to have in your home, is the electric hair dryer. It tilts to any angle and has a shock-proof combination handle and stand. It is not only a convenience for the woman of the house, but also for her children's shampoos in cold weather. For those who like home massages of the Swedish type, a junior hand model reproduces the rotating patting movements.

Just About Any Shape

Dumplings May Mean Top Stews or Rich Dessert

To some, the word "dumplings" means a fruity dessert that mother used to serve, others think of browned stew or stewed chicken topped with fluffy white balls of froth. Dumplings do come in a variety of sizes, shapes and for many purposes.

Some dumplings are plain, and the bland taste compliments stronger flavors of the meat or fruit. The addition of an herb, spice, nuts or a sweet lends personality to the dumplings.

Let's look at some.

The basic dumpling recipe goes thus:

BAKING POWDER DUMPLINGS
 2 cups flour ½ teaspoon salt
 4 teaspoons baking powder ¼ cup milk
 Mix dry ingredients, add liquid gradually, pan on a floured board into shape, put close together into kettle of stew or other food.

By adding a bit more liquid, the dumplings may be dropped by spoonful into gravy and steam for 12 minutes, without lifting the lid.

The next time you are making dumplings for meat, try adding some herbs—rosemary, thyme.

A tomato dumpling recipe was designed for serving with stew:

TOMATO DUMPLINGS
 1½ cups sifted flour 1 egg slightly beaten
 1 tablespoon baking powder 1 tsp. drippings or butter
 1 teaspoon salt ½ cup tomato juice
 Sift flour, baking powder and salt together. Combine egg, melted shortening and tomato juice. Combine liquid and dry ingredients stirring only enough to blend. Drop by spoonful on boiling stew. Cover tightly and steam for 12 minutes. Serves 4 to 6.

The Dutch make their dumplings with bread and call them:

BROOD KHUTIES
 3 thick slices bread 1 teaspoon chopped parsley
 1 pint broth ¼ teaspoon nutmeg
 1 tablespoon butter Salt and pepper to taste
 2 or 3 eggs Flour

Soak bread in broth, squeeze dry and beat out lumps with a fork. Heat butter, put in bread, mix well over fire and season. When cool, stir in eggs, add parsley and nutmeg. Mix and form into balls. Roll lightly in flour, boil in broth or stock for 2 minutes. Serve at once.

Then if you want a dessert dumpling, try this sweet one:

FILBERT DUMPLINGS, CARAMEL SAUCE
 Sauce
 1½ cups sugar Pinch salt
 2 tablespoons butter 2 cups hot water
 Lightly brown ½ cup of the sugar in a large skillet. Add butter, salt and then the 1 cup sugar. Gradually add the hot water stirring until browned sugar dissolves. Cover and turn down heat, simmer for 10 minutes.

Dumplings
 1½ cups sifted flour 3 tablespoons butter
 2½ teaspoons baking powder ½ cup chopped filberts
 3 tablespoons sugar ½ cup milk
 ¼ teaspoon salt

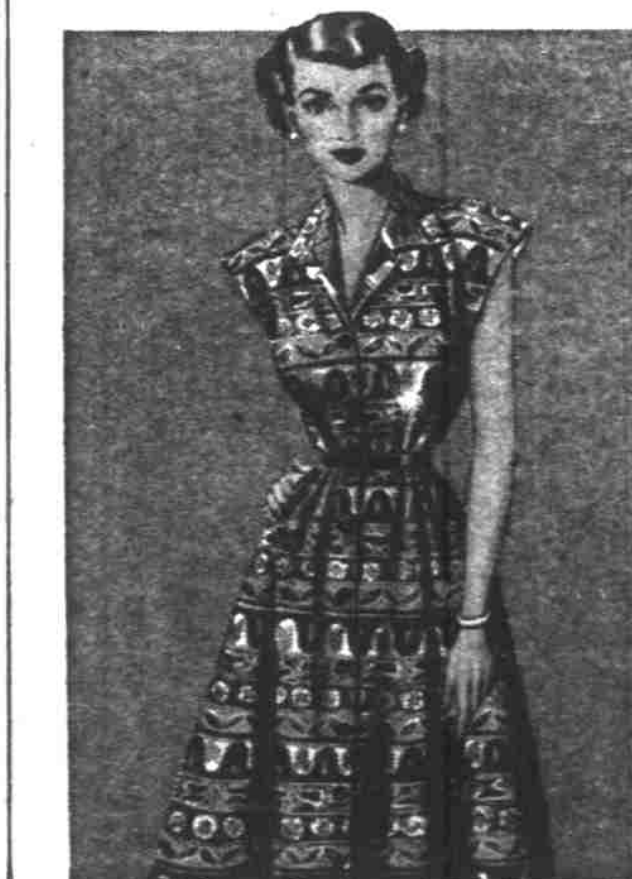
Sift dry ingredients. Cut in butter as for biscuits. Add nuts and just enough liquid to moisten flour. Drop by tablespoonsful into gently simmering syrup. Cover, simmer 15 minutes. Serves 8.
