County Clerks Required To Sell Fishing Licenses

County clerks cannot lawfully refuse to sell fishing and hunting licenses, Attorney General George Neuner ruled Friday.

The Lincoln County clerk refused to issue and sell the licenses because of insufficient help. Neuner said the game laws make the sale of game licenses one of the statutory duties of county clerks.

Rolls at State Institutions Now at 8,224

Total population of all State institutions now stands at 8,224, an increase of 17.8 per cent in the past 10 years, William Ryan, coordinator of State institutions, reported to the State Board of Control at a meeting Friday.

The State's population has increased nearly 50 per cent in the same period.

The State Penitentiary had an increase of 51 per cent and the Boys' School 71 per cent.

The State Hospitals for the mentally ill, with a total population of 4,400, gained only 13 per cent and the State School for the Deaf was up 31 per cent.

The Tuberculosis Hospital in Salem had a 36 per cent decline while The Dalles Tuberculosis Hospital declined 20 per cent. The Blind School population was down 15 per cent.

Fairview Home was up 19 per cent and Hillcrest School for Girls 17.9 per cent.

Dairy Tests Violators to Be Prosecuted

A promise to prosecute violators of the state statutes for testing of dairy and beef cattle was given to the Marion County Disease Control Group Friday by District Attorney Edward O. Stadter Jr.

Stadter said that whenever the group gathered sufficient evidence, he would prosecute to enforce laws which provide penalties up to \$100 and jail sentences of 30 days to three months.

The question of violation of the testing laws for Bang's disease and tuberculosis was discussed at a meeting of the group in the County Court rooms. Present were farmers and several Willamette Valley veterinarians.

The men said that during recent years beef cattle has been intermixed with dairy herds by many county farmers, and that some of these have not been tested for Bang's disease and tuberculosis.

Search Widens For Lost C-47

KLAMATH FALLS (AP)—The area north of here was searched Friday by seven Air Force planes for a C-47 transport missing since Dec. 26 with eight aboard.

The search spread northward on a 30-mile wide front after directors speculated that the plane may have been circling and had swung north when it became lost in a snowstorm.

The C-47, en route from Spokane, to Travis Air Force Base, Calif., was last heard from over Klamath Falls.

Sweetland Seeks Delegate Position

Monroe Sweetland of Milwaukie, Democratic National Committee member for Oregon, announced Thursday that he has filed his candidacy with the secretary of state for delegate to the 1952 Democratic convention.

Presently the publisher of the Oregon Democrat, monthly news-magazine, Sweetland sat in on the 1940 and 1948 Democratic conventions as an alternate delegate. In 1948 he won a four-man statewide race for national committeeman, but he has made no statement whether he will seek re-election to that office. He is also chairman of the Re-elect Truman Committee.

Former State Boys' School Chaplain Dies

SEASIDE (AP)—The Rev. Arthur Julian Mockford, 63, Episcopal minister, died at a hospital here Friday. He had been ill for a number of years.

He was born Jan. 20, 1888, in Wales, and after living in Canada for a number of years, came to the United States in 1924. He was chaplain of the State Boys' School at Woodburn, and before coming to Seaside was rector of St. Paul Church in Oregon City for 15 years.

His widow, three sons and two daughters survive.

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Newest Navy Plane Tested

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The heaviest of the Navy's carrier-based bombers, the North American XA 2J-1 Savage, was test flown Friday and officials called the flight "very satisfactory."

The twin-engine turboprop bomber is the successor to the AJ-1 Savage, now in service with the fleet. The AJ-1 is powered with two piston engines and one jet engine.

Size of the plane—it has a 10,000-pound load capacity—makes it eligible for carrying atom bombs.

Movie Studios Pay Damages To Red Nine

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Four movie studios have paid \$107,500 in an out of court settlement of a damage suit brought by nine of Hollywood's "unfriendly ten," it was reported Friday.

The money was in the form of four checks made out to Robert W. Kenny, attorney for the ten, the Evening Herald & Express reported.

The so-called "Unfriendly Ten" are directors and writers who were held in contempt of Congress and sent to jail for refusing, in 1947, to tell the House Un-American Activities Committee whether they were members of the Communist Party.

They sued the seven major studios, charging they were blacklisted for refusing to answer the Communist question.

The paper identified the beneficiaries as Ring Lardner Jr., Adrian Scott, Albert Maltz, Herbert Biberman, Alvah Bessie, John Howard Lawson, Samuel Ornitz, Lester Cole and Dalton Trumbo. Kenny and the studios involved refused to discuss the settlement.

Rose Worried About Costly Art, Clothing

NEW YORK (AP)—Billy Rose went to court Friday to demand that his estranged wife, Eleanor Holm, open the door of their lavish town house and let him in. The pint-sized theatrical producer has been locked out ever since he and his wife split up over his romance with blonde Joyce Mathews, former wife of Milton Berle.

Now, Billy said, he wants in so he can look over his valuable paintings and pick up some heavy clothes against New York's winter weather.

He said he was upset by a newspaper item that Miss Holm had mounted a valuable Rembrandt painting "behind a front door so

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that any attempt to force the door open would destroy the painting for which I paid \$75,000."

Ex-Convict Talks to Boys

HELENA, Mont. (AP)—Two 18-year-old boys, suspected of larceny, listened to an ex-convict tell of his "12 wasted years" in San Quentin, then led police to several hundred dollars worth of loot. Police Chief John Fred said the pair were arrested for car prowling. Their talk with the ex-convict, who shortly after was released from a vagrancy charge, was arranged by Judge John W. Mahan.

The ex-convict said "San Quentin is full of boys who started like you. It becomes a habit, and pretty quick it's the big house or the hot seat."

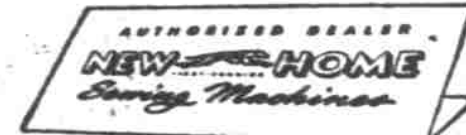
