



Coast Standouts Await Action

Annual Honolulu Hula Encounter Set Sunday

HONOLULU (AP)—Two more Pacific Coast football stars Friday joined the roster of college all-stars who face the pro-bolstered Hawaii All-Stars Sunday in the Hula Bowl.

Promoters of the game—from which the local Elks Club milk fund benefits—said Don Klosterman, a back of Loyola at Los Angeles and UCLA Tackle Hal Mitchell were added to the college squad.

Other mainland college stars here include Stanford's Bill McColl, Ohio State's Vic Janowicz, Hugh McElhenny of Washington, Johnny Bright of Drake and Ollie Matson of San Francisco University.

The Hawaii All-Stars, a collection of local professional and semi-pro players, will be led by mainland Professionals Frankie Albert and Kyle Rote.

Jackie Burke Links Leader

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Turning on the heat with four birdies on the back nine, Jack Burke Jr., of Houston, Tex., climbed out in front of a star-shy field of rivals in the first round of the \$17,500 Los Angeles Open Golf Tournament Friday.

The 29-year-old son of a former great Texas professional posted a 36-33—69 for a two under par performance.

Burke finished one stroke in front of his nearest rivals and four shots ahead of the man regarded as the best in the lot, Lloyd Mangrum.

Pressing close behind the leading Burke were two "unknowns" to local fame, John Barnum of Grand Rapids, Mich., and Al Brosch of Garden City, N. Y. Each had 34-36—70.

Alone at par 71 was a former master of the irons, Paul Runyan of Pasadena, with 34-37.

Bud Ward of Great Falls, Mont., had 38-35—73.

Several names familiar in the history of the local winter inaugural of the golfing season were missing before the shooting got under way, and later in the day another went to the sidelines. Dr. Cary Middlecoff of Memphis, who had been picked to make a run for the \$4,000 first prize, bowed out on the 11th hole, nursing a swollen wrist, sprained in a practice round.

With such stars as Ben Hogan, Sam Snead, and formidable players like Clayton Heafner, Dave Douglas and Chick Harbert, passing up the tournament, much of the usual lustre and excitement were missing.

Coast Pin Tourney Scheduled

NEWPORT—Four of Oregon's top bowlers will be on hand when the second annual All Coast Mixed Doubles Tournament opens in Newport Saturday, Jan. 12. All are from Portland.

They are Jack Seelberg, who last year held the highest average of any bowler in the state with 204; Stan Gifford and Keley Allen, both former members of the All Western team, and Don Wroten, who is one of Portland's best known bowling instructors. The foursome, with their wives, will bowl mixed doubles in the opening event.

Other features of the opening

program will be a match between Mayor Frank Gilkey and a partner, and a 30-minute broadcast of the event.

The event offers bowlers \$1,000 in prize money and will extend from Jan. 12 to June 1. Monthly prizes will also be offered.

The Coast City Tournament attracts bowling fans from all parts of the West Coast. Entries have already been registered from six Western states. Pete Bishop, manager of the tournament, estimates that it will register approximately 2,000 bowlers before the event ends June 1.

50 College Stars Ready For Senior Bowl Today

MOBILE, Ala. (AP)—Fifty college football stars—including six All-Americans—make a slipper transition Saturday from amateurism to professionalism.

The site will be a soggy, rain loaded field in Mobile in a game growing in importance by the year—the Senior Bowl.

Here in early January each year the final college game of the season is played.

Members of the winning team are "tainted" with \$500 hard earned money. Members of the losing team get \$400 each.

Two previous Senior Bowls flopped financially.

This year's squads—called North and South for convenience sake only—are collections of as good college talent as anybody will see on one field. Frank Gifford of Southern California is the North's offensive captain.

McColl to Ignore Pros In Favor of Medicine

Gretchen Fraser Gets New Role in Olympics

THE Vancouver Columbian VANCOUVER, Wash. (AP)—Gretchen Fraser, world champion woman skier of the 1948 Olympics, is about to return to the international classic—in a new role.

The slender little housewife left New York Wednesday on her journey back to Europe, where four years ago she sped to triumph down the snowy trails of St. Moritz. Gretchen was the first American woman to win a medal in the skiing event in the history of the Olympic Games.

Figurals flying the Vancouver

woman won the special slalom race and placed second in the combined downhill and slalom events to skyrocket to fame in the world of winter sports.

Now she's going back, not to compete herself but as manager of a group of eight young women, all of whom dream of becoming "the second Gretchen Fraser."

Her team will include four girls from the East and four from the West, ranging in age from 17 to 25. Although the fair Gretchen won't be representing her native Washington, Janet Burr of Seattle will be an entry. Also in the group is Andrea Mead of Law-

rence, Vt. Gretchen's teammate in 1948.

The others in the party hail from Colorado, Nebraska, Utah, New Hampshire, Idaho and Vancouver, Canada. The group is due in Zurich, Switzerland, Thursday. They will continue by train to Murren, Switzerland, to begin training for the big test at Oslo, Norway.

As manager, Mrs. Fraser is responsible for setting up the program, choosing the coach, arranging all travel accommodations and obtaining the costumes for her team. She is the only woman member of the Olympic Games Ski Committee.

Rawls Leader In Links Meet

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP)—National Open Champion Betsy Rawls and Georgia's Louise Suggs clipped three strokes off par Friday to take the first round lead in the \$3,300 Jacksonville Open golf tournament.

Miss Rawls, Austin, Tex., playing her first tournament in Florida as a professional, shot 38-35—73 and Miss Suggs, Carrollton, Ga., did it in 35-38—73.

They were one stroke ahead of the perennial women's champion, Babe Zaharias, Tampa, and amateur Mary Lena Faulk, Thomasville, Ga.

Don Steinbrunner To Head Cougars

PULLMAN, Wash. (AP)—Members of the Washington State College football squad Friday elected Don Steinbrunner as captain for their 1952 season.

Steinbrunner, a two-year letterman from Sunnyside, Wash., was named an end on the Associated Press first team in its All-Coast selections, and also was named on five all-opponent teams.

Eyton Bailey, 183-pound half-back from Seattle, was named to receive the J. Fred Bohler award as the player contributing the most to the team's success during the 1951 season.

WALLA WALLA (AP)—The Linfield Wildcats downed the Whitman Missionaries, 61-53 Friday night in the Northwest Conference basketball opener for both schools. Whitman held a 29-27 halftime edge, but the Missionary defenses wilted in the second half.
