Orange Peel Oil Causes Allergy

BALTIMORE (AP) - Oil from orange peel seems to cause some of the allergic reactions in babies from orange juice. Drs. C. L. Joslin and J. E. Bradley, University of Maryland School of Medicine Pediatricians, found the difference in a study of babies at two infant homes. Skin rashes or other reactions to orange juice were very uncommon, but were slightly higher in one home. There, more pressure was used in squeezing the half orange, so peel oil got into the juice.

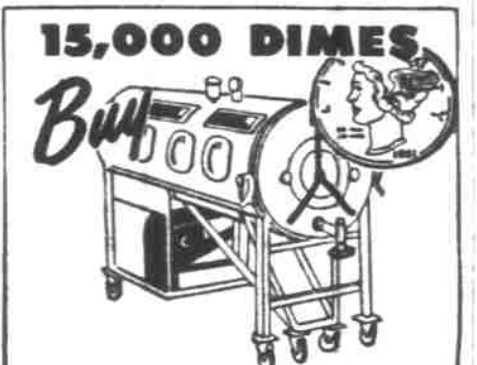

Health Council Plans Survey Of County Need

A survey of Marion County health needs and services is being planned as the first major project of the Marion County Health Council, according to the chairman of the Council, William Munroe Hamilton.

This survey, beginning Jan. 10, will be fielded throughout Marion County by volunteer workers in the various communities.

Confidential information given by the householders will enable the Health Council to determine the health needs of the people of the county, and what health services they are getting. It is hoped that measures can be taken, through community planning, to better satisfy the health needs discovered by the survey.

Questions include information on family health, health insurance plans, treatment used for illnesses, and amount of time lost from work because of sickness.

One out of every ten of the 32,000 households of Marion County will be asked to cooperate by answering the questions on the schedule. These households will be selected carefully in order to make sure that they will reflect accurately the views and experiences of all the people of the county. Accuracy and completeness in answering the questions will greatly aid the survey in finding just what the health needs and services of the county are.

All information will be held strictly confidential, and will be used only to secure totals and averages and percentage figures. Field workers will be instructed in survey procedure by members of the sociology department of Willamette University. They will be under the direction of Dr. John A. Rademaker, chairman of the sociology department.

The Marion County Health Council is a voluntary organization made up of individuals who are interested in health needs and services. Any organization or person interested in the health of Marion County people is welcome and cordially invited to meet with the Health Council.

Members of the Council include persons who are also members of the Marion County Medical Society, the Marion County Tuberculosis and Health Association, the

Marion County Health Department, the Farmers Union Health Association, the Marion County Red Cross, the Marion County Hospital Association, the Central Labor Council, the Marion County Parent-Teachers Association, the City of Salem, the Marion County Dental Society, the Marion County Pharmacists, and some other interested persons.

Capt. Carlsen, Ship Towed Towards Port

LONDON (AP) - "Stay Put Carlsen" was on his way to port Saturday night, riding his hurricane-broken ship behind a rescue tug and "feeling like a million."

There was a gentle breeze from the west northwest, the once angry Atlantic was almost calm, the barometer rising and the French tug Abeille 25 was standing off 1,000 yards astern in case anything went wrong.

At 9:37 a.m. Capt. Carlsen secured a 20-inch tow line from the churning tug, and the slanting bow of his listing freighter the Flying Enterprise.

Then he began the long trip—perhaps the last leg in his epic of the sea—to Falmouth Harbor, England, 320 miles and four days away.

Captain "Jubilant"

"Capt. Carlsen is jubilant and desires to remain on board in case the tow parts," the U. S. destroyer Willard Keith radioed from the scene.

The Turmoil hauled her charge along at a crawl of three and a half land miles an hour, and may take until late Tuesday to reach port.

The 37-year-old Woodbridge, N. J., captain had the company of Kenneth Dancy, 27, mate of the Turmoil who snatched a dangling line as the tug passed and made a life-or-death leap to the listing ship late Friday.

That was the sixth day after the captain began his lonely vigil far in the hurricane-lashed Atlantic, determined to uphold the traditions of the sea and save his two and a half million dollar ship and cargo from any possibility of becoming a derelict prize.

The 40 crewmen and 10 passengers, who jumped into the sea at his orders on Dec. 29, were all picked up by rescue vessels, save

Housemovers Make Use of River Barges

Housemovers, restricted by road widths or regulations, are making use of the Willamette River to relocate houses from Camp Adair to several towns up and down the valley.

Tom Deal, Salem contractor, has contracts to move several of the buildings, at least three of which will be brought to Salem and ten to Jefferson. Two have already been relocated at Independence and two others were on their way upstream to Corvallis Saturday.

Deal said the first of the houses will probably arrive in Salem in a week or ten days. It has not been decided where the house, destined for a Keizer district site, will be landed but Deal said either the seaplane landing or Wheatland Ferry landing would be satisfactory.

The houses are moved by land eight miles from Camp Adair to Albany where they are loaded on a 30 by 60 foot barge. Tug boats tow the temporary houseboat to its location either up or downstream.

Deal said the barge moving, handled by James C. Reed of Albany, was decided upon because of the long distances, sometimes narrow roads and regulations against use of some routes in the area.

7 GIs Killed as 2 U.S. Planes Hit on Runway

BURTONWOOD, Eng. (AP) - Two U. S. military service planes crashed in a flaming mass of wreckage on an airport runway here Saturday night. Seven American servicemen were killed and 15 others injured, five seriously. Two men escaped unhurt.

The planes were both twin-engine craft. They disintegrated in the flaming explosions of their gasoline tanks. Officers at Burtonwood, one of the largest American Air Force bases in England, said it was a miracle so many survived.

Burned and shock-stricken men stumbled from blinding flames into the arms of rescue parties. They were taken to the base hospital. Names of the victims were withheld.

A U. S. Navy P2V Neptune plane, known as a "Flying Gunboat," smashed into a U. S. Air Force C-47 transport which was waiting to take off. The Neptune, a long-range anti-submarine reconnaissance and strike plane, had turned back because of bad weather on a flight to Iceland.
