Due January 22

Play All-Star Squad In 2nd Eugene Game

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene—(Special)—The fabulous Harlem Globetrotters, one of the world's greatest basketball teams, will make their second appearance at McArthur Court on Jan. 22, it was announced Saturday by Leo Harris, Oregon athletic director.

The touring Trotters, who are now in their Silver Anniversary season will meet a team composed of former Oregon and Oregon State basketball stars. Last year the two teams played before a sell-out crowd and the Trotters won with a second half spurt.

In the past 24 years the Trotters have won a fantastic total of 3,908 games and lost only 252 for a winning percentage of .939. During the 1950-51 campaign Abe Saperstein's crew of entertaining cage experts played 340 games and won 334 of them.

The year started in September, 1950 and the first 154 games included the regular schedule played by the Trotters. The Minneapolis Lakers, led by George Mikan, handed the Trotters their lone defeat in this part of the season by winning 72-68 before 17,054 fans at Minneapolis.

The Trotters then moved to Cuba to win the Cuban Invitational, returned to the United States for the cross country tour against the Collegiate All-Americans, journeyed through South America for 48 games and then moved on to North Africa. The next stop was Europe and the season then ended with a summer outdoor junket through the United States.

During the year the Trotters played before two million fans and traveled 125,000 miles. The two top crowds on the tour were 50,000 in Brazil and 75,000 in the Olympic Stadium in Berlin, Germany.

The Trotters will be led by Babe Pressley, now in his fifteenth season with the club. The veteran guard will have a brilliant show with him and the halftime show is furnished by Ray Wilbert, a sensational juggler.

Next home game for the Salems will be with the Corvallis Spartans Tuesday, January 15. Corvallis has been winning regularly this season also, and altogether the Big Six race looks as one of the closest in history.

Salem already has a 1-0 record in league play, having defeated Springfield in a December 18 clash at Springfield.

17-Year-Old Evangelist at Jefferson

JEFFERSON — Evangelist Gordon McLean, 17-year-old Youth Guidance Director for the Pacific Northwest, opened a one week Youth Gospel Crusade here Sunday afternoon to continue through Sunday, Jan. 13.

Meetings will be held each week-night at 8 o'clock, at the Church of Christ. The series is being sponsored by the Talbot Community Church, Methodist Church of Christ and Evangelical United Brethren Churches.

Although still a young teenager, Gordon McLean has a unique record of accomplishments in Christian service. At 15 he assumed directorship of Victoria, B.C. Youth for Christ, becoming the youngest of YFC's more than 2,000 rally leaders. Upon graduation from high school—at 15, Gordon went into full time YFC work, later reaching teen-agers in the jails, prisons and detention homes with the gospel.

Today much of his time is devoted to conducting programs and counselling with young fellows in difficulties with the law. The program—called Youth Guidance—is now part of the Pacific Northwest Regional YFC activities operating from the Washington State Training School at Chehalis, Wash.

Minister to Set Up Africa Leper Colony

DALLAS — A Baptist minister and his family, who recently completed a visit of several months here, is on his way back to Africa to set up a leper colony.

The Rev. Gilbert Schneider, his wife and two young children, will sail from New York later this month for the British Cameroons, Africa. The couple, both missionaries of the North American Baptist Church, intend to spend the next five years setting up a self-sustaining colony for native lepers of the Mambila tribe in the Cameroons.

The Rev. Mr. Schneider left Dallas Thursday. He and his family have been on a furlough from missionary duties since last April. The minister is a former student of Linfield College. Mrs. Schneider is the former Mildred Voth.

Since the food for the new African mission is to be grown and raised on its 12,800 acres, the Schneiders are taking along a full variety of fruit trees, grapes and berry vines, and 50 pounds of seeds.

The colony will receive aid from the British government. The Schneiders will operate the colony and attend to its spiritual needs. Medical personnel will staff it, also.

The minister said that nearly 1,000 natives in that area are infected with leprosy. They are outcasts and must shift for themselves. The British have isolated the worst cases but no systematic treatment program has been set up.

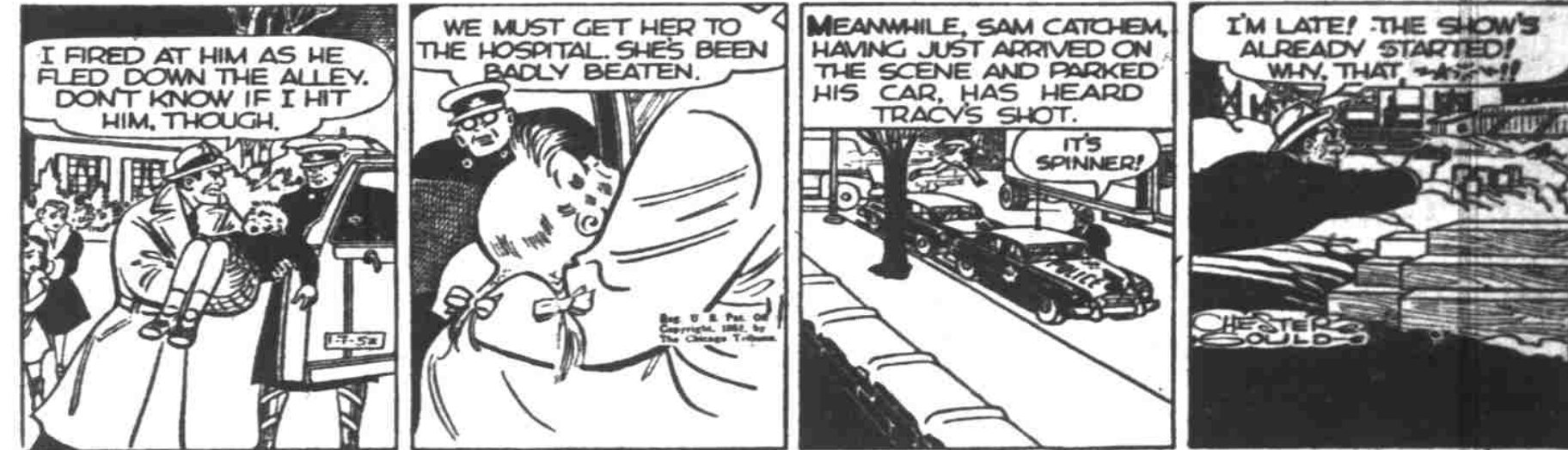

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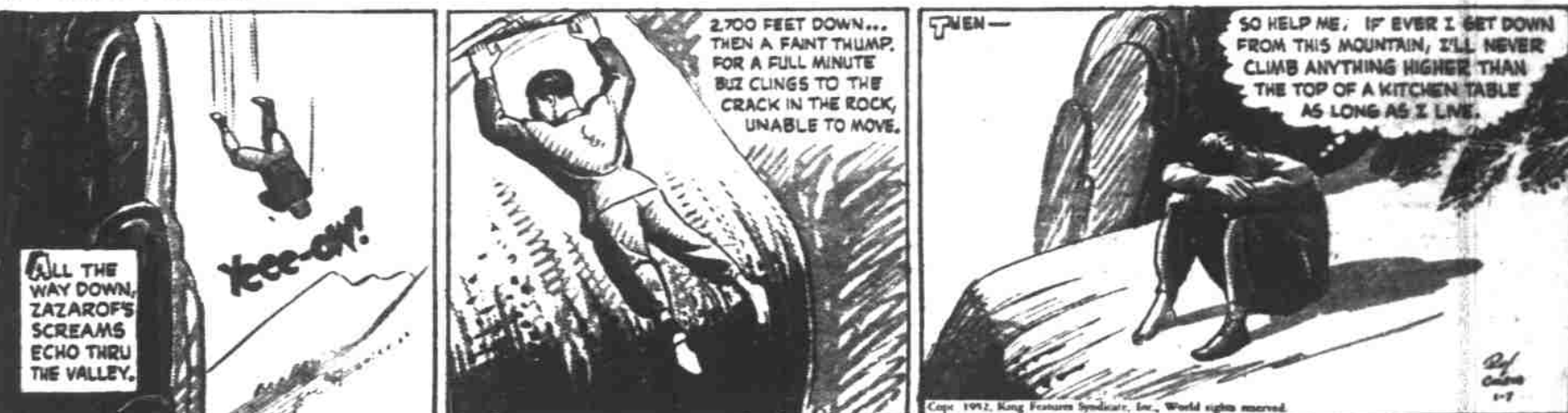
