High Court Orders Bridges' Union to Pay \$750,000 Claim

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Supreme Court decided Monday that Harry Bridges' International Longshoremen's union will have to pay \$750,000 in damages to an Alaska lumber company.

The Juneau Spruce Company of Juneau, Alaska, sued under the Taft-Hartley Labor Act, charging that picketing and coercive statements by the union damaged its business.

The damages were awarded by the Alaska U. S. District Court, and upheld by the U. S. Circuit Court in San Francisco.

The Alaska corporation said that by picketing and other means the longshoremen's organization tried to force the company to give barge-loading work to its members.

Juneau Spruce at that time had a contract with the CIO Woodworkers of America.

When the Bridges group set up the picket line, the firm told the court, the company's workers at first would not enter the plant. Eventually the Woodworkers Union gave its members permission to cross the line. Later, the longshoremen refused to unload the Juneau firm's products, saying they came from behind a picket line.

Unanimous Verdict Justice Douglas, in delivering the unanimous Court decision, said in part: "Here the jurisdictional row was between the outside union, Bridges' longshoremen, and the inside union, the woodworkers."

The longshoremen, who brought the case to the Supreme Court, were trying to get the work which was being done by the woodworkers, Douglas said.

"That competition for work at the expense of employers has been condemned by the Taft-Hartley act," he said. "Whether that condemnation was wise or unwise is not our concern. It represents national policy."

The picketing began April 10, 1948 and ended May 9, 1949. Juneau Spruce told the Supreme Court the longshoremen's activities caused more than a million dollars damage to the firm, not taking into account "substantial items such as loss of markets, damage to retail business, and destruction in lumber and log stocks."

3 Guilty Pleas Made in County Circuit Court

Three guilty pleas were heard Monday in the Marion County Circuit Court. Including a Woodburn man sentenced for contributing to the delinquency of a minor, and two prison inmates, charged with escaping from the State Penitentiary.

Sherman Plumb, Woodburn, pleaded guilty to contributing to the delinquency of a minor, by giving beer to minor boys, and was sentenced to 90 days in the county jail, suspended upon payment of \$100 fine.

James Q. Anderson and Leonard Hugh Hainey pleaded guilty to escaping from the State Penitentiary, May 18 and November 10, respectively, and were sentenced to an additional year each in the prison.

Pre-sentence investigation was ordered for John A. Taylor, 1370 Nebraska Ave., who has pleaded guilty to burglary not in a dwelling, involving thefts last month.

Niles F. Wicker's probation, granted last May 8, on a charge of obtaining money by false pretenses, was revoked, and Wicker was sentenced to six months in the county jail.

James Russell Frost was continued to Jan. 21 for his plea to a charge of escaping from the penitentiary.

At Least One Change Set In Legislators

Marion County probably will have its same two senators in 1953 (they're holdovers), but at least one change in the county's four state representatives appeared certain Monday.

Speaker of the House John Steelhammer (R) said he did not plan to seek another term—"I've had 12 years of it, and it's costly business."

The county's three other Republican representatives, however, were regarded as in the running—Reps. Lee V. Ohmart and Mark Hatfield, who have definitely committed themselves, and Rep. Roy Houck who is understood to be of the same mind.

Hatfield, Steelhammer and Ohmart finished in that order in the 1951 GOP primary and went on to win all four county legislative seats.

Of the four Democratic house nominees in 1950, Lawrence Koch of St. Paul does not plan to run again; P. W. Hale "isn't certain yet—it's an expensive thing"; Alvin Whitlaw is quoted as saying he has no plans to be a candidate; and Josephine Spaulding has moved to Portland.

There were reports that Lloyd Girod of Stayton, who was barely out of the running for fourth place and nomination in the 12-way Republican primary race in 1950, would be a candidate, and former Rep. W. W. Chadwick (R) is known to have been urged to run again.

Regarded as one of the strongest possibilities for a Democratic holdover in the all-republican house delegation is Cornelius Bateson of Pratum. Bateson ran a good third in the general election senate race of 1950 when he entered the competition belatedly after the withdrawal of Arthur Davis.

Bateson said Monday it was likely he would compete this time for a house seat, although it was indicated he might try for the county assessorship "unless some other candidate enters the field who would bring efficiency to that office."

Holdover senators are Republicans Fred Lamport and Douglas Yeater.

Candidates for state offices must file by March 7 for the May 16 primaries.

Mt. Angel Cow Sets Record In Production

PETERBOROUGH, N. H.—August J. Minke Jr., Mount Angel, Ore., has made a state champion record with his registered Guernsey cow, Laminar Cherry Pie. Her production of 10,917 pounds of milk and 601 pounds of butterfat is the highest Herd Improvement Registry record for a junior 3-year-old in the state of Oregon. "Cherry Pie" was milked 708 times while on test.

The sire of this cow, Bonnilb Leader, owned by B. Royce, Vancouver, Wash., and J. R. Alexander, Hillsboro, has two daughters in the Performance Register of The American Guernsey Cattle Club.
