

Arms Rolling Out Rapidly, Lovett Claims

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of Defense Lovett told Congress Thursday American production lines are pouring out tanks, guns, planes and other military equipment at a rate of 24 billion dollars a year—and the tempo is quickening.

He emphasized, however, that it may be some time before serious delays and bottlenecks in the production of major defense items are eliminated.

Lovett made his comment about bottlenecks in a statement to newsmen at the Pentagon after testifying behind closed doors before the Senate Armed Services Committee.

Earlier, Chairman Russell (D-Ga.) of the Senate group had told reporters that Lovett was "optimistic" that delays in producing jet planes, modern tanks and other weapons would soon end. Russell indicated this country would soon get a defense production lead over Russia. President Truman told Congress Wednesday that Russia is producing more war planes than the free nations.

Although stressing delays in the fast-expanding mobilization drive, Lovett said in a statement:

"Production will increase at progressively higher rates as the tooling-up stage is completed in the months ahead."

In the next 12 months, Lovett said, defense spending should average about 3 1/2 billion dollars a month, or 42 billion a year.

Reds Blamed For Deadlock

MUNSAN, Korea (AP)—The Allies accused the Communists at the deadlocked Korean armistice talks Friday of making conflicting statements on the crucial issue of Red airfields.

In a short and fruitless session, Maj. Gen. Howard M. Turner declared the Communists on Dec. 2 said they intended to rebuild their airfields in North Korea but now deny they have any such intention.

"I assured Maj. Gen. Hsieh Fang, Chinese Red negotiator, that until we get an answer to the question little progress can be made in negotiations," Turner said after the truce supervision subcommittee recessed until Saturday.

Stripes Cause Small Furore

BONN, Germany (AP)—A bootleg copy of the Army newspaper, Stars and Stripes, has sent State Department and Army officials into a tizzy. It raised this question: How can German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer get his daily copy of Stars and Stripes—legally?

A high German official has been sending out a messenger daily to buy a bootleg copy. The catch is that a German cannot legally buy "Stripes." It sells only for American money—the scrip issued to troops—and Germans are forbidden by Army regulations from possessing scrip.

Some one suggested that the Army send Adenauer a complimentary copy each morning. But the Army's legal brains said "regulations" forbid giving away "Stripes." State Department officials are now pouring through regulations to find if the department can foot the bill for Adenauer's "Stripes."

Mammoth Fish Sale in Chile

ROME (AP)—A whale-sized fish fry has just been reported from Chile.

Vendors on top of Santa Lucia Hill, outside Santiago, sold 75,000 pounds of fried fish—mostly hake—to the 250,000 visitors attracted there by Chile's fish week celebrations. Thousands of pounds more were distributed free to the poor in Santiago.

A report on the big fish fry was sent here to the fisheries division of the Food and Agriculture Organization of the U. N. The Chilean government put on the fish week to boost interest in fishing and in fish as food.

HIGHWAY TEA PARTY
LONDON (AP)—Englishmen can have a tea party right on the highway with the aid of a new gadget manufactured by a British firm. It's a tea- or coffee-maker that operates from a 12-volt auto battery and produces 1 1/2 pints. It is claimed that 1 1/2 teaspoonful of tea will give up to 12 cups.

WAF's Seeking 65 From Area

The Air Force has put in a call for 65 women from the Salem area to sign up for the Women's Air Force between now and June. The January quota is 11, the Air Force Liaison Office announced Thursday.

Eligible are women between the ages of 18 and 34. Sgt. Wilmer McDowell said the women are needed in both enlisted and commissioned ranks. Education and practical business experience determines the category in which they will be accepted, he said, rather than previous military experience.

Colonel Reviews Draft Reserve Unit

Salem's selective service officers detachment was reviewed Thursday night by Col. Dee Ingold of the Quartermaster Corps of the Army.

Pronouncing it as "a very good unit," Colonel Ingold reviewed the unit's records, and discussed training procedure. He told the six army, navy and air force reserve officers that in the event of mobilization they would be the first called to duty.

The unit meets every Monday night at the armory on Airport Road.

Irish Airline Crash Claims Lives of 23

CAERNARVON, Wales (AP)—An Irish airliner crashed and burned on a Welsh mountainside in a sleeting gale Thursday night and all 23 aboard were reported killed. The plane, a twin-engine DC-3 of the Aer Lingus, an Irish line, was en route from London to Dublin when it encountered high winds, sleet and rain.

Road Crews Reopen Snow Jammed Route

BAKER, Ore. (AP)—U. S. Highway 30, closed by eight-foot snow drifts, was reopened by State Highway Department crews Thursday, but chains were necessary for motorists.

The huge drifts piled up overnight as high winds swept a heavy snowfall across the area.

38 Senators Ask Recall of Phillip Jessup

WASHINGTON (AP)—Thirty-eight Republican senators demanded Thursday that President Truman recall Ambassador-at-Large Phillip C. Jessup on the ground that the American people have "no confidence" in him.

Jessup, whose name figured in the Communist-in-government charges aired by Senator McCarthy (R-Wis.), is now in Paris as the No. 1 negotiator for the U. S. delegation to the United Nations General Assembly.

On the Senate floor, Senator Styles Bridges (R-NH) charged that President Truman in effect committed "a violation of the Constitutional relation" between the Senate and the White House by appointing Jessup to the U. N. post.

Mr. Truman gave Jessup a recess appointment last Oct. 22, two days after Congress adjourned. The Senate had side-tracked Jessup's nomination after a Senate Foreign Relations Sub-committee voted 3 to 2 to reject it.

All but eight of the 46 GOP Senators signed the resolution, and Bridges, the new Republican floor leader, asked all others including Democrats to join in.
