Salem Academy is not scheduled for league play Friday, but has a game with Parkdale booked for the Salem Academy floor. Dale Parnell's Crusaders beat Parkdale last week at Parkdale.

Joe Boyle's Staytons displayed power in rolling over Cascade, and figure to give Leo Grojeques' Cardinals a rousing battle in their feature skirmish. On the basis of their early-season appearances, Johnny Seim's Cascades rate the favorites' nod over Bernie Hill's Philomaths.

Tom Pendergast's free-wheeling and undefeated Sublimity Saints play the Oregon School for the Deaf at Sublimity. Gates goes to Chemawa, St. Paul to Detroit and Jefferson to Gervais in the Friday nighters in the B league. Any Good Program Will Do . . .

College Group Pledges War on Professionalism

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Association of American Colleges voted Thursday to support "any program that will expose and eliminate professionalism" in intercollegiate athletics.

The delegates also approved a double barreled resolution opposing legislation pending in Congress to set up universal military training and opposing it as a matter of principle.

On Monday a special sports committee of college presidents set up by the American Council on Education recommended abolition of all athletic scholarships; abolition of all post-season games; and limitations on the practice and playing seasons for football, basketball, and baseball.

Taking note of this, the Association's resolution on athletics said in part:

"We pledge our support for any program that will expose and eliminate professionalism within the colleges and we accept complete responsibility for the administration of such programs upon our respective campuses."

The Association membership of 685 is made up of college and liberal arts departments of universities.

The resolution on UMT termed this system of training "unnecessary and undesirable."

Sonja Linked In Bout Offer

SEATTLE (AP)—The Times said Thursday Sonja Henie was the person interested in backing a heavyweight title fight between Jersey Joe Walcott and Harry "Kid" Matthews in Los Angeles.

Walcott, the champion, said Wednesday in Camden, N. J., he had been offered \$250,000 and half the television receipts for the battle, adding "a great female movie star" made the offer.

Jack Hurley, Matthews' manager, said in Seattle he had not been contacted but would be interested in such a project. He made a trip to New York last month to sound out the Walcott camp but has not disclosed what transpired.

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Hates to See Ted, DiMag Go . . . Feller Signs 1952 Pact For \$55,000 Top Salary

CLEVELAND (AP)—Bob Feller got a pay raise Thursday and wondered if earning some \$55,000 from the Cleveland Indians in 1952 might not be easier with Joe DiMaggio and Ted Williams gone.

"I hate to see those fellows dropping out," Feller said at his annual contract-signing ceremony — his 14th — "Ted always hit me pretty good, but DiMaggio and Tommy Henrich were even tougher."

With DiMaggio retired and Williams going into the Marines, the 33-year-old Feller now is in a class by himself as an established American League star. His 230 victories are more than any other active major league hurler can boast.

Hank Greenberg, the Tribe's general manager, said he had "no trouble" signing Feller for what probably will be the highest salary paid a pitcher in 1952. "The guys who produce are easy to sign," Hank said, adding that on the strength of his 22-8 record last year Feller was "in my book the most valuable player in the league."

Bob says he "better win 20 games this season," and he thinks he's good for three or four more campaigns after that.

Mustang Star Seriously Ill

DALLAS, Tex. (AP)—Dave Powell, regular end on the Southern Methodist University football team, was "dangerously ill" Thursday, Dr. Robert E. Morgan, team physician, said.

Powell, from Portland, Ore., was in an oxygen tent and running temperatures as high as 104, Dr. Morgan said.

"We've made test after test, X-ray after X-ray and had consultation after consultation, and we haven't found exactly what's wrong with Dave, except that he seems to have some kind of lung condition," said Dr. Morgan.

Powell is a junior at SMU.

ROCK HARBOR, Fla. (AP)—Ted Williams, the lanky Boston Red Sox slugger who will be recalled to active duty in the Marine corps in May, said Thursday he had not decided whether to report for spring training.

"You have to do your duty when you're told," the slugging outfielder said in reference to his call back into service for 17 months.
