Early to Rise

Yeast Fun to Use, Makes Good Cake And Variety of Interesting Breads

All that's yeast is not bread, or at least so say my constituents who send in interesting recipes now and then. One recipe which I ran across was for a chocolate cake with yeast, which was evidently sent in answer to a request. Here it is, and it's from Mrs. L. M. Fry of Woodburn and dates December 3, 1941.

CHOCOLATE YEAST CAKE

1 cup milk	2 1/2 cups flour
1/2 cup chocolate	1 cake yeast
2 cups sugar	1 cup warm water
1/2 cup butter	1 cup walnuts
3 eggs, well beaten	1 teaspoon soda
	3 teaspoons boiling water

Heat milk and chocolate together and cool. Cream sugar and butter, add eggs then alternately with flour to milk and chocolate mixture. Let stand overnight and in the morning add the soda in the boiling water. Bake in three layers.

For frosting, whip 1 pint cream, add 1/4 cup powdered sugar and 1/4 cup chocolate.

No wonder it's good.

The woman who likes to work with yeast may like to try some breads that are a bit different. This one which uses oatmeal, was given us by Mrs. Monroe Cheek, who likes it very much:

OATMEAL BREAD

1 1/2 cups rolled oats	1 tablespoon shortening
3 medium potatoes	1 cake yeast
4 cups water	1 cup chopped nuts
1/2 teaspoon salt	1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup molasses	Flour

Cook three medium sized potatoes, run through sieve. Boil oats, water, salt, molasses and shortening together until oats are done. Combine with potatoes and cool to lukewarm. Add yeast and dissolve, add 2 cups potato water, nuts and sugar. Add flour to make stiff dough, let rise until light. Kneading, form into loaves and let rise again. Bake. May take about 4 or more siftings of flour to make stiff.

The method is odd, and rather vague, but try it if you like, we plan to. Or if you prefer, use your own mixing method, but these proportions.

RYE BREAD

2 cups rye flour	2 tablespoons shortening
2 cups graham flour	1 cake yeast
1 1/2 teaspoons salt	1 1/2 cup lukewarm water
1/2 cup brown sugar	4 teaspoons caraway seed

Work with hands until well blended all but water and caraway. When blended but sticky, add the other ingredients slowly, working in. Cover bowl with cloth, let rise for 8 hours (overnight) and knead again for about 2 minutes. Fill two greased 5 x 10 pans to within 1/2 of top, and let rise until dough comes to top of pan. Bake at 375 for one hour or less. Remove, spread with melted butter or cream and replace in oven for 20 minutes.
