Buying for Your Home

Is Redecorating at the Top of Your New Year's Resolutions? Check List

Way at the top of your resolutions for New Year 1952, make a note to check your home and plan a little redecoration. The little things can be anything from just restocking your linen closet to rearranging your living room.

Whatever you do this coming year, plan it carefully and you will avoid any mistakes in shopping you might have made in the past. The column is meant for homemakers of long standing, who have a tendency to look about their houses and find it sadly lacking in those essentials of a good home—warmth, charm and comfort.

Many times it is not the fault of the inhabitants. When they first set up housekeeping they had to keep within a budget. They took some articles of furniture from their parents' homes. Gifts of basic furniture were welcome but there were strings attached—they bowed to the choice of the donors. Then spots had to be filled in and they bought inexpensive pieces "for the time being." A housewarming meant more chairs or a large table and they bought those that could be delivered in time.

Another problem that creeps into home decoration is that of fads. A special finish is tried one season and it seems just right, but when you want to add to the set, you find it has been discontinued. A patterned carpet might be on sale, but if it did not fit in with the drapes, the two are probably still battling each other after several years.

Let us take the living room, probably the most used room in the house. It should have one center of interest, a handsome sofa, break-front, fireplace, grand piano or a combination radio, television and phonograph cabinet.

Before you decided to change your center of interest in relation to other objects in the room, make a floor plan. Mark any breaks in the wall caused by windows, doors or built-in pieces. Then place your center of interest on the floor plan and balance it with two or more lesser pieces. These can be occasional chairs, club chairs, or a little conversation group.

If your dining area is part of your living room, plan it with an eye to convenience of service from the kitchen, as well as its place in the composition of your floor plan.

Once you have your basic pieces placed, then put the smaller articles, the end tables, coffee

tables, and lamps, where they are most useful and decorative. The lamps should be spotted for local as well as general lighting of the room to give the best effect.

Now you want to look over your color combination. Sometimes just a good cleaning will take away shabbiness of carpets and upholstery. Many good furniture polishes are on the market to revive dull looking case goods and tables. You need not plot your color scheme—it probably will suggest itself with a little thought.

Study the patterns you have in your room. The rug, the covering for your sofa, or the drapes will probably be a good color key because you chose them with your color preference in mind. A good picture often suggests colors to you.

If the room seems to have too much color, then add neutral tones in any new pieces you buy. Often a new paint job will tie together the colors with a neutral, warm and soft background. If the room has seemed dark and dingy, a lighter shade will do more to make it gay. If it needs character, a darker, warmer tone of paint will help. Perhaps you have no pattern in any of your furnishings and a figured wallpaper will give more interest to the room.

Fortunately we have gotten away from the idea of having a home in only one period of design. You have to use some discretion in mixing periods but if you want a gay modern note, or a formal piece from a traditional group you need not hesitate. The trick is to accept the room with the new interest in such a way that you will have both variety and harmony. The same holds true with dark or light woods.

If your taste in periods has changed, you can emphasize your new preference by changing some of the fabrics. Drapes or upholstery materials often carry the theme of the room and by selecting new fabrics in other patterns you can create a whole new feeling.

Once you have mapped out your changes, put them into effect slowly, so you can see how the result fits into your new plans. It is wise to take into your confidence only your family and not too many outsiders.

(Q) I have a bad corner in my living room caused by an odd formation of the wall that cuts out part of the room. Is there any way I can minimize the looks of this corner?

(A) You might try putting a chair in the corner to the two walls to cut out the bad spot. There are a number of corner cabinets that can also be used to span the corner if you want a higher piece here.

And the highly eligible 28-year-old Earl of Dalketh was there to see her off as she took an all-night train to London, where she popped into Buckingham Palace to take care of some correspondence, and then dashed to see the folks over the week end at Sandringham.

Also Goes South
The London News-Chronicle reported that Dalketh later also left his home in Scotland for Sandringham.

Always unpredictable in a girlish sort of way, the young Princess caught everyone by surprise by her sudden arrival Friday night. She wasn't expected until Monday.

And it didn't look like any lovers' spat was responsible for the change of plans—the way the Princess and the red-haired six-foot Earl chatted happily before she took off.
