

Game Comish Change Limit

New Rules on Salmon;
Umpqua Fly Fish Area

PORTLAND (AP)—The State Game Commission's tentative 1952 regulations, announced Saturday, call for changes in limits on fall run chinook salmon taken in the Columbia River.

Sportsmen will have two weeks to file objections to this and other proposed fishing regulations. The Commission will then meet Jan. 25 for public discussion and final adoption of the regulations.

The proposed salmon limit regulation will permit taking two fish over 24 inches long and four between 12 and 24 inches. From July 1 to Oct. 12, the weekly or possession limit will be four of the larger salmon or eight of the smaller.

Other proposed changes: A 33-mile portion of the North Umpqua River in Southern Oregon is to be set aside for fly fishing only.

Cascade mountain lakes, with a few exceptions, will be open for fishing May 30 to Sept. 30.

Opening dates for trout season are April 19 in Zone 1, coastal waters, and Zone 2, Willamette and Hood River watersheds. The opening will be May 3 in all other zones except Lake County which will have a May 20 opening. The uniform closing date for the entire state is Oct. 12.

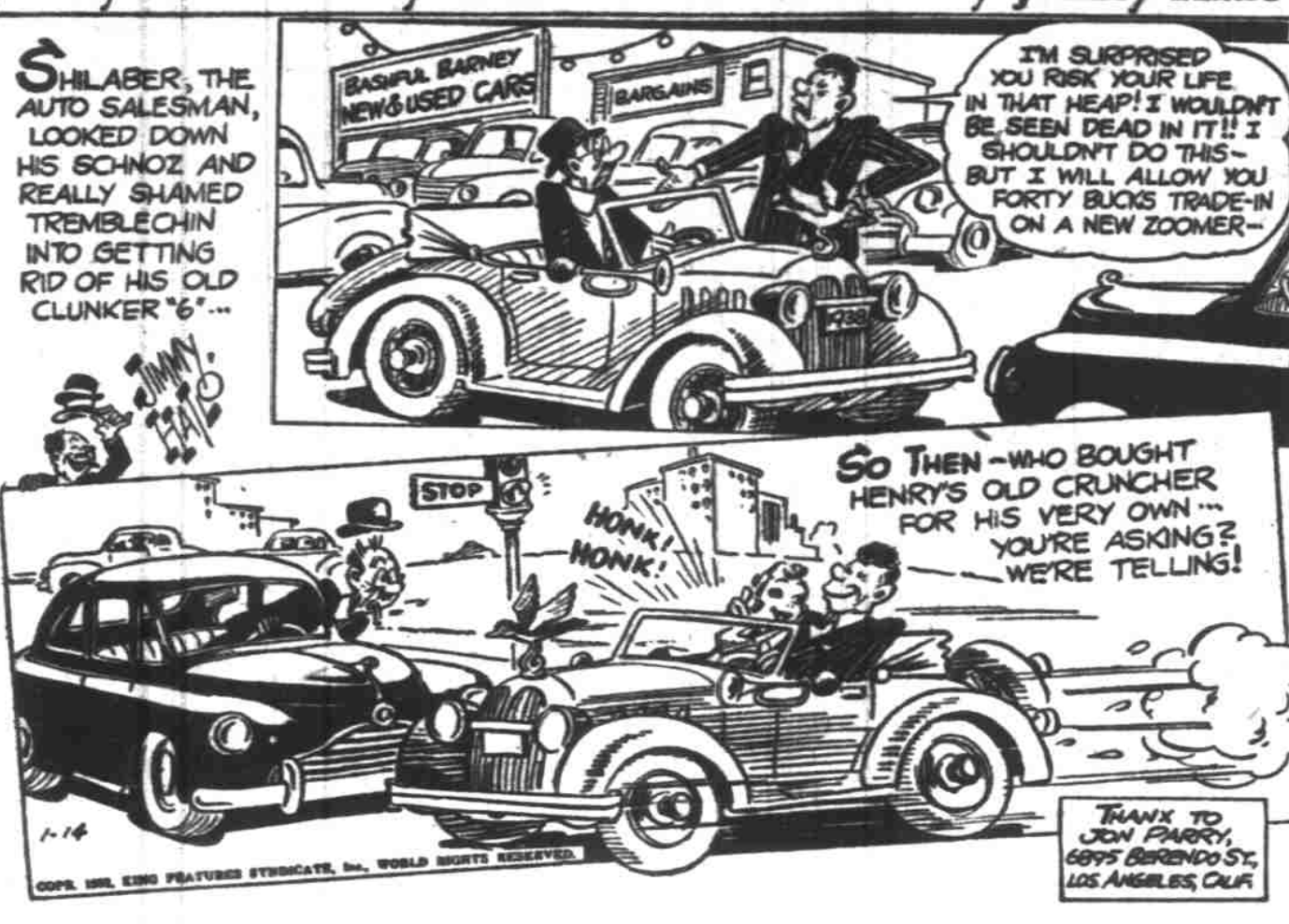

Jayhawks in Close Squeeze

Leaders Take Beating On Nation's Hardwoods

NEW YORK —College basketball stars shoot baskets with one hand, and you can count the number of unbeaten major college teams on the fingers of one hand Sunday.

Only Kansas, Iowa, Illinois, Duquesne and St. Bonaventure came through the storm of more than 200 college cage games Saturday night as previously-unbeaten Seton Hall and Florida fell by the wayside.

And the Kansas Jayhawks, rated the No. 1 team in the land in the Associated Press poll of the 100 top teams, won by the narrowest of margins, a 60-59 squeeze over Missouri.

Seton Hall Falls
Seton Hall, ranked No. 9 went down before the last quarter charge of Siena college, bowing by 55-52 after winning 12 straight games.

Florida, on the other hand, bid an early goodby to its 10-game winning streak as Kentucky's powerful No. 3 team buried the Gators under a 90-52.

Kansas' 15th straight victory in a streak extending back to last year was saved by Dean Kelley, who sank a shot from the corner with a half minute to go. Missouri, trailing 33-19 at the half, had put on a furious rally to go ahead, 59-56, with three minutes to play.

Sensing one of the biggest upsets of the season, the Tigers elected to try and freeze the ball for the rest of the game. The strategy worked for about two minutes, then backfired as Kansas gained possession on a Missouri foul, and Kelley did the rest. Kansas has won 12 this season.

Big 10 Again
None of the other unbeaten had anywhere near the trouble the Jayhawks encountered. The two Big Ten titans, Illinois, No. 2, and Iowa, No. 10, won without difficulty, Illinois whumping Michigan, 67-51, and Iowa trampling Indiana, 78-59.

Both Illinois and Iowa have won 10 games this year. They meet Feb. 9 at Iowa City and Feb. 23 at Champaign, Ill.

Duquesne also racked up victory No. 10 by working over Syracuse, 78-67.
St. Bonaventure's victory over Niagara, 65-42, was their ninth straight of the season and protected their No. 8 ranking in the poll.

Poll Toppers Wallpapers
The other poll teams were returned winners, too. St. Louis, No. 5, got three clutch baskets by Ray Steiner for a 71-64 win over Detroit; Washington, No. 6, continued to set the Pacific Coast pace by beating Oregon State, 48-41; and Kansas State, No. 7, kept pace with Kansas in the Big Seven by whipping Nebraska, 71-36.

It appears that the poll rankings will be scrambled somewhat this week, and also that the unbeaten list may be pared still further. Illinois must face Indiana

College Admits Masquerade Of Grid Star

TEMPE, Ariz. (AP)—The Phoenix Gazette said Saturday an All-Border Conference tackle at Arizona State College at Tempe had been playing all year under an assumed name.

The paper identified the player as "Edward Andrew" Matesic, registered at the school as a freshman. His real name is Joseph Matesic, a star sophomore tackle at Indiana university in the 1950 season, the Gazette said.

Dr. Grady Gammage, ASC president, confirmed that one of the school's football players had been found to be registered under the name of "another person," and had left the institution.

Dr. Gammage, who presented the information in a written statement, did not identify the player. Matesic, a sensation as a freshman here this season, left several days ago for his home in Rankin, Pa. Acquaintances said he planned to enter military service.
