NO WINDOW NEED BE OLD-FASHIONED

Remodelling or the disguising of the old-fashioned architectural features of a room seldom includes changing the window frames. But there's no reason at all that ugly, out-dated windows should spoil the room. No window need be old-fashioned because window frames are so easily covered up, and they so often are in new window fashions whether or not cover-up is needed. Here's an old-to-new window changer idea that requires neither draperies or curtains. A box frame of plywood or composition board made like a cornice continues downward on both sides of the window to encase it. It projects as a cornice does to conceal blind tops and hardware, and it may be higher and wider than the actual window to make the window look larger. The new frame may also continue across the bottom of the window. Cover it with wallpaper or fabric, and for the newest effect, complete the smart window treatment with narrow wood slat blinds.

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Exchange Faculty Recital Sunday

The second in a series of exchange faculty recitals between Oregon State College and Willamette University will be presented at the Willamette College of Music recital hall, Sunday at 2:30. Featured will be two Oregon State artists, Robert Walls, tenor, director of the department of music and Joseph Brye, associate professor of music.

Twentieth century music will compose the program to be presented in the form of a lecture-recital.

Walls has done extensive concert work, including appearances in the midwest and west as soloist in oratorio, recital and on network radio programs. The musician is author of numerous magazine articles and handbooks of teaching aids for music educators. He is also co-author of a pronouncing guide to foreign languages.

Brye has appeared in numerous piano recitals in Oregon, Washington and Idaho and with the University of Idaho and Oregon State College symphony orchestras. An accomplished artist of the marimba, Brye toured Europe in 1931 as a member of the 100-piece International Marimba symphony. He is the composer of works for piano, marimba, modern dance, chorus and orchestra.

Brye and Walls have given many popular lecture-recitals on folk music in Oregon and Idaho schools.
