Canada Natural Gas For Salem Appears Several Years Away

WASHINGTON—Canadian natural gas for Salem is still several years off the horizon, according to a consensus of Canadian and American observations.

Three companies at present are vying for rights to import Alberta gas into the Pacific Northwest, but none has indicated it would run a main line farther south than Portland in Western Oregon, according to applications now on file with the Federal Power Commission.

Two of these firms, however, indicate subsequent plans to link Salem, Dallas, Independence, Albany, Corvallis, Lebanon and Eugene with the main line that would serve the major industrial cities to the north.

Members of the Oregon utilities commissioner's staff, along with representatives of other Western utilities, appeared before the interstate commerce commission and pleaded for the lesser rate increase as between Western and Eastern territory.

PORTLAND (AP)—The former wife of an Independence, Ore., lumberman sought in Circuit Court here Friday to establish her dower right to his \$22,266 estate.

The woman, Joan Swift of Pittsburgh, Pa., was willed \$10,000 by Fred H. Swift of Independence, who died last August. They had been married but were divorced.

But Mrs. Swift testified in court that after the divorce they lived together as man and wife and that, she asserted, made her his common-law wife. That also gave her a dower right of 25 per cent of the estate, she said.

Another ex-wife of Swift's, Mimi Swift of New York, was given 75 per cent of the estate under the will. Pearl Waldorf, Independence, was willed the other 25 per cent after some small bequests.
