

7th Straight Aim of Viking '5' at Eugene

Haukmen See Tough Contest With Axemen

Salem High's victory loaded Vikings go after No. 7 in a row Saturday night at Eugene, with Hank Kuchera's Axemen the anticipated victims. The Vikings have four consecutive Big Six League conquests, and if they manage to get by the Eugene team it will mean that Coach Harold Hauk's Villa clan has met and defeated every member of the circuit, sans a single setback.

The Vikings don't figure the clash to be an easy one, however. Kuchera's Axemen generally give Salem quints a real romp.

A fact in favor of the Vikings, however, is that involving Eugene's loss to Corvallis last month. Salem handed Corvallis with ease earlier this week, running to an astounding 18-0 first quarter lead.

The Viking starting lineup of Jack Bishop (6-5), Larry Paulus (5-3), Bob Hazel (6-0), Chuck Baies (5-11) and Don Peper (5-9) will be bigger than that floored by Eugene. Jerry Messer at 6-2, Al Romig at 6-1 and Hank Hudspeth at 5-11 are Eugene's foremost performers.

If the Vikings are able to use the height of Bishop and Paulus under the boards as they did against Corvallis Tuesday, there shouldn't be much standing in the way of a Salem win. The two big Vikings ruled the rebound department in the Spartan clash, a deciding factor in the easy win.

The Salem Jayvees will be after their ninth straight win in the prelin clash Saturday night.

Following the jaunt to Eugene the Vikings next play Lebanon, Tuesday night on the Vik Villa court.

Academy Quints to Clash Tonight in Crusader Gym

The first of the annual two meetings involving the Sacred Heart and Salem Academy basketball teams bursts forth Saturday night in the Crusaders' Gym at West Salem. Game time will follow the seven o'clock prelim featuring the school's Bee teams.

On the strength of recent performances by both varsity squads, Coach Dale Parnell's Crusaders will go into the Saturday mix as favorites. The Crusaders have won their last four in a row and for the season have a 6-3 record. Leo Grosjacques' Cardinals on the other hand have dropped their last five straight, after winning five of their first six outings. Sacred Heart went into the Capitol League race as the team favored for the title. But the Cards already have lost to Stayton and must beat the Crusaders Saturday in order to stay alive in the derby.

The Crusaders suffered a severe blow in a practice session Wednesday when Don Friesen, the team's high scorer, fractured an ankle. His place in the starting lineup likely will be taken by Dean Maurer, a five foot, nine inch, 140 lb. Dave Knaupp, 5-11. Otherwise the Crusaders will open with 6-2 John Thiesen at forward, 6-2 Bob Brotherton at center and 5-8 Chet Schmidt and 5-11 Bob Johnson at guards.

The Cardinals aren't without their woes either. Vern Daniels, 6-4 forward, is down with an illness. Ron Hauser at 6-1 is his replacement. Dave Mock at 6-3 will be at center, Virgil Weber at 5-11 will be at the other forward and Vance Cooney at 5-7 and Johnny Hoy at 5-8 will be the guards. Weber is the leading SHA point-getter.

American Ski Queens Earn More Honors

BAD GASTEIN, Austria (AP)—Andrea Mead Lawrence and Jannette Burr, two top U. S. ski queens, added to their Olympic luster Friday by taking first and third places in the giant slalom of the international meet which lured stars from six nations.

Mrs. Lawrence, 19-year-old veteran of the 1948 Olympics, won first place and Miss Burr, 24-year-old Seattle, Wash., star, was third. Erika Mahringer of Austria, separated the two Americans.

For a time Miss Mahringer was the declared winner of the event which opened the three-day show circus. Then a check of the electric timing device showed her time was actually 2:06, not 2:00.6, and she was second behind Mrs. Lawrence's 2:02.5. Miss Burr was clocked in 2:07.1.
