Top Strawberry Market Seen For 1952; Carryover Small

A stronger demand and a slightly smaller crop carryover give promise of a comparatively good strawberry market this year.

That was the prediction Marion Thomas, extension agriculture economist, Oregon State College, made to more than 200 strawberry growers Friday afternoon in the Izaak Walton League building, for which was furnished Distributors, Don Rasmussen, Marion County horticultural agent, was chairman. The meeting was attended by growers from all up and down the valley.

Thomas said he based his predictions on, first, that consumers were having from five to 10 per cent more money to spend this year than a year ago, in spite of higher taxes; second, frozen berries were moving from storage more rapidly this year than last, and third, strawberries were a little lower in price than a year ago which was proving an attractive item to consumers.

He issued a slight warning, however, in his statements that "increasing acreage now isn't quite as safe as it was eight years ago," and that "if you want to stay in the strawberry business you are going to have to watch all costs most carefully. They—both fertilizer and the cost of harvesting—are going to be any less." He also urged growers to watch the national market closely.

"Oregon's crop is not dependent upon Oregon, but goes throughout the nation," he said, as he told that while production was lower in the "old strawberry state," Louisiana, it was increasing in Michigan and California in 1951. California, Thomas said, produced twice as many strawberries as Oregon on one third as much acreage.

"But Oregon's product, if closely guarded," said the economist, "might be able to squeeze out some of the others and maintain its market."

Oregon's 1951 production was 213,000 tons on 18 acres, and indications were that it would run approximately the same this year. Albert Jesse, Gales Creek, speaking on frost prevention in strawberry fields, said that it was proving practical. By using smudge pots, he had, he said, in one year alone saved \$9,000 worth in one small field, while his neighbor, not using any prevention, had lost his entire crop.

Other speakers were Dr. E. K. Vaughan, plant pathologist, Oregon State College on diseases; Robert W. Every, college entomologist, on strawberry insects, and a panel discussion by three strawberry growers: Henry Hansen of Sublimity, Gilbert Ramage of Woodburn, and Clarence Sietliniski of Hazel Green, all of whom discussed proper soils and soil building for improving strawberry production.

City Licenses Issued Over Council Rule

City permits are being issued for a variety of licensed businesses in Salem, despite conflicting orders from the City Council, it was stated Friday by City Treasurer Paul Hauser.

The council Monday night called for an amendment to a license bill passed the meeting before and directed that meanwhile the treasurer suspend issuance of licenses. The section to be amended affects food handlers, according to Alderman Thomas Armstrong who proposed the council action. But the bill as a whole licenses also bowling alleys, card rooms, dance halls, hotels, junk shops, soft drink dispensers and other businesses.

Amendment under consideration by the license committee was a ceiling on the total license fee for food handlers which is figured on the basis of the number of food handling employees.

City Treasurer Hauser said Friday, however, he would continue to accept license fees for 1952 permits because many already had been issued and he didn't feel the council action was definite enough to delay operation of an ordinance on the city's books.

Civil Service Quiet on Bid For Pay Raise

James Clinton, State Civil Service Commission director, said Friday that the commission probably would not announce until March its reaction to a request for a state employee pay boost.

The proposed 7 per cent salary increase, requested recently by the State Employees Association, would be the equivalent to boosting the classification of all state workers under civil service at least two grades.

The State Finance Department, which referred the matter to Clinton, has said that no money is available for the increase, which would cost the state about \$2,000,000 per year.

Dallas Soldier Returns to U.S.

Cpl. Benny Peters, 403 Clay St., Dallas, was listed as a returning veteran of Korean action aboard the troopship Hugh Gaffey, arriving in Seattle from the Far East Saturday.

Five other servicemen from Roseburg and the Portland area also were listed.

What is believed to be the largest forest fire in America occurred in 1825 in Maine and New Brunswick. It burned over three million acres and cost 160 lives.

Four Acquitted Of Defacing Dance Hall

Four young Salem men were all acquitted of charges of defacing the old Hazel Green Dance hall when they appeared for trial in Marion County District Court Saturday.

They are Arthur Thomas Akers, 1383 Edgewater St.; William Edward Bauer, 902 Pine St.; John Francis Hults, 4490 Jones Rd., and Carl Leonard Pruitt, 575 Patterson St.

They were accused of pulling boards off the dance hall during the night of Jan. 11 to build a fire in the fireplace. Witnesses who lived near the school testified as to the alleged board-pulling but Judge Val Sloper ruled that, technically, the prosecutor failed to prove that the accused had committed the defacing act.

Total Receipts From Forests Rise Sharply

PORTLAND—Total receipts of \$19,504.15 have been reported by 19 national forests in Oregon and Washington for the first half of fiscal year 1952, which began July 1. This sum is more than 50 per cent higher than for the same period in the previous fiscal year, indicating that another record year is in the making.

Timber sales provide most of these receipts with the balance collected from grazing fees, land use permits, water power rights and minor miscellaneous sources. National forest income in the Pacific region of the U. S. Forest Service has increased tremendously in the past decade. Receipts for fiscal year 1951 were \$26,272,927 compared to \$2,116,893 in 1941, according to Regional Forester J. Herbert Stone.

"Even more important than increased returns to federal and county treasuries, however, is the indication that these public forests are rapidly approaching their rightful place in contributing to the timber economy of the Northwest," Stone said. "We are bringing previously inaccessible timber areas into production, and are making real progress toward our goal of full sustained yield."

Unemployment Claims Rising More Slowly

Continued snows in the mountains and seasonal letdowns in several industries combined to lengthen claims lines in 28 local offices of the State Employment Compensation Commission this week but the rate of increase slowed down slightly as compared with year-end activities.

Claims reported by local offices climbed to 39,209 last week, highest since early March of 1950 and nearly 68 per cent above the 23,379 counted a year ago. Initial claims, however, representing new layoffs, dropped 591 to 7,545, though still higher than at any time for nearly two years.

Nearly all of the recent increase has come from construction, lumber, logging and other seasonal pursuits but the layoffs are beginning to affect retail and service lines. Almost half of all claimants are coming from the important woods industry with construction and food processing next in order.

Because employment held at or above previous seasonal trends until just before the holidays, few of the 70,000 workers who have filed claims since the beginning of the benefit year last July have exhausted their annual rights. Maximum compensation for the 1952 benefit year period, ending next June, have gone to only about 2,000 claimants—less than half the number shown a year ago and less than a fourth of the early 1950 figure.

To Reach Record

Payments to those temporarily out of work passed the million-dollar mark for 1952 in the first two weeks and are expected to reach a total highest of any January on the commission's record—with the single exception of the opening month of 1950 when \$4,189,653 was paid to the unemployed. This in turn was exceeded only in February of the same year which still holds the all-time mark. If the weather and seasonal shutdowns continue well into the spring, payments to the unemployed may cut the reserve fund well below \$78,765,000 on hand at the close of 1951, officials said. Tax collections during the first quarter of 1951 are expected to be lower than the \$2,445,204 received from employers a year ago. Incidentally these collections were the lowest for the opening quarter with one exception since 1942.

Rate Reduction

Falling off of employer contributions is due partly to reduced rates under experience rating and partly to added exemptions. Nearly \$200,000,000 of the billion dollar covered payrolls in 1950 were not subject to taxation because of a provision in the law exempting wages of more than \$3000 to one person.

Average rates on 1950 and 1951 payrolls were maintained around 1.35 per cent (half of the normal 2.7 per cent) but a considerable

reduction will go into effect in 1952, partly because of lower unemployment last year and partly because of legislative amendments. Officials said the average rate this year may drop to around 1.15 per cent, which would bring in considerably less than the \$13,200,000 collected from 17,000 employers last year.

Atomic Rays Increase Rate Of Cancer Cure

WINNIPEG, Man. (AP) — A new cancer treatment, developed from Canada's atomic pile at Chalk River, Ont., increases the rate of cure in certain types of cancer, Dr. I. A. Smith of London, Ont., reports.

The doctor has been using the new method — bombarding the cancers with rays from radioactive cobalt 60 produced at Chalk River, since last October. He reported his findings to the annual meeting of the Canadian Association of Radiologists.

Smith described the therapy, developed by Canadian scientists, as "a new weapon, tremendously expanding previous methods of treating cancer." Cobalt 60 is more effective than radium, he said, because its rays have a far greater penetration.

Cub Scouts to Form New Den

MORE BATTLE CASUALTIES

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Defense Department Saturday identified 110 additional battle casualties in Korea. A new list, No. 482, reported 37 dead, 56 wounded, three missing in action and 14 injured. It also listed 39 killed who were previously carried as missing.

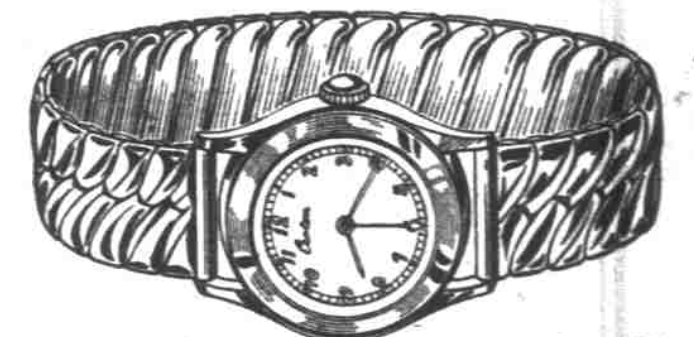

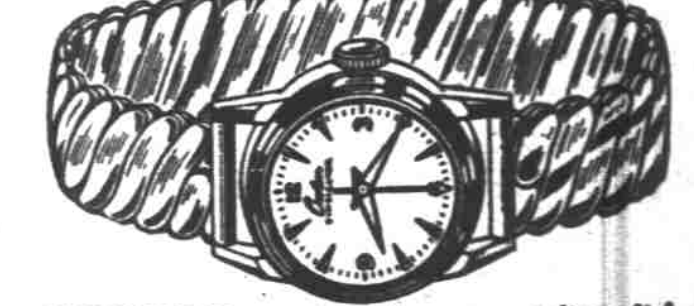

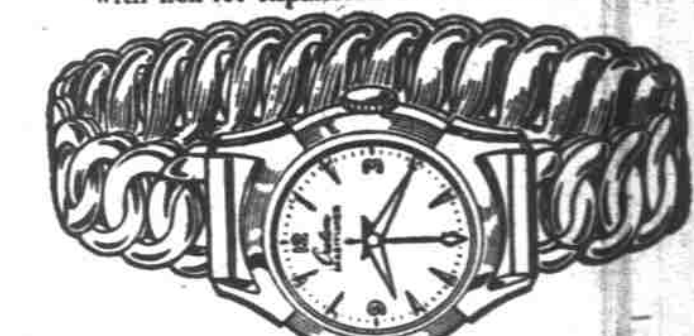
