TOLEDO, O.—The new 1952 Aero Willys cars, declared to have 90 new features and to give mileage of 35 per gallon, is now on display.

Efficiency of Engine Cited In '52 Models

TOLEDO, O.—One of the few entirely new automobiles to be introduced by an American manufacturer in over two decades, the new Aero Willys sedan is now on public display in showrooms of Willys-Overland dealers including Elmslor Motors, Salem, Ore., officials announced.

It is named the Aero Willys because of being "more fully engineered than any previous auto to combine principles of aeronautical design with advanced automotive engineering," according to Ward M. Canaday, company president.

Aero Willys is powered, Canaday said, with "one of the world's most efficient engines and has 90 features that add up to an entirely new concept of motoring convenience, comfort and economy."

The car is declared designed to meet the challenge of rising motoring costs and increasing traffic density.

"Gasoline economy is unsurpassed," according to Willys engineers, who cite tests of various models "from which, with overdrive at 30 miles an hour, up to 35 miles per gallon has been obtained."

Airlift Crash Survivors Tell of Watching Sea Claim Victims

McCHORD AIR FORCE BASE, Wash. (AP)—Survivors of a Korean airlift plane crash off Canada's West Coast told Sunday of seeing their flight companions washed one by one into the icy North Pacific.

Only seven of the 43 aboard were rescued after the crash-landing in the sea off Sandspit Airport in the Queen Charlotte Islands. But the survivors, brought to McChord aboard another plane, said only 10 of the 43 were killed in the crash.

They said the other 26, battered by high waves, were swept off the half-submerged wreckage and drowned. The victims included the crew of three — the pilot, co-pilot and stewardess — and 23 passengers, all presumably service men coming home from the Far East.

The four-engined DC-4, inbound from Japan, fell into the water a mile offshore while trying to make an emergency landing at the Sandspit airport, on the most southerly of the Queen Charlotte chain, west of British Columbia. One engine had developed trouble.

Eight bodies were recovered. The search for the others was continuing.

The seven told of clinging to the hulk for 90 minutes awaiting the rescue that for many came too late.

The plane struck a gravel bar in about 15 feet of water, leaving a wing and the tail jutting above the surface.

PFC Demetris G. Apostlan, Hinton, W. Va., said one of the plane's motors failed just before the crash landing.

"The field was icy and snowy," he said. "We came in too far down the runway. The pilot gunned the other three engines and pancaked in the water a mile offshore. About 10 men didn't get out of the plane.

"The rest of us climbed out on the wing and fuselage. The waves were high and bitterly cold. One by one the others lost their grips and were gone."

Sgt. H. D. Maynard, Spruce Pine, Ala., said Stewardess Jane Cheadle, Seattle and Helena, Mont., was one of those swept away by the waves after clinging to the fuselage.

"She was just wonderful," he said. "She helped us all and we were all praying for her, but she slipped off, crying 'help me! help me!'"

Apostlan swam after her in a futile attempt to save her but barely was able to get back to the plane himself.

The seven finally were saved by men in a fisherman's skiff powered with an outboard motor.

Cold Wave Spreads Over Plains States

A new cold wave spread over the upper Mississippi Valley and the Northern and Central Great Plains Sunday accompanied by temperatures which fell from 20 to 35 degrees in 24 hours.

Thermometer readings tumbled to 23 below zero at Bismark, N. D.; 20 below at Fargo, N. D.; 6 below at Minneapolis and Saint Paul; 21 below at International Falls, Minn., and 9 below at Grantsburg, Wis.

Forecasters said this cold wave was pushing southeastward, and Ohio, Kentucky, West Virginia and Western New York and Pennsylvania. Temperatures were expected to range from 20 above to zero.

Snow flurries appeared over most of the Great Lakes region and the Pacific Northwest. Mild weather continued in the Southeastern states.

South Koreans To Take Over 4 Navy Ships

PORTLAND (AP)—Young Han Choo, consul general for the Republic of Korea, arrived in Portland Sunday to represent his government when four U. S. Navy ships are transferred to Korean crews.

Some 174 Korean sailors arrived Saturday to take over the ships. The ceremonies will be at Tongue Point Naval Station, Astoria, Monday. Two patrol craft and two support landing ships are to be turned over to them.

Among others who greeted Choo at his arrival here Sunday was George Kim, Korean-American from Gresham who lost a leg while fighting in Korea with the U. S. 24th Infantry Division. Kim is a patient at Letterman Hospital.

FBI Seizes Slot Machines
