### New Two-Part Paint is Easy to Mix Helps to Select Colors in Advance

Getting just the right shade in paint is often a problem with a homemaker who wants to do the job himself. A new method of coloring house paint lessens the mixing problem and helps you select your colors in advance.

The paint comes in two parts, a tube of coloring and a base paint in white or grey. Under this system you have 1,322 light shades and 648 dark shades from which to pick. In addition there are over two dozen off-white tones for that special job.

You buy the base paint and the color at the same time in a gallon, quart, pint or half-pint can. Should you run out of a special color, it is simple to purchase additional paint in any of the above quantities.

The tube of colorant is squeezed into the can of base paint and stirred for an even tone. The stirring is simplified

because the colorant has been ground in a fast-dispersing vehicle which permits quick mixing with the base paint.

The paint comes in flat, semi-gloss, enamel, floor enamel and outside house paint at prices that compare favorably with ready-mixed paint. You can also get an exact match in flat and glossy paints with this process. All the paints are washable.

(Q) I have my baby's bath-tubette in her room and I would like something to put up over it on the wall which is getting quite soiled.

(A) Try the colorless plastic sheets that are designed for use in back of the stove in the kitchen. That will keep the wall clean and will not be affected by heat or dampness.
