Dillin Says U. S. Propaganda 'Aims Too High'
"We talk about political science and a free press while the Russians are talking about bellies and backs," a Salem Chamber of Commerce speaker said Monday in contrasting U. S. and Soviet approaches to Middle East peoples.

Dr. Harry Dillin, president of Linfield College, McMinnville, gave the opinion that the Communists win their points more easily by appealing to individuals on the basis of their immediate concerns, their hopes for a better living.

Preaching was the process as one democratic principle can't mean much to masses of people who can't read, he declared. And primitive farmers without hand tools would be more impressed by hoes than tractors, by \$40 million dams, he added.

Reviewing his impressions of a tour of the Arabian League countries, the educator stated the belief that America's approach is "too big" and aimed at the princes rather than the paupers.

Dr. Dillin was introduced to the chamber luncheon audience at Hotel Senator by Guy Hickok, Salem banker and a trustee of the college.

Silverton Man Faces Total of Six Charges

Cecil T. Bradley, Silverton, was back in Marion County jail to face a sixth charge Monday, and his bond on the other five was withdrawn.

Bradley was arraigned Monday in Silverton justice court on a count of contributing to the delinquency of a minor, involving the alleged taking of a boy to Portland against his parent's wishes.

He asked for preliminary hearing, which will be set, and was committed to the jail in lieu of \$1,500 bail.

Trial on the first of the other five counts is set for Thursday in Circuit Court, that of larceny by bailee. Bradley allegedly sold a car owned by Robert K. Schunke, 924 N. Church St., but gave Schunke no return.

Bradley also was indicted last fall by the grand jury on charges of obtaining money by false pretenses, issuing a check without sufficient funds and two of larceny.

After the indictments were issued, he was released on a total of \$5,250 bail. When he was returned to jail yesterday, his bondsmen withdrew their bonds.

17 Bus Drivers Eligible for Safety Award

Arrest of two more men on charges linked to the recent wave of burglaries in Salem was reported Monday by city policemen.

Held in lieu of \$1,500 bail on a charge of taking several cases of beer from the Gideon Stolz Co. warehouse at 450 S. Summer St. was Bonnie Earl Salchenberg, 32, Springfield. Raymond Leroy Smith, 27, Salem, was released on \$500 bail following his arrest on a charge of receiving and concealing stolen property in the same case.

A reported admission by a man arrested earlier promised to clear the theft of \$330 from the Marion Feed and Seed Company.

City police said Salchenberg and Smith were involved in the theft of eight cases of beer from the Gideon Stolz Co. six weeks ago and of two cases the night of Jan. 14-15.

Marion County Deputy Sheriff Larry Wright said Monday that Gene Russell Rehberg had admitted breaking into the Seed Company and taking cash and cash register earlier this month. He also admitted using \$150 of the money to make a down payment on a used car which he wrecked near Oregon City, Wright said.

Rehberg is being held in the Linn County jail on a charge of obtaining money by false pretenses.

Meanwhile Ferdie L. Trumbly, 3208 Beacon Ave., and Jack Truxall, 818 N. Liberty St., appeared in Marion County District Court Monday on charges of burglary not in a dwelling involving theft of a safe from Wolganoff's Service Station, 1090 S. 12th St., Sunday morning.

Trumbly pleaded innocent of the charge and Truxall waived preliminary hearing and was bound over to the grand jury. Each is being held in lieu of \$2,000 bail.

State College Enrollment Drops 12.4%

PORTLAND (AP)—Enrollment at state colleges is down 12.4 per cent from the fall, a normal drop for winter term, the State Board of Higher Education reported Monday.

The enrollment is 11,938. Oregon State has 4,645, Oregon 4,058, Oregon College of Education 450, Southern Oregon 561, Eastern Oregon 432, Vanport 908, Dental School 306 and Medical School 551.

The board also approved course changes at the schools, including three for Oregon State over the protest of the University of Oregon. The university spokesmen said the changes encroached on major fields supposedly reserved for the university.

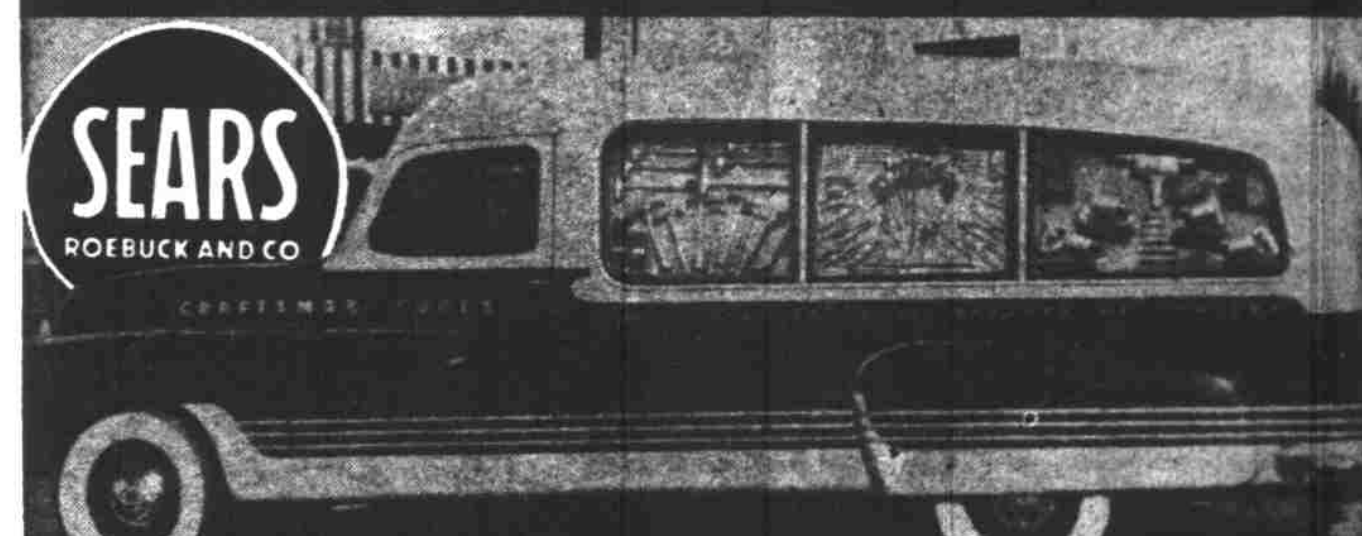
The fortune stems from the estate of their father, Donald B. McBride, a pioneer woolen mill operator and property owner who died several years ago.
