The most important clash of the Willamette Valley League basketball season to date falls Tuesday night at Molalla where the undefeated Dallas Dragons and ditto Indians go after undisputed loop leadership in their eight o'clock game.

The WVWL race started out to be a four-way chase involving Dallas, Molalla, Woodburn and Canby. But the latter two have fallen from the lofty perch and now only Budd Gronquist's range 1 in d.j.s and Gordy Kunkle's Dragons, the two teams picked to fight it out for the title in the beginning, are left with unblemished records.

Molalla has thus far defeated Mt. Angel, Sandy, Estacada, Silverton and Canby. Dallas victims have been Sandy, Silverton, Mt. Angel, Sandy and Woodburn.

Other league games Tuesday night put Canby at Woodburn, Mt. Angel at Silverton and Sandy at Estacada. All three could be doing donnybrooks, just as could the big one at Molalla.

Two of the league's foremost scorers will be face to face in the Molalla mix also. Jim Horton of the Indians has 71 points in his five games and Dallas Larry Cook has 61. Both aren't far behind league leader Jim Bowser of Estacada who has 75.

Other leading scorers are Woodburn's Len Pavlicek with 63, Molalla's Dave Hagen, Canby's Ed Perket and Silverton's Gaylen Stollenberg with 57 each. Mt. Angel's John Gorman with 52, Chuck Jepson, Dallas' huge 6-7 center, has 45 points.

The Governor McKay trophy goes to the lad named as the outstanding fighter of the evening, the youth picked as the top sportsman is to receive the Earl Newberry cup and the Walter Pearson trophy will go to the victor in the main event. Morris Rogoway, Portland jeweler, also is putting up a cup.

In addition each winner will receive a cup and to each loser will go a bronze glove chain.

Each bout will consist of three two-minute rounds.

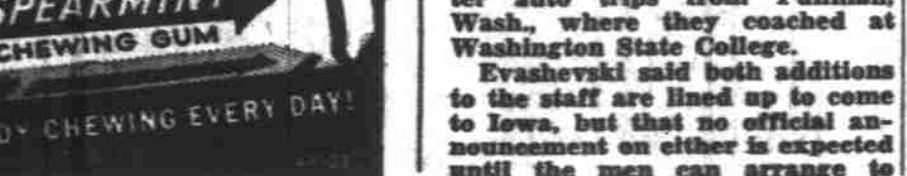

Evashevski Still Seeks Elliott

ROWA CITY, Ia. (AP)—Forest Evashevski, new Iowa head football coach, said Monday he expects to make two additions to his varsity football coaching staff. The new coach and Bob Flora are present staff members.

Both Evashevski and Flora, with their families, arrived in Iowa City late Sunday night after auto trips from Pullman, Wash., where they coached at Washington State College.

Evashevski said both additions to the staff are lined up to come to Iowa, but that no official announcement on either is expected until the men can arrange to leave the jobs they now hold.

Evashevski confirmed earlier reports that he had asked Chalmers (Bump) Elliott, backfield coach at Oregon State College and former Michigan star, to be one of those on the new Iowa staff.

He said Elliott had shown great interest in the offer, but wouldn't say whether he had yet decided to take the job.

Evashevski also said he had not talked with Bump's brother, Pete Elliott, line assistant at Oklahoma. He intimated that as yet Pete Elliott has not been considered for a post at Iowa.

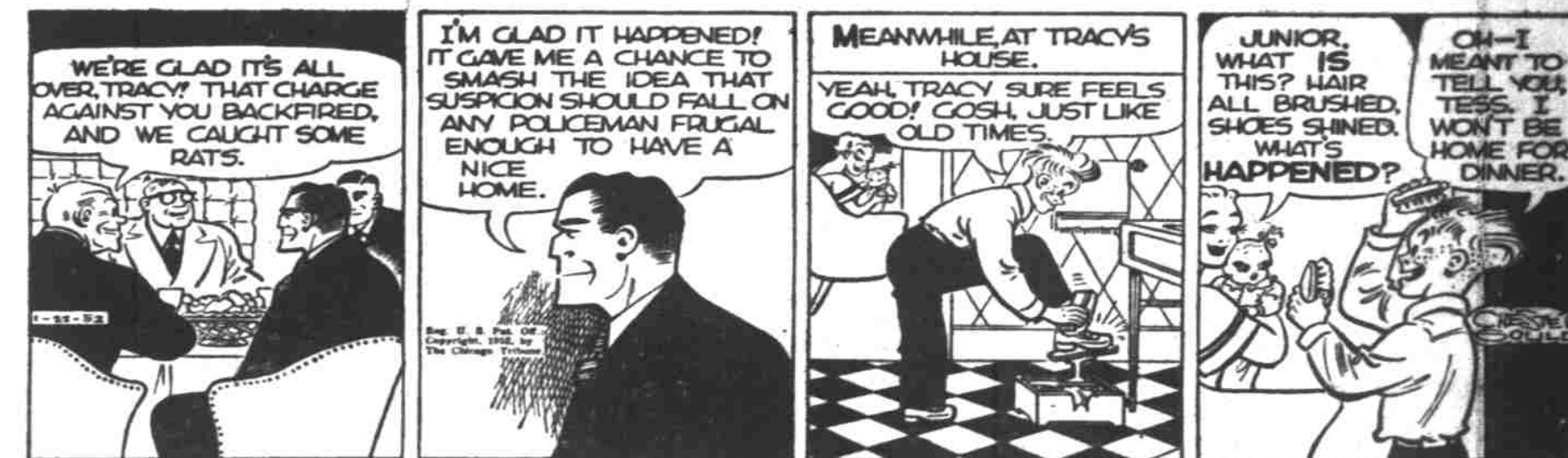
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
