Sanding Crews Kept Busy in County, Salem

When the sandman cometh these snowy or freezing nights, he is most likely driving a city, county or state sanding truck.

As roads become icy or snow packed, sanding crews are out day and night sprinkling hills, curves and busy city streets with sand or finely crushed gravel.

In Salem the regular street-cleaning crews become, when needed, sanding crews. They are called out by Supt. J. E. (Jake) Wright who in turn works under City Engineer J. Harold Davis. The street division works in cooperation with city police in these projects.

Salem areas needing most attention when ice or snow comes include the Candalaria and Fairmount Hill sections. And the "quarter inch minus" rock also is spread at potentially dangerous intersections.

These include Fairgrounds Road corners, South 12th and State Streets, and many downtown intersections.

County Crews
Also busy these days are Marion County sanding crews. County Commissioner Roy Rice said the crews are called out whenever needed. They operate under Road Foreman Frank Wolke. Information on needed sanding comes from patrolling Sheriff's Deputies, residing near danger areas and county patrols.

A danger spot near Salem for county crews is the South 12th Street Hill. Bad road conditions appear at various other points in the county without much pattern, said Rice, depending on wind and weather conditions.

State Crews
Several of the State Highway Department's 135 section crews operate in the Salem area. They operate with a huge 9-yard sanding trucks, or with small trucks towing sanding units behind them.

Worst trouble spot here for state crews are the approaches to the West Salem Bridge over the Willamette River. And state crews sand state highway routes through Salem — although sometimes they are given an assist by Salem city crews, according to E. A. Collier, in charge of state maintenance crews. He is assisted by F. W. Farrar.

In addition to the fine crushed rock state crews also use concrete sand, salt and also "cinders," a sort of crushed lava rock dug from the ground near Santiam Junction. On heavily snowed roads, like the Silver Falls Loop Highway, crews either plow off the snow or just gravel danger points such as curves, grades and intersections.

City Election Forms Ready

Filing instructions and petition forms for the coming city election are now ready for distribution at the City Hall office of City Recorder Alfred Mundt.

Officers to be voted on by Salem electors at the May 16 primary are mayor, treasurer, municipal judge and aldermen from Wards 1, 3, 5 and 7.

Names of candidates must be filed with the recorder before petitions are circulated. Separate petitions must be used for the signatures of the petitioners by precincts. A specified number of precincts must be represented in the signatures, depending on the office sought.

For aldermen 50 signers are required, for the other offices 200. Completed petitions must be checked by the county clerk before being returned to the city recorder whose deadline for accepting them is April 1.

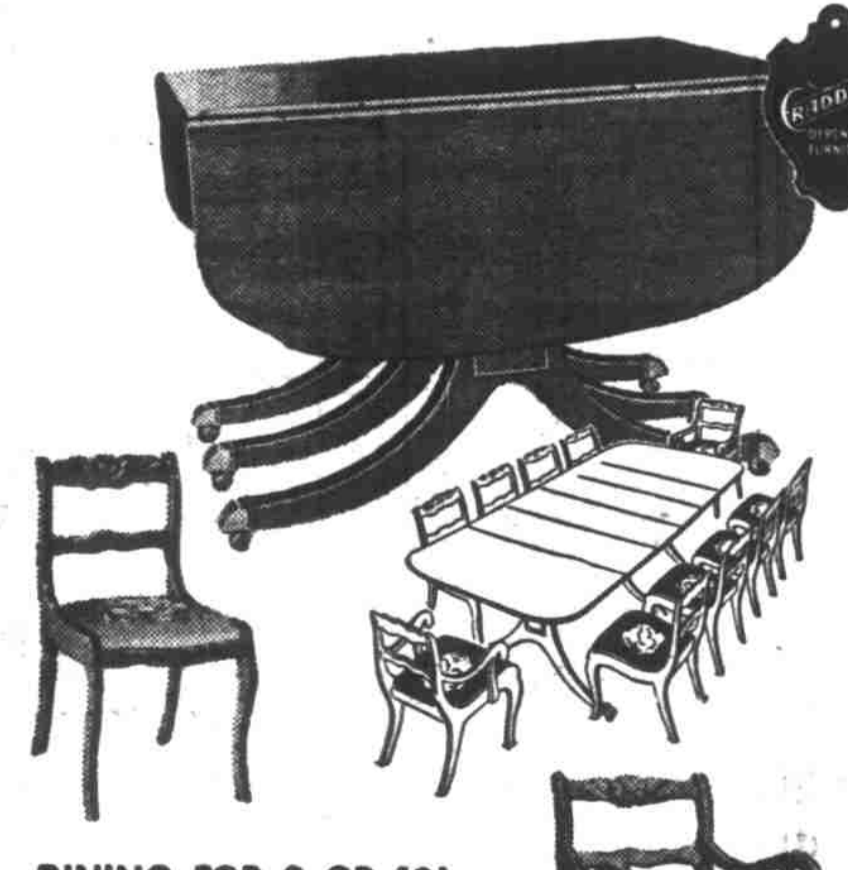

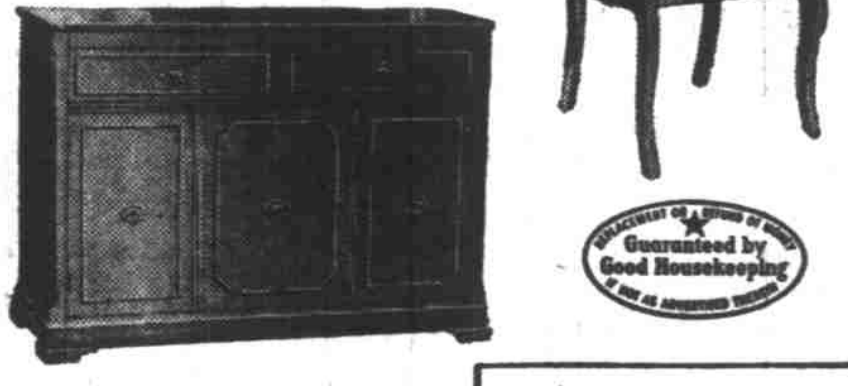
