

Newbury Files for Reelection; Morgan Seeks Delegate Post

Secretary of State Earl T. Newbury late Thursday filed for reelection, thus becoming the first official candidate for the office. The Ashland Republican was appointed secretary of state Nov. 8, 1947, by ex-Gov. John H. Hall, to succeed the late Robert S. Farrell, who was killed in an airplane crash. Newbury was elected to the office in 1948.

In Ashland Newbury operates two large pear orchards and a processing plant. Prior to his appointment as secretary of state he served two terms in the State Senate from Jackson County. Possible support for Sen. Este Ketauer's bid for the Democratic nomination for President came with the filing of Howard Morgan, Monmouth rancher and legislator, for delegate to the Democratic National Convention from the state at large.

The former chairman of the Young Democrats said, "It appears likely that President Truman will permit the Democratic nomination for President to go to a younger man, and I believe that man should be Senator Estes Ketauer."

Morgan denied reports he would be a candidate for state treasurer. In 1950 Morgan was a candidate for state Labor Commissioner and in losing polled 40,000 more votes than the statewide Democratic ticket. He served in the House of Representatives in the 1949 Legislature, and previously served as chairman of the Oregon Farmers Union.

Others who have filed for delegate to the Democratic National Convention from the state at large include Monroe Sweetland, national committeeman from Oregon; C. Girard Davidson, and State Treasurer Walter J. Pearson, all of Portland.

Announcing her candidacy for Democratic National Committee woman from Oregon was Margaret Cawood of Portland. District Attorney C. E. Luckey of Lane County, a Republican, filed for reelection.

Meanwhile David O'Hara, head of the State Elections Bureau, warned that the deadline for filing for primary elections is March 7. He said filings are coming slower than in previous election years, and predicted the usual eleventh hour congestion. Filings for delegate to the national conventions probably would be more numerous than for many years, he said.

Immediately following the deadline date O'Hara said he would start compiling the voters pamphlet which must be in the mails 15 days prior to the primary election. Copies of the pamphlet must be sent to every registered voter in the state.

Certification of candidates to the county clerks also is on O'Hara's primary election agenda.

Unemployment Claims Higher

Current claims for state unemployment compensation filed in Marion and Polk counties are far more than those of a year ago, the State Unemployment Compensation Commission reported Thursday.

A total of 3,470 claims were filed in the Salem office last week, an increase of 48 per cent over the same week in 1951. Last week's figures, however, were still below the high claim periods of 1949 and 1950.

The recent claims boost is attributed by UCC officials to a slackening off of the important construction, food processing and lumber industries. Unemployed workers from these industries accounted for nearly 75 per cent of last week's claims.

Declines in Oregon's seasonal industries in the past four months, on a state-wide basis, have resulted in a decrease of more than 50,000 non-farm workers, the commission reported.

Klamath Falls Man Confesses To Slaying Wife With Knife

KLAMATH FALLS (AP)—A Klamath Falls man whose slashed wife died in his arms last Saturday pleaded guilty Thursday to stabbing her to death.

LeRoy Plant appeared in court without an attorney. He will be sentenced Jan. 28.

The bizarre slaying came to light after Plant called police Wednesday from his apartment. Officers found the body of Luella Plant, 48, on the floor.

Plant first said he had no memory of events in the previous four days. But District Attorney D. E. Van Vactor said Plant later told this story:

He and his wife had quarreled a number of times in the past and Mrs. Plant had twice started divorce action. They were attempting to patch up their latest quarrel Saturday when an argument broke out over payment of bills.

He said Mrs. Plant hit him over the head "with a bottle or something."

"I got up from the kitchen table reached into a cabinet drawer, pulled a hunting knife out of a scabbard and stabbed her twice."

"I held her on my right arm and she said she loved me. She said a prayer and asked me to look after the bills. She died quickly."

He then slept—from Saturday night to Wednesday—sometimes beside the body and sometimes in another room, he said.

His wrists and chest were wounded in what Van Vactor said were half-hearted suicide attempts. Mrs. Plant is survived by a son, by a previous marriage, Alvin R. Himes of St. Helens, Ore.

Polio March By Mothers Set Thursday

"Mothers March on Polio," the final phase of the current March of Dimes campaign, will be from 7 to 8 p. m. Thursday.

Using a slogan of "Turn on Your Light; Fight Polio Tonight," some 2,000 women throughout the county will call at lighted houses during the one hour period to pick up final collections in the polio fund drive.

Details of the campaign were announced at a meeting of more than 100 women, heading the drive, held Thursday night at the Salem Women's Club. Mrs. Grant C. Rogers, county chairman for the Mothers March outlined the plans. Mayor Alfred Loucks also spoke to the leaders on what a campaign such as this means to a community.

A film of successful Mothers March in Phoenix, Ariz., last year was shown.

Thursday night's meeting was attended by county leaders, captains and lieutenants, who will supervise the 2,000 women in the county doing the collecting next week.

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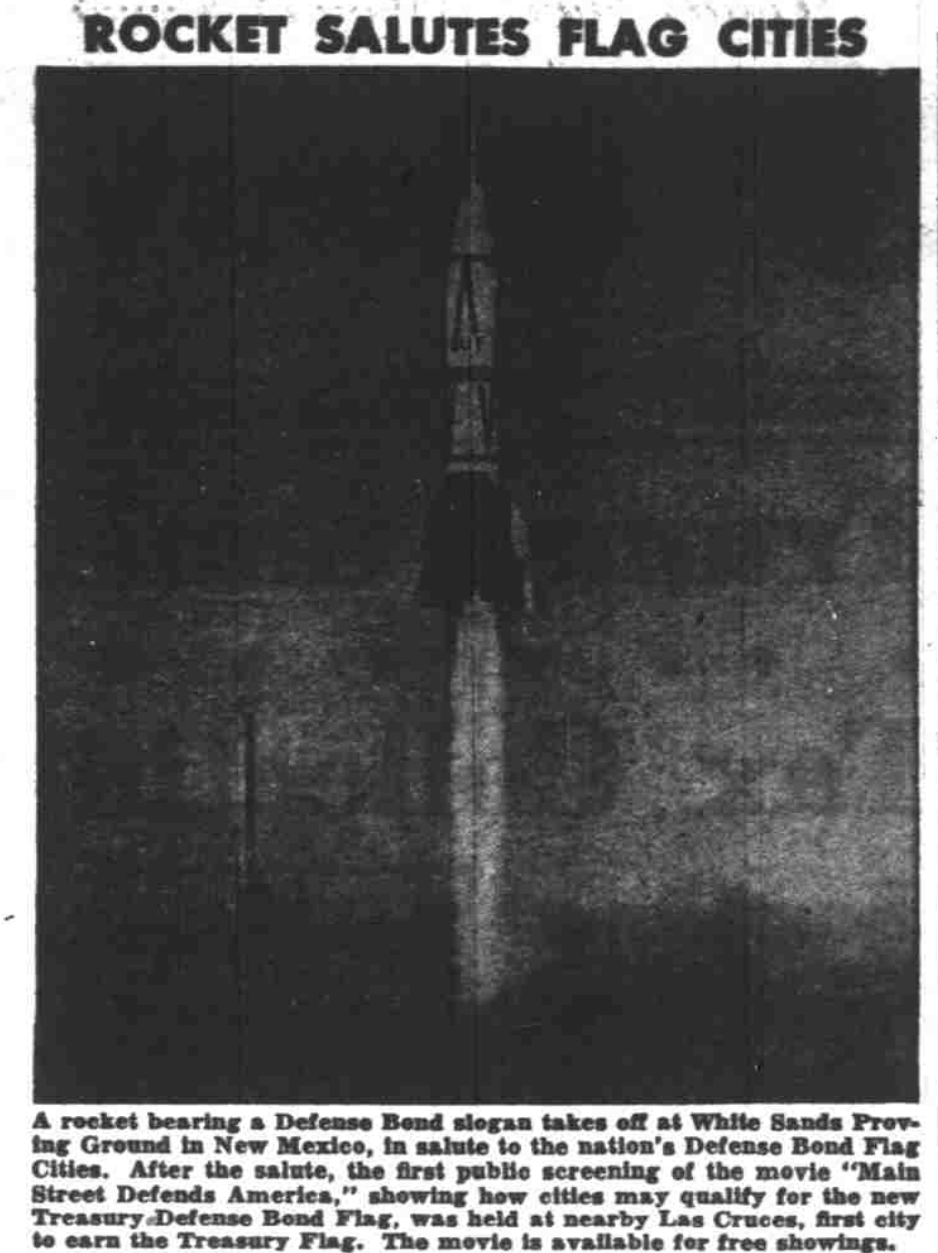
