THE RETURN OF THE HIGH BACK CHAIR

Husbands are most likely to complain—that there isn't a chair in the house to lean back in. There often isn't if all the chairs are contemporary and have been bought in the past decade or two. Actually, it was a long time ago that styles changed from the baronial hall style of furniture that included near-thrones, and except on a few modernized wing chairs, there have been almost no chair backs that are high enough for a head to rest against. But the high back chair is on its way back. Some of the best designers plan this kind of comfort in their new furniture, in arm chairs that are wood or fully upholstered. Here are three of them, a tall wood chair by T. H. Robsjohn-Gibbings with a curved back and a deeply upholstered seat, a wood arm chair by Paul McCobb that has both an upholstered seat and back, and Edward R. Wormley's foam rubber upholstered special for tall men. The high back chair blesses a room with more comfort for the rangier members of the family, and it may also be a decorating help in breaking the monotony of too many pieces of furniture at the same height.

Buying for Your Home

Variety Keynotes Home Furnishings New Ideas, Market, Moderate Prices

Dozens of new creations are coming on the market. For the first time in more than a decade, there's a lot of new ideas on the market—cheap. There's always been novel ideas and excellent workmanship for custom made furnishings, but this year you will find them moderately priced too.

In general the modern groups are softer in line and traditional styles are interpreted so they will harmonize pleasantly with modern. Informality is the keynote of most since today's American home is far less formal than it has been in many generations.

Our native designers have experimented with combinations of materials such as wrought iron and wood, glass or plastic. Woven fibers and even woven cellophane appear in chairs and occasional pieces. Fine wood grains are used for their own attractiveness and often contrasting shades are combined for a pattern. Cherry wood is used with pine, walnut or other woods.

Modern pieces appear in fluid form, sculptured and dramatic effects. With more openness in the home, there are room dividers to separate dining and living areas. These usually contain spacious storage units. Occasional and dining chairs have been made in many styles for low bracket incomes. The Japanese influence appears in low, simple furniture and in such finishes as black lacquer and light mahogany.

The mar-proof finishes in furniture and the new high style plastic topped tables are news in living rooms. One new drop-front desk is lined with plastic so it can double for a bar. Other multiple use items include foam rubber upholstered benches to be grouped for beds and a bookcase that can stand tall or low depending on what side it is placed.

Charles Stoll has designed his new collection with an eye to the young couples who have temporary quarters while waiting

for larger apartments or permanent homes. You can build up your living room set like open china from his collection of upholstered pieces with various sized units and arm rest styles. He has a new pouf chair with a plump seat resembling a large pin cushion, a lyre-backed chair in a modern free-form version and a scallop-edged hassock chair with curved back.

Italian

There is an Italian influence apparent in his group of smooth lined upholstered back and arms with turned-wood legs and arm supports. Stoll also caters to the homemaker who likes substantial shoulder-high supports in lounge chairs. He has raised some of his pieces from the floor on wood bases to allow for easy cleaning.

Charles Eames has a new series of chairs in a shaped wire shell shape, supporting resilient upholstery. There are styles for reading, writing, dining and relaxing. To his plastic group of previous seasons, Eames has added a new swivel desk chair with a wooden base.

George Nelson has designed a new group of angle-iron tables with hard plastic tops for a practical note. The group includes a serving table on casters, Nelson's sectional cabinets are being offered in units of oak, replacing the primavera of former seasons.

Those who prefer early-American will like the group designed by Mrs. P. A. Patton and William Lemmon Beard in maple. Interiors are built for maximum storage and double duty service.

Russel Wright has a new TV cabinet, upholstered arm and side chairs and a drop-front desk. Harvey Prober has an all mahogany collection of functional and flexible modern case pieces that can be stacked and used in a variety of ways.

Typical of the use of free form designs is a new free form mirror shown with a 58-inch dresser with three recessed drawers, the top of the dresser matching the mirror shape. The wood is slightly pink tone finished oak and the piece is by C. E. Waltman.
