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Variations in Military Costs Rate Inquiry

WASHINGTON (AP) — A House subcommittee will begin hearings next month to investigate a reported "triple standard" in the prices which military services pay for their supplies.

Paul Monahan, subcommittee investigator, said he has uncovered numerous instances where the prices paid by the armed services for identical articles vary from pennies to dollars.

The inquiry is linked to a bill introduced by Rep. Anderson (R-Calif.) calling for a single supply catalog for the military establishment "to promote more economical and efficient use of the nation's resources."

Hearings are scheduled to begin around Feb. 4 when, it is expected, the full committee will have completed hearings on universal military training.

Monahan told a reporter the services spend "millions of extra dollars" each year in paying varied prices and in maintaining elaborate and separate catalogs.

He said on some electronics contracts, the military pays four different prices to manufacturers. The rates vary for Army, Navy, Air Force and Signal Corps, he said.

Superforts Bomb Field At Yalu River

SEOUL, Korea (AP) — U. S. Superforts flew far into Northwest Korea Saturday night and dumped 70 tons of bombs on Sinanju in their first attack on this fighter base just across the Yalu River from Manchuria.

Reconnaissance planes recently spotted more than 60 propeller type aircraft on the Sinanju field. The seven attacking Superforts ran into moderate ground fire, but the Air Force said they all returned safely to their bases in Japan. No Communist fighter planes appeared.

There were no jet battles in Korea Saturday.

YWCA to Start Building Drive Again in Spring

Fund soliciting for a new Salem YWCA Building will be revived early this spring.

The aim is a start on construction before the year is out, it was stated Saturday by Mrs. A. A. Schramm, YWCA president.

To make construction possible, at least \$200,000 is needed, she said, in addition to the \$200,000 now on hand for the building project.

Public fund raising started in 1946, has since been supplemented by bequests and interest on investment of the building fund.

Under the construction plan a larger, modern building on the site of the present YW, 768 State St., would permit greater service to young women of the Salem area and would alleviate the overcrowding of present YW activity, said Mrs. Schramm.

For the new fund campaign, A. C. Hagg, prominent Salem businessman, will be general chairman. A committee of 50 men and 50 women interested in the YWCA will solicit for the needed contributions.

The drive will start March 28 and continue five weeks, under present plans. C. A. Kells, executive of the Salem Community Chest, will help supervise the campaign, through arrangement with the Chest board of directors.

Community Chest does not raise funds for capital expansion of the agencies it supports in normal operations, but the Chest can help in an advisory way, said Kells Saturday. The YW is one of eight Salem agencies sharing in Chest funds.

Slogan for the fund campaign, reports Chairman Haag, will be "Let's Finish the Job."

Mrs. Schramm will be associate chairman of the campaign. Mrs. Frank H. Spears and Mrs. Floyd L. Utter will lead the women's division. Mrs. James T. Brand is chairman for the speakers' committee. Gardner Knapp and Mrs. Bruce Pickett are in charge of publicity.

Have Gymnasium The proposed YWCA building would have a gymnasium which the present building lacks. Other recreation rooms would be larger and more numerous, to meet the demands of YW classes and other activities plus the Salem need for more public meeting places. Dormitory facilities would house 55
