

# U.S. Trades Atom Secrets With Canada

WASHINGTON (AP)—Chairman Gordon Dean of the Atomic Energy Commission disclosed Monday night that an exchange of atomic secrets "beneficial to the United States" has been carried out with Canada.

He did not say what information was involved. Speculation immediately arose that the exchange might involve information on Canada's famed "heavy water" reactor—described as the most advanced design in that field of atomic research—for use on this country's H-bomb project.

Dean said an "interchange" of information with Canada has been made in the last few weeks—the first with any country since the U. S. Atomic Energy Act was amended last year to permit a somewhat less restricted exchange of atomic data with "friendly nations."

# Maybank to Back Russell As Nominee

WASHINGTON (AP)—Political crossfires grew hotter Monday as Sen. Maybank (D-SC) came out against another term for President Truman, and Gen. Douglas MacArthur called for the election of a skilled "civil" leader in November.

Withdrawing his own name from the New Hampshire presidential primary, Gen. MacArthur expressed his view that the country's voters should elect a President of demonstrated capability in the science of civil government.

# Partial Ban On D Street Parking Voted

(Council news also on Page 1.) Parking was forbidden on the north side of D street from Capitol to 21st Streets by action of the City Council Monday night.

Alderman accepted recommendations from police and city manager to make the new parking restriction, plus a no-parking ban on the south side of the street between Capitol and 14th Streets from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m.

Traffic congestion on narrow D Street was reported from activity at adjacent Salem High School and heavy travel from suburbs east of the city.

The city will this week ask the State Highway Commission to allow the widening of Fairgrounds Road, on the east side of the Safe-way store 200 feet north. This was recommended by Alderman David O'Hara in order to restore for business houses there parking which was eliminated in the establishment of the new traffic plan.

City Manager J. L. Franzen said the city's plan to widen the west side of the same street is held up during right-of-way negotiations at present. O'Hara and Mayor Alfred Loucks said they would interview some of the property owners there.

A loading zone was established by removing two parking meter spaces in front of 320 Chemeketa Street, at the request of Capitol Hardware and Furniture Co. which has no alley at its new store on Commercial and Chemeketa Street.

Recent parking restrictions on Columbia Street will be re-studied, Mayor Alfred Loucks said after the Council heard objections from Mrs. Mike Steinbock, 1235 Columbia St., that parking of cars across the street from her home made difficult the access from street to her driveway.

Also taken under study by the alderman was a protest street paving assessment of \$485 against Ray Rabeneau whose Cascade drive acreage lies off Longview Way which was recently paved.

Aldermen denied a fortune teller's license to Kelley Steve who applied for a permit for the period Feb. 1 to April 11.

Laid on the table were several license bills and a bill to incorporate into city law the appropriate provisions of the Knox state liquor law. City Manager J. L. Franzen will study proposed license increases in the pending bills, reported the mayor, and the measures are not due for reconsideration until one of the Council calls for them.

Alderman Thomas Armstrong said he wanted to make a study of the liquor bill before final action is voted.

Guests of the Council during part of the meeting were several former mayors who earlier in the evening had been entertained by Mayor Loucks and former mayor W. W. Chadwick. Other former mayors present were Douglas McKay, R. L. Elstrom, V. E. Kuhns, Harley O. White, Walter Keyes.

# Wall Scorched In Apartment

City firemen late Monday night were called to a fire in an apartment at 303 S. Winter St., where one kitchen wall was badly charred.

# Rainmakers May Possibly Bring Drought

NEW YORK (AP)—Our rainmakers in the West may overdo it and get less rain.

This possibility of regional disaster was proposed to the American Meteorological Society Monday by E. J. Workman of the New Mexico Institute of Mining and Technology. The situation is serious enough, he said, to justify testing.

Dr. Workman threw figurative cold water on rainmaking in the Southwest, where he has been one of the pioneers for four years, and where the most sensational claims of big rain have been made.

The silver iodide smokes of New Mexico, Arizona and California have been reported as probably causing rain all the way across the South to the Atlantic, and possibly a drought in Southern Colorado.

"The enthusiasm with which we started about four years ago has not been sustained," said Dr. Workman. "Our simple field experiments have been inconclusive for the most part."

"I want to consider whether some rainmaking procedures might be expected to decrease rather than increase precipitation in the Southwest."

# Alexander to Plan Defense Of England

LONDON (AP)—Field Marshal Viscount Alexander, former governor general of Canada and one of Britain's most famous soldiers, was named Tuesday to take over the post of minister of defense from Prime Minister Winston Churchill.

Lord Alexander will take over the Defense Ministry on March 1. In the meantime, Churchill himself will continue to hold the post. Churchill returned to London Tuesday from his visits to Washington and Ottawa.

The 60-year-old hero of World War II, whose grand strategy paved the way for the defeat of the Axis in North Africa, retired from the governor generalship of Canada after holding that position for six years. He was replaced by Vincent Massey, the first Canadian ever to represent the British crown in Ottawa.

# Fatal Accident Brings Fine, Prison Term

ROSEBURG (AP)—James E. Phillips, after pleading guilty to charges of negligent homicide and failure to stop at the scene of an accident, was sentenced Monday to eight years in prison and fined \$6,000.

Circuit Judge Carl E. Whimberly sentenced 21-year-old Phillips to three years and fined him \$2,000 on the negligent homicide charge. The remainder of the sentence was imposed on the second charge.

The prison terms are to run consecutively and the fines may be worked out at the rate of \$20 a day.

Phillips admitted he was the driver of an automobile that fatally injured Paul M. Van Osten, 5, two miles south of Myrtle Creek on Saturday.

# Spring Holds Sway in State

Spring-like weather continues to hold back the winter throughout the Willamette Valley and most of Western Oregon.

The Weather Bureau again predicts a temperature of 54, and forecasts tonight's low to be 49. Monday's low was just barely above freezing, however, 32.2 at 7:30 a. m., but the mercury climbed up to a high of 53.

# Street Light Breaker Fined

SILVERTON—George Hopkins of Silverton was fined \$55 Monday in Silverton municipal court for destruction of public property in connection with the breaking of 12 street lights a week ago.

Judge Kenneth Brown gave Hopkins a seven-day suspended sentence and ordered him to make restitution to the city for the damage.

John Doe warrant has been issued for a second man believed involved in the affair.

Opening with My Heart Ever Faithful by Bach, Mme. Nikolaidi won her listeners instantly, and held their attention through the rather unfamiliar program. Following the

Especially fine was her Standchen by Strauss, and the Aria, Bel raggio lusinghier from Rossini's "Semiramide."

Magnificently done was the modern group in English, At Nightfall by Berg, The Nurse's Song by Britten and Deems Taylor's May-Day Carol. Three Greek folksongs, Neranzula and Duranduru and an unnamed encore were obvious favorites with the singer.

The short but effective Moorish Handkerchief and Seguidilla by de Falla were followed by the ever-popular Habanera from Carmen, in which the singer had full opportunity to use her vocal talents and her flashing dark eyes.

Encores were Trout by Schubert, Brahms Lullaby, in which the singer excelled, and a Spanish folksong by Abradors.

Mme. Nikolaidi's voice is soft, with velvet-smoothness yet strong and full. She has an unusual stage personality and her dark coloring and handsome appearance makes her a singer who instantly wins her audience.

Jan Behr, accompanist, played a group of five Sonatas and Ballade by Chopin, followed by a Schumann number, Bird as a Prophet.
