

Cancellation of Deed Affirmed By High Court

A Marion County Circuit Court decision for cancellation of a deed in connection with an earlier court judgment was affirmed Wednesday by the State Supreme Court.

This was in the case of Jack L. Evans, Salem, against Pearl and James A. Trude of Springfield. Defendants had appealed from a verdict by Circuit Judge Rex Klimm.

Evans had won a \$40,234 judgment against Dale Trude in the original suit for damage, to compensate for injuries suffered in an auto-motorcycle crash. The later decree, which was appealed, ordered sale of Trude's half interest in real property, with proceeds to be applied against the judgment.

It ordered cancellation of Trude's deed to the appellants, his parents.

"This case is a record of cruel and callous disregard for the mandates of justice and an inexcusable evasion of moral responsibility," Justice Harold J. Warner wrote.

Warner referred to the "craven and hasty flight" of Dale Trude from Oregon to escape any possible contribution for his acts of negligence, which resulted in permanent injuries to Evans.

The opinion said that fraud and chicanery were practiced by appellants with connivance of their son, Dale, to prevent recovery of judgment.

Justice Warner wrote that the plaintiff probably would not recover much from the decree since Trude's interest in the real property was small and would be reduced by the mortgage debt, expenses of the trial and appeal to the supreme court.

Heart Shocked Back to Life After 1 1/2 Hours

CHICAGO (AP)—Doctors at Presbyterian Hospital reported Wednesday that they shocked a student nurse back to normal life with electricity after her heart had quit beating for an hour and 45 minutes.

A jolt of 110 volts was sent directly through her exposed heart after three doctors took turns "milking" it by hand to keep her blood circulating through her body.

The nurse, 21 year old Darline Timke, said she suffered from temporary amnesia after the operation which had started out to be only minor nose surgery.

The machine used in shocking the heart is called a defibrillator. There are only a few in existence and only a few recorded cases of its use.

Rotary Hears Former India Missionary

"A family on relief in the United States lives in the lap of luxury compared to an employed person in India, Dr. Morris K. Crothers advised the Salem Rotarians Wednesday.

Understanding of the poverty in India is of prime importance before Americans can hope to reach the "gospel of moral and ethical reason to these people," Crothers pressed.

Like Sir Wilfred Grenfell in Labrador, with whom the doctor once was associated, missionaries for religion or medicine must realize that the people of remote importance to people who are hungry, he said.

Dr. Crothers, who worked in the Presbyterian medical mission near Delhi, India, came to Salem in 1946. He said that Americans should realize that the Indian concept of religion is closely akin to the way of life in that country.

One of the basic difficulties in making the people of India feel a need for change is that these people believe in a transmigration of the soul and reincarnation. With this in mind these people feel they have been "born into their caste and must stay there. Possibly in the next life they will be more fortunate.

Further, Indians in power are not anxious to accept the American way of life, he said.

Dr. Crothers suggested a "help others to help themselves" philosophy in dealings with India. He declared that the U. S. government seems to be supporting governments merely because they oppose communism," although their leaders may be loath to risk their own security by backing democracy.

While a resident of Joliet she was a teacher of dramatic arts in a conservatory of music and Noble Grand of Rebekas. In Salem she was a member of St. Mark's Lutheran Church.

Survivors include the widow, Henry Christman; a daughter, Miss Audrey Christman, and a son, Clyde S. Christman, both of Salem, and a brother, Elmer Sallie, Joliet.

Valley Group to Inspect Trade Opportunities in Guatemala

A group of Willamette Valley men and women left Salem Wednesday for Guatemala to investigate trade opportunities between Central America and the United States.

Announced purpose of the group is promotion of good relations between the areas and development of trade through a proposed Guatemalan corporation. Trade emphasis will be placed on the Northwest, leaders said.

Leader of the group is a native Nicaraguan, Dr. Roberto M. Hooker, former instructor in Spanish language and Latin American History at Pacific University in Forest Grove.

Salem members of the group are Robert M. Laws, C. Felix French and Mr. and Mrs. Ronald F. Waring.

Three Sweet Home logging brothers, Loten, Everett and Samuel Tyler, and a Woodburn sawmill operator, Ernest Livesay, are also in the group. Portland members of the group are James McKenzie and Mrs. Dorothy Wooley. Delmer Pick of Toledo and one Seattle man, William Burlew, joined the group.

Laws and Robinson are Salem insurance representatives. French is a Salem musician and former businessman, Waring recently resigned from The Statesman reporting staff, and his wife, Avis, was with the State Tax Commission in the research division.

Dr. Hooker is a member of various international groups for promotion of inter-American relations and is an unofficial representative of Guatemala in the United States. He received his doctorate in law at the University of Leon in Nicaragua and attended Moravian College at Bethlehem, Pa. He has taught in Nicaragua and served three years at Pacific University.

Leaders said the group plans to investigate logging, export-import and various other forms of business in Central America.

Flood Damage Eases in Ohio

PORTSMOUTH, O. (AP) — The crest of a weakened Ohio River flood crept towards this South-Central Ohio city Wednesday night but left most of the damage seen along the first half of the river's 981-mile length.

Comparatively light damage was foreseen in the remaining 625 miles before the Ohio empties into the Mississippi at Cairo, Ill., as plunging temperature clipped several feet off projected crests.

BRITAIN TO MOVE FLEET
LONDON (AP) — Britain's home fleet will join the Royal Navy's Mediterranean fleet at Malta in March for combined exercises, the admiralty announced Wednesday night. No explanation was included in the announcement, but it was understood the sea order was prompted by Britain's concern over the still tense situation in Egypt.
