Stalled Train Passenger Pays Visit to Salem as Demonstrator

One thing about a stalled train, says Mrs. Madge Little, you meet the nicest people.

Mrs. Little was one of the 222 persons who spent four days recently in a snow-stalled train in the high Sierras. Not only that but she was one of a limited number of passengers who got gassed.

"I wouldn't want to go through that experience again," she said speaking of being snow-trapped. "But I am sort of glad that I had the experience. It was a wonderful test in character and human relations."

Little Mrs. Little is the home economist for the American Dry Milk Institute, a trade association of dry milk manufacturers. She travels around the country giving demonstrations on how to make good things from dry milk.

She was in Salem Wednesday after spending a day demonstrating her technique to cooks and helpers in the Salem public school system.

When Mrs. Little left Chicago

earlier this month she took the ill-fated City of San Francisco streamliner, which was blocked by snow high in the Donner Pass north of San Francisco late Sunday morning, Jan. 13. Most of the passengers and crew, she said, took it all as a lark. Food was low but plenty of coffee was on hand.

But by Monday afternoon the heat in the cars was turned off and passengers and crew felt the seriousness of the situation.

"I went to bed that night in my compartment," says Mrs. Little. "I woke up once feeling a little dizzy. The next thing I knew someone was holding my head and pouring coffee down my throat."

"I and most of the passengers in our car were overcome by fumes from an emergency gas generator."

By Wednesday, the passengers were taken off by private auto to a nearby lodge. Later they were placed on another train.

From then on, says Mrs. Little

the excitement really started. Men who had held themselves stoically erect throughout the emergency suddenly broke down. At every stop on the way San Francisco reporters, photographers and well-wishing strangers crowded the cars or lined the tracks.

And Mrs. Little even appeared on a television show. Someone in Alabama saw the show and wrote her a nice letter of encouragement. A California newspaper described her as "a cheerful woman."

Major Wood Advanced in 51st Jet Wing

51ST FIGHTER INTERCEPTOR WING, Korea—The Japan-based detachment of the 51st Fighter Interceptor Wing's maintenance and supply group has gained a new executive officer, Maj. Thomas M. Wood, Salem, Ore.

Wood replaced Lt. Col. Roger B. Ludeman, Wichita, Kan., who moved up to become group commander.

The supply group gives logistical support to combat units of the 51st flying daily interceptor missions in the famous "Mig Alley." To date the "Fighting 51st" has destroyed 19 Mig's and damaged 26 more.

Maj. Wood entered the U. S. Air Force in May, 1942 and spent the remainder of World War II at McChord Air Force Base, Wash. He was deputy U. S. property and disbursing officer for the State of Oregon until his recall to active duty in March 1951.

Maj. Wood has served in Korea and Japan since August, 1951. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Timothy Wood of Oswego, Route 1. His wife, Mary, and their two children, Kathleen Ann, 7, and Thomas, Jr., 4, reside at 1185 N. 25th St., Salem.

Prohibition Ballot Title Hit in Appeal

Appeal was filed in the State Supreme Court Thursday attacking the short ballot title for an initiative measure filed Jan. 14 prohibiting the sale of alcoholic liquor containing more than one-half of one per cent alcohol by volume.

Importation of liquor, except for medicinal purposes, also is prohibited, and this can be sold only on prescription of a licensed physician.

Attack on the short ballot title was filed by the Blitz-Weinhard Brewing Company of Portland which contends it is confusing and does not set out plainly the proposal before the voters.

The initiative measure was filed by Ralph Elmo Shannahan and others of Portland.
