State Juvenile Fishing Program Ready

PORTLAND (AP)—The State Game Commission said Thursday it has a set of regulations to govern establishing of fishing areas for boys and girls of Oregon.

The provision for juvenile angling areas was included in a law passed by the last Legislature. It restricts fishing in the areas to children under 14.

The commission expects a good many inquiries for the projects since they are the type attractive to civic groups.

But the commission said it would approve an area only after a responsible sponsoring group arranges fishing supervision. There must be enough children in the area to make the undertaking worthwhile and there should be no other fishing area in the region a which children can use freely.

Game Director P. W. Schneider said that preference will be given to establishing such warm-water fish as perch, bass, and bluegill which do not require constant restocking. Ponds will be given preference to streams in setting up areas, he said. Ten already are under consideration.

Until now Oregon's only children's stream, limited to them by law, has been Mill Creek in Salem. Some communities also have set up fishing areas for children and adults have stayed away to give the youngsters a break. Washington State now has 36 juvenile fishing areas.

Billiard Meet Deadline Near

All cue enthusiasts interested in participating in the City Billiard Tourney are warned that deadline for registrations is Sunday night. Entries can be made at the B and B Bowling courts, site of the tourney which will open its regular run Monday.

Tom Wood, director of the table meet, expects a field of around 40 in the pocket billiard division of the tourney and possibly 30 in the snooker category. A number of entries are expected from surrounding towns in the valley.

All entries must play a 150-point game to qualify for the affair. Handicaps will be determined by the preliminary play.

Moss Eyes Whitworth

SPOKANE (AP)—Perry Moss, an assistant football coach at the University of Washington and a former star quarterback at Illinois, has applied for the job as head coach at little Whitworth College.

School officials said Thursday Moss is being given "serious consideration." The job at Whitworth, which has an enrollment of 800, was vacated two weeks ago when Bill Hildebrand resigned to become an assistant at Mississippi State.

Bradley Star On Probation

PEORIA, Ill. (AP)—Eugene "Squeaky" Melchiorre, former Bradley University basketball star, was placed on probation Thursday for a year for his part in fixing the score of a game.

He pleaded guilty to an indictment charging failure to report a bribe to shave points from Bradley's score in a game against Oregon State in Peoria in December of 1950. Bradley won the game, 77 to 74.

Melchiorre, an All-America player, and three other Bradley teammates admitted sharing in a \$4,000 payoff for holding down the margin of victory in the game.

Waner, a strictly left-handed rightfielder, broke into organized baseball at the age of 20 in 1923 with San Francisco. He graduated to the Pirates in 1926, remaining there through 1940.

He spent stints with Brooklyn and Boston in the National League and the New York Yankees in the American before hanging up his glove after the 1945 campaign. He had a lifetime batting average of .333.

Bill Terry, former first baseman and manager of the New York Giants, and Dizzy Dean, onetime pitching star of the St. Louis Cardinals, barely missed selection to the Hall of Fame in the latest voting.
