WASHINGTON (AP)—The State Department said Tuesday it will take a new look at the question whether to shut down American embassies and legations in Russian satellite countries.

Top American diplomats to Iron Curtain countries will meet in Paris early next month to discuss this along with other problems.

Council Eyes Parking Rule At Woodburn

WOODBURN—The city council, meeting here Tuesday night, took preliminary steps to bar parking along the entire south side of E. Lincoln and W. Harrison Streets.

This plan is included in one of three ordinances which the council authorized drawn up for presentation at the next meeting. The other two proposed ordinances would, if passed, transfer \$7,000 from the improvement to the general fund and would provide a city franchise for garbage disposal here.

The parking ordinance was proposed to eliminate parking congestion on Lincoln and Harrison Streets, John Schmid, operating the Woodburn garbage disposal service under a license, requested the franchise.

The council also authorized a resolution rescinding a previous statement of policy regarding water connection outside the city. This resolution would permit an emergency connection for a proposed cold storage plant to be constructed soon outside the city limits.

The council also authorized improvement of a portion of Bryan St., and decided not to cut trees in Legion Park. It also provided for spring mosquito control, and deferred for further financial study a proposal for a stop light at the intersection of Pacific Highway and Young Street.

Eden Accuses Laborites of Opposing U.S.

LONDON (AP)—Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden angrily accused Laborites critics Tuesday night of "anti-American prejudice." He insisted there is less fear of war now than when Winston Churchill became prime minister three months ago.

Growing anxiety in some British quarters that Korea might lead to a full-scale war in the Far East—with Britain in it—was brought out in the open in an uproarious debate on foreign policy in the House of Commons.

But the Labor Party leadership under former Prime Minister Clement Attlee shied away from challenging the Churchill government and pressing for a break in the bipartisan foreign policy that has prevailed in Britain for 10 years.

Sherrie Kader Services Held In Portland

PORTLAND (AP)—A nosegay in her hand and a teddy bear beside her, Sherrie Ellen Kader, 3, was buried Tuesday. Several hundred, mostly the curious, attended the quiet service.

Her mother, Mrs. Jada Z. Kader, charged with murder in Sherrie's death, did not go to the funeral although she had court permission Monday, though, she did go to the mortuary to see her daughter's body.

Sherrie's father, Arthur "George" Dollarhide, was present and with members of his family was the last to leave the chapel, sobbing.

As those who attended filed past the open casket, many wept. A man lifted to his shoulder a little girl about Sherrie's age so she could get a better view of the dead child.

Thirteen cars followed the hearse to Lincoln Memorial Cemetery.

Sherrie's body was found a week ago Saturday night in a drainage pit. Her mother was charged with throwing her there, and is held without bail for the grand jury.

The United States at present maintains embassies in Poland and Czechoslovakia and legations, headed by ministers, in Romania and Hungary.

Press officer Michael J. McDermott confirmed at a news conference that the problem of whether to continue diplomatic relations has been placed on the Paris conference agenda.

In answering questions, he made it plain the State Department under present conditions favors keeping these diplomatic outposts open to serve as "listening posts."

But he left open what the United States might do if Communist governments step up their campaign of restrictions and threats against American diplomats in Eastern Europe.

McDermott, in reply to further questions, said he believes the forthcoming review has no special urgency.

But responsible State Department officials, who disclosed the development before McDermott talked about it, told a reporter an American embassy has proposed the shutdown.

10 Salem High Students Win Art Awards

PORTLAND (AP)—Ten Salem High School students won awards in the seventh annual scholastic art awards contest in Oregon.

They are among 200 who will get gold key awards at a ceremony here Feb. 16. The winners were selected from 4501 entries in the state.

Dr. McCannel, 81, Silverton Physician, Dies

SILVERTON—Dr. Alexander J. McCannel, 81, prominent Silverton physician, died in a local hospital Tuesday after being hospitalized for the past 10 days.

Dr. McCannel was born Jan. 15, 1871, at Port Elgin, Ontario, Canada. He came to the United States in 1896 and studied in the East and Midwest prior to coming to Silverton in 1926. He took graduate work in London and Paris in the 1930's.

During World War I the doctor was a major in the Army Medical Corps. He was a charter member of the American Legion and a past commander of the Silverton post. He was also a charter member of the American College of Surgeons.

The deceased practiced in Silverton until 1936, when he joined the medical staff of the federal Civilian Conservation Corps. Later he served for the Klamath Indian Agency and engaged in private practice near there.

During World War II, Dr. McCannel served as a doctor with the War Manpower Commission in various posts in Oregon. After the war he returned to Silverton and retired about a year ago. He was a member of the Salem Scottish Rite, the Silverton Masonic Lodge, the Grange and Methodist Church.

Survivors include the widow, Mrs. Helen McCannel of Silverton; daughter, Mrs. Orville Toland of Silverton; sisters, Mrs. Ella McDougall of Ottawa, Canada, Mrs. Alice Pritchard of Vancouver, B.C.; brother, Mac McCannel of Vancouver, B.C. and three grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held Friday at 10:30 a.m. at the Ekman Memorial Chapel with the Rev. Douglas Harrell of Silverton and the Rev. George Swift of Salem officiating. Interment will be at Lincoln Memorial Park in Portland.

By-Pass Viaduct Contract Awarded

The State Highway Commission Tuesday awarded a contract for three Salem bypass road structures to Tom Lillebo, Reedsport, on a low bid of \$102,842.

The construction will include three reinforced concrete viaduct grade separation structures over Silverton Road, Sunnyside Avenue and Garden Road at the proposed new highway east of the city.

Bids for the project were opened in Portland Jan. 31. There were three higher bidders.

40-Hour Week Requested for Institutions

State institution employees should have a 40-hour work week, the State Board of Control was told Tuesday by Forrest Stewart, executive secretary of Oregon State Employees Association.

Approval of a shorter work week, he said, would tend to improve the type of employees and guarantee full staffs at all of the institutions.

"During the winter months there is no material shortage of institution employees," Stewart said, "but in the summer many of these workers accept other jobs where the compensation is more lucrative."

He emphasized that the help turnover at the institutions was increasing with a heavy cost to the state. Most institution employees, according to Stewart, would prefer a shorter work week to increased pay. At most institutions the employees work 48 hours a week.

Board members said they would study Stewart's request but warned there would be a substantial financial state deficit at the beginning of the 1953-55 biennium.

"I don't believe the taxpayers are in a mood for additional taxes," Gov. Douglas McKay said.

New Complex Bombsight to Cost \$250,000

WASHINGTON (AP)—Defense officials took some of the wraps off new and highly complex weapons Tuesday, including a \$250,000 bomb-sighting system which "thinks" faster than the human mind.

The closely-guarded exhibition was prepared for a Senate Appropriations subcommittee to help demonstrate:

Scientific strides in the field of military weapons, and why the Defense Department has asked for \$51,100,000 for the fiscal year starting July 1.

After listening to reports on how the cost of new weapons has skyrocketed, Sen. O'Mahoney, (D-Wyo), subcommittee chairman, commented:

"Science is rapidly making war impossible for those who wish to have an economy based on individual enterprise and freedom."

The new "K-One Bombing System," it was disclosed, costs 31 times as much as the Norden bomb-sight used in World War Two.

Air Secretary Finletter told the senators that he could not go into details at a public hearing about the technical improvements built into the electronic "K-One."

But he said it operates in bad weather and through overcast, and "makes all the calculations itself."

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Merchants to Offer Plan of Organization

A definite organization plan will be submitted to the new Downtown Salem Merchants Association Friday at a luncheon meeting in the Senator Hotel.

President John W. Adlon called the meeting Tuesday by mailing to 135 merchants copies of a proposed constitution and by-law plus a slate of 17 candidates for the board of directors. He urged an all-out attendance so that speedy action could be taken on final organization and incorporation of the new merchant group.

Feature of the proposed by-laws is that each firm would be entitled to a single membership, with single vote, in the association. Dues would be a uniform \$2 per year for each member firm. Under this plan any promotional work would be financed by an assessment to be decided by the association membership.

Suggested by-laws call for a board of 13 directors, including the four officers and nine others to be elected by the association. Newly-elected officers, who drafted the organization plan with the aid of Attorney Herbert Carter, are Adlon and Ralph Nohlgren, vice president; Lawrence R. Fisher, treasurer and James R. Beard, secretary.

Nominated for directors are Harold Busick, Reynold Allen, Leonard Goldblatt, Nate Steinhoff, Willis Jones, Alex Cohen, Lee Coleman, Ed Williams, Earl Heider, Harold E. Boss, Earle Headrick, Sidney Schlesinger, Alex Jones, George Burt, Herb Adler, Leonard Krenner and William Hammond. Other nominations will be asked Friday from the floor.

Negro Home Threatened in Eugene Area

EUGENE (AP)—Police were watching Tuesday night to see if anyone tried to burn down a house into which Negroes have moved.

Mrs. Effie Spencer, who rented the house to Mr. and Mrs. Leon Gasper and their two children Sunday, said she had received a threat the place would be burned if the Gaspers were not evicted before the night was out. The threat was made by an anonymous telephone caller.

"The Gaspers are good respectable people," said Mrs. Spencer, refusing to evict them from the all-white neighborhood on the outskirts of Eugene.

She said a number of neighbors had complained to her since the Gaspers rented the house. The Gaspers have an eight-month lease with an option to buy the house.

AFL Official Raps Special Session Plan

PORTLAND (AP)—James T. Marr, secretary of the State Federation of Labor, Tuesday took a slap at proposals for a special session of the Oregon Legislature to draft a new tax program.

Marr said such a session isn't necessary because the present state tax base would permit a property tax that would bring in 17 million dollars a biennium.

His comments followed by a day the proposal of Deputy State Treasurer Fred Paulus for a special session. His recommendation was made to the legislative interim tax committee. Paulus said he feared the state might have to go into deficit financing.

"Behind this clamor for a new tax," Marr said, "is the unsatisfactory longing of the sales tax advocates who have been wringing their hands biennially ever since 1933 and declaring that a fiscal crisis faces the state and can be averted only by the enactment of a sales tax. They dare not wait until 1953 when their predictions again will be exploded."

"For a number of years property taxes have not been collected. State income tax surpluses have offset the levy."

Voters have five times rejected a sales tax measure.

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Machinery at Sewage Plant Gets Test Run

Machinery at Salem's almost-completed sewage treatment plant got its first test run Tuesday.

The operation went smoothly and all equipment tested in good condition, reported City Manager J. L. Franzen.

Initial tests were witnessed by Franzen, City Engineer J. H. Davis and staff members, consultant John Cunningham of Portland and several representatives from firms which installed the various pumps, settling basin machinery and other equipment.

Similar test runs will break in the machinery before the plant goes into operation this spring after installation of huge steel covers on the two digester tanks.

When the sewage disposal operation begins, sludge will have to be brought in from some other plant to give a start to the necessary bacterial action. Artificial heat also will be needed at the start, but with operation the bacteria at work produce sufficient heat in the digester operation.
