

Majority of Demo Leaders Believe Truman Will Run

NEW YORK (AP)—A majority of the Democratic party leaders in the 48 states believe President Truman will run for re-election this year.

They expect him to be nominated without difficulty, steam-rollering the budding movement for Sen. Kefauver, of Tennessee, and in spite of the rampant bitterness that brims in the South. And, they say they expect him to win the election, finally.

Mourning for King to Last Until June 1

LONDON (AP)—Court mourning for King George VI is to last until next June 1 by his daughter's royal command. The period is shorter than had been generally expected.

An official announcement Saturday night said Queen Elizabeth II "commands that the court shall wear mourning until Saturday, 1st May, next, for his late most gracious majesty, King George VI of blessed memory."

"The court is to come out of mourning on Sunday, June 1, next."

Full mourning for the King's father, George V, lasted six months. That was followed by three months of half mourning. There has been no indication thus far of any period of half mourning to follow the comparatively short period—just over 16 weeks—in the present case.

Observers noted that, by custom, a coronation is not held in the mourning period, but is held in the months of good weather. Thus the end of the period May 31 would not rule out coronation for Elizabeth either this summer or in early autumn.

Reds Refuse to Limit Scope of Korea Parley

MUNSEY, Korea (AP)—Communist truce negotiators at Panmunjom Sunday rejected an Allied proposal that any post-armistice conference be limited to strictly Korean problems.

The Reds did agree, however, that the Republic of Korea could take part in the later negotiations. The Reds suggested that each side appoint five representatives to a political conference.

Counter-Plan
Vice Adm. C. Turner Joy, chief of the United Nations truce team, presented the Allied political conference counter-proposal Saturday during a 10-minute session. North Korean Gen. Nam Il agreed to study the proposal overnight.

The Allied plan differed from Wednesday's three-point Communist proposal in one major respect—a limitation of the political conference to problems directly concerning Korea.

The Reds proposed settlement of other Far Eastern problems "related to the Korean question," presumably meaning Formosa and Indo-China.

Agree with Reds
The Allies agreed generally with the Communist suggestion for a discussion of withdrawing foreign troops from Korea and a peaceful settlement of the Korean question.

The Allied proposal, for the first time in the truce talks, also included the question of unification of Korea "under an independent, democratic government"—one of the United Nations' war aims announced early in the conflict.

While the text of the Allied proposal was being released at Munseon, the Republic of Korea government in Pusan announced that it "views with great concern the continuing concessions the United Nations delegates currently are making at the Panmunjom cease-fire talks."

The South Korean official statement said, "the present position of the United Nations delegates at the conference appears to be one of a defeated command."

Villagers Visit King's Coffin at Sandringham

SANDRINGHAM, Eng. (AP)—A Kingdom's love for its dead King was symbolized Saturday in a humble procession of villagers past the closed coffin of George VI at Sandringham's royal chapel.

Next week will come the majestic lying-in-state at London's ancient Westminster Hall and funeral Friday at Windsor Castle with the jeweled imperial state crown atop the coffin, when the great of Britain and other nations will pay tribute.

Saturday it was the simple rural folk of Norfolk who offered their last respects to the sovereign they knew best as a friendly squire and neighbor. Some came on bicycles, some in rubber boots.

Silent Reverence
In single file they moved slowly through the shadowy nave of the Parish Church of St. Mary Magdalene—thurs and their King's to bow their heads in silent reverence before the flower-crowned bier in the chancel.

Among them was Walter Senter, a carpenter for 20 years on the 15,578-acre royal estate of Sandringham, who made the coffin from a Sandringham oak.

In the estate's red brick mansion 200 yards away, Queen Elizabeth II grieved in seclusion with her widowed mother, sister and children. She mourned as any English daughter mourns her father, quietly and alone with her family.

Since her arrival at Sandringham Friday as the proclaimed monarch of this and other realms, Elizabeth has been trying to explain to three-year-old Prince Charles why he cannot see his beloved Grandpa again.

Prince Fuzzled
The puzzled Prince, who stands next in line to the throne, knows only that his Grandfather has gone away.

The biting wind swept from the North Sea across the little church and the mansion. The little line of villagers at the church door shivered.

The King's gamekeepers, clad in green buckskin jackets and dark knee breeches, guarded the royal casket, four at a time on two-hour watches. Some had stood the same watch over the body of King George V, the late King's father. None showed emotion.

Simple Inscription
A silver plate on the coffin said: "Albert Frederick Arthur George Windsor, Born 1896 Died 1952." His birth and his death occurred on the estate.

By the day's end, 1,400 persons had passed the coffin, bowed their heads in reverence and moved out again into the cold.

A score of American airmen stationed in the area were among them.

Tenant farmers came in their cars, tradesmen, policemen, farm laborers came on bicycles or slogged across the muddy meadows. No Men of Position.

But there were no diplomats, potentates of church or state, or men of position.

The flag of St. George, a red cross on a white field, whipped out in the wind above the church.

The King's own standard, which linked him by heraldic symbols with his ancestors, was draped over the coffin with its four corners just touching the floor.

The sorrowing young Queen and her family are expected to attend a service Sunday at another church in the Sandringham area.

Allies Urged to Speed Defense To Assure Congress Support

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States has warned Allied leaders in Europe they should agree quickly on plans for a European defense force, including German troops, if adequate new foreign aid funds are to be expected from Congress.

Officials said the need for urgent action had been stressed especially to French Foreign Minister Robert Schuman and West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer.

They are leading figures in a bitter struggle which threatens to delay seriously if not wreck the whole defense program.

Acheson to Leave
Secretary of State Acheson is due to sound the warning when he goes to Europe next week for Big Three talks in London and the meeting of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization Council at Lisbon, Portugal. He is due to leave here Tuesday night.

Acheson and other administration authorities are worried over the critical attitude they expect to encounter when they go to the U. S. capital next month to ask new billions to help the European allies rearm.

Must Show Achievement
They are reported to be convinced that unless they can show real achievements in greater Western European unity and in solving the problem of getting German troops added to Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's NATO command they will face strong demands for cutting appropriation.

Evidence supporting their belief came Friday from Chairman Richards (D-S.C.) of the House Foreign Affairs Committee after Acheson had testified in a closed session.

Richards said the kind of foreign aid program enacted this year would depend upon the degree of unity accomplished in Western Europe.

Acheson was able to give the committee only the limited assurance that he hoped everything possible would be done. Actually the basic decisions will be made not at the NATO Council in Lisbon but by the French and West German governments either before or after that session.

Teen-Age Drug Addiction Cut By Arrests

WASHINGTON (AP)—Narcotics Commissioner Harry J. Anslinger said Saturday teen-age drug addiction has been cut more than half by a recent series of blows against the narcotics underworld.

Anslinger gave that estimate as he made public an annual report which said some of the nation's "worst mobsters" were trapped by undercover agents in 1951.

The report said seizure of illicit drugs during the year increased 30 per cent over 1950, and 4,172 narcotics law violators were arrested.

Narcotics agents bagged an additional 520 suspected dope peddlers in a nation-wide series of raids starting Jan. 4, the biggest mass mop-up ever staged.

Anslinger said that teen-age drug addiction, which had increased alarmingly in recent years, has been cut in some areas to less than one-third of the rate of one year ago.

Auto Industry Gets Increase In Aluminum

WASHINGTON (AP)—The government Saturday gave the automobile industry an extra million pounds of aluminum in another move to boost production and ease spreading unemployment in auto manufacturing areas.

Manly Fleischmann, defense production administrator, said he hoped the increase for the April-June period would enable the industry to reach the quota of 930,000 automobiles and trucks authorized for the second quarter of this year.

However, copper for only 800,000 units and steel for 900,000 have been allocated—and no more is in sight, Fleischmann said. He said he hoped the industry could figure out some way to use substitutes so as to reach its quota anyway.

The extra aluminum was released from reserves held back to cover emergencies. Previously the industry had been allocated 59,400,000 pounds for the second quarter.

Truman's Slap At Spain Brings Sharp Reply

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Truman's offhand dig at the Franco regime turned into an international incident Saturday as it was disclosed that the Spanish ambassador has lodged a memo of displeasure with the State Department.

Whether the tiff would imperil plans to set up American air and naval bases on Spanish soil to help defend Western Europe was not yet clear.

Mr. Truman remarked at his news conference Thursday that he had never been very fond of the Franco government. The State Department disclosed Saturday that it had received a note Friday night from Spanish Ambassador Jose Felix de Lequerica.

The contents of the note were kept secret.

The incident occurs at a time when the United States is preparing to send a new mission to Spain to negotiate on the bases question.
