Army Airtight Uniform Keeps Out Gas, Germs

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Army has introduced a new airtight uniform for protection against poison gas and germ warfare. Its cooling feature is an adaptation on the basic item of infant wear, the diaper.

The protective suit, made of non-inflammable butyl rubber, is designed to be worn over the regular clothing. It is supplemented with a detachable hood, to be worn with a gas mask, and with rubberized boot covers and gloves. By itself, this garment, so airtight that little body heat can escape, would prove quite uncomfortable. According, a "cooling suit" of diaper cloth is worn outside.

This suit consists of pajama-like trousers, a barber-style jacket and a hood. In use, this outer suit is drenched in water and, the Army said in a statement, "the evaporation of the water produces a marked cooling effect."

Polk Farmers' Co-op Fetes 20th Birthday

RICKREALL — Polk County Farmers' Co-Op celebrated its 20th anniversary Tuesday with the biggest attendance ever had at an annual meeting.

The gathering was held at the Rickreall Grange Hall with the Home Economics Club of the grange, headed by Mrs. Ora Lantz, serving the noon dinner to 344 people.

The report, given by the co-operative's manager, Walter Steele showed that it started in 1932 and that its first year's business was \$23,263. This was compared to the 1951 volume of \$677,187. Throughout the 20 years the co-operative made a steady increase

with only an occasional year showing a temporary drop. Gain in volume of business in 1951 over the previous year was \$43,885, according to Mr. Steele's report. Current assets were listed at \$192,519 as compared to total liabilities at \$29,571. The net margin from the 1951 operations was reported at \$40,321. Total redemption up to and including 1946 was \$155,907.

Hardware and machinery formed the largest item of sale amounting to \$358,694, with petroleum products sales adding up to \$296,651. Unallocated margin at the end of the year was \$53,325. Membership was listed Tuesday at 1,176, the largest in the history of the organization.

Two visiting managers from other cooperatives were Peter Gores, manager of the Marion County Oil Cooperative with headquarters at Mt. Angel, and Emerson Eilers, manager of the McMinnville Cooperative.

The same officers were re-elected during the afternoon session. These are Claude Larkin, president; Emil Marx, vice president, and Vernon Osborn, Henry B.

Greek, Turkish Forces to Serve With Adm. Carney

LISBON, Portugal, (AP)—Military leaders of the 12 Atlantic Allies agreed in principle Monday to place Greek and Turkish land and air forces under U. S. Adm. Robert B. Carney's Southern Europe Command, it was learned on high authority.

The question of a higher command for Greek and Turkish naval forces was postponed until the question of a Middle East Command structure is resolved.

The decision ended a prolonged dispute between the United States and Britain over how the two tough Mediterranean nations would fit into the Allied military picture after their NATO membership becomes final.

Harold Lloyd Seeks Damages

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Film comic Harold Lloyd filed suit for \$300,000 damages Monday because his old film, "Safety Last," was shown on television. He asked federal court for \$250,000 damages from the National Broadcasting Co., and \$50,000 from Los Angeles television station KTTV. He claimed unauthorized telecast of the picture he made in 1929 constituted copyright infringement.

Early references to television described it as a "visible telephone."

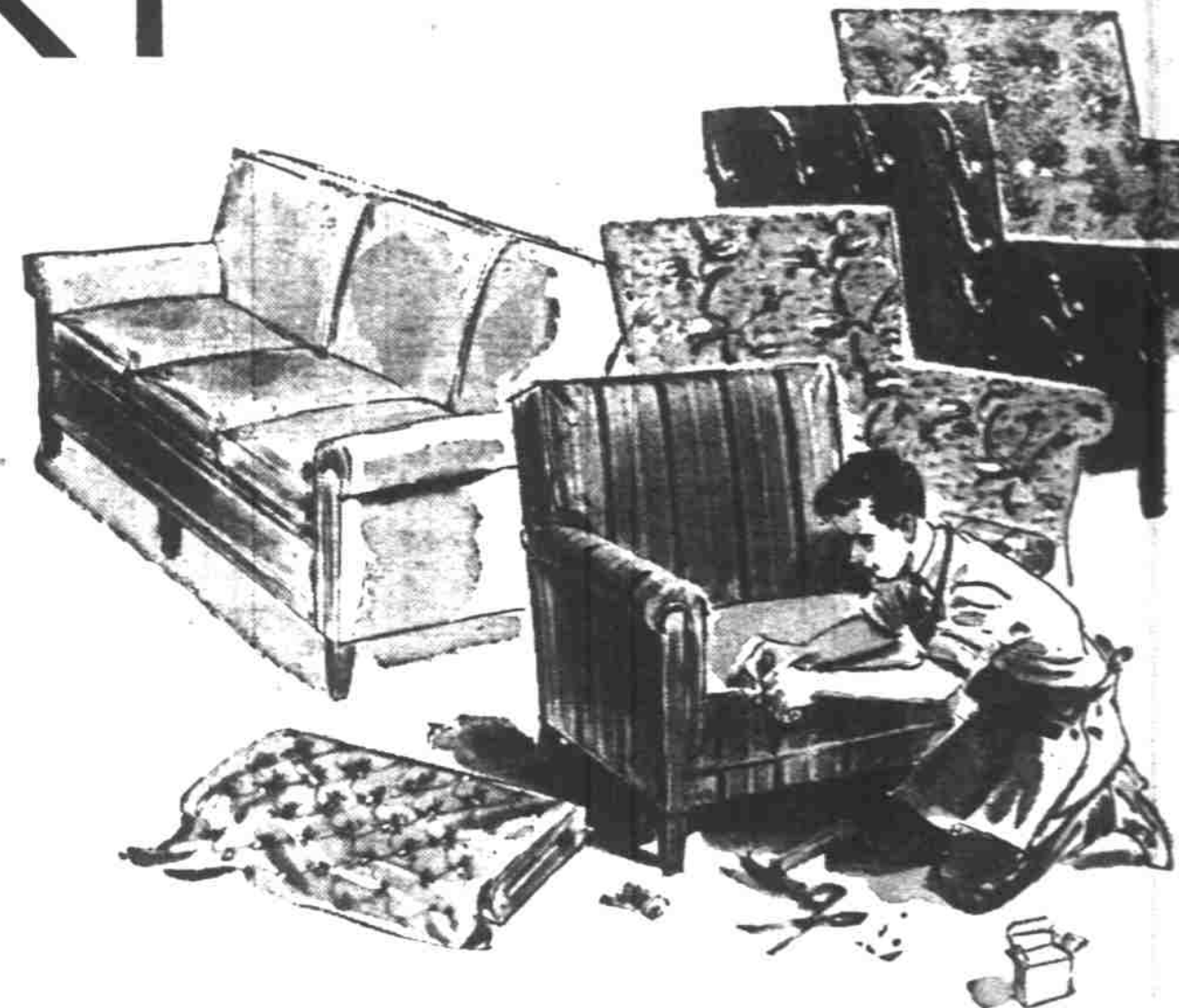
