

Bill for O&C Access Roads Meets Trouble

WASHINGTON (AP)—A \$700,000 program for access roads in the O & C timber lands of Oregon has run into opposition to a House Appropriations Subcommittee.

This was indicated Tuesday in testimony made public by the subcommittee.

Opposition is based on criticism of the present law whereby counties in which the timber land is located receive 75 per cent of the timber sale receipts. The remainder goes to the government.

The House committee rejected a similar request for access road money last year, but an appropriation was granted by the Senate and remained in the compromise bill worked out by Senate and House conferees.

When congressmen renewed their objections this year, Marion Clawson, Bureau of Land Management director, pointed out that bills now are pending in both the House and Senate to split the O & C revenues evenly between the counties and government.

He said the Bureau would recommend amending these bills to provide for repayment of all government operation and maintenance costs before the 50-50 split is made.

Clawson said the government has not actually lost money under the present division as the 25 per cent government cut has totaled more than yearly appropriations.

'Red Tape' Cut In Steel Quotas

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Maybank (D-SC) said Tuesday the Defense Production Administration has advised him of a new policy to "cut the red tape" involved in getting scarce materials for small highway projects.

He said the order allows "self-certification" of projects using up to 25 tons of carbon steel, including two tons of scarce structural steel, and 200 pounds of copper.

That, he said, means that contractors for small projects which don't exceed those limits can order the materials directly from suppliers without the time loss and paper work involved in getting a certificate of necessity from the Bureau of Public Roads.

Indian Land Case Settled Out of Court

HOOD RIVER (AP)—A Lyle, Wash., Indian's suit against a timber buyer has been settled out of court, Circuit Judge Malcolm W. Wilkinson reported Monday.

The buyer, Fred M. Marsh, Lebanon, returned the deed for 76 acres of timber to James Slim Jim, a Yakima agency Indian. Marsh had acquired the deed for \$1,000. Jim's suit accused Marsh of "fraud and misrepresentation."

The Hood River County assessor's records listed the value at \$6,000.

Judge Transfers Five Eugene Boys To Lane County

Five Eugene boys charged with burglary of a service station have been transferred by Marion County juvenile court to Lane County juvenile court.

The youths, arrested here last week, were returned to Eugene because of the need for close supervision, according to Circuit Judge Joseph B. Felton.

Circuit Court has sent a companion, Larry F. Brady, 18, to the State Hospital for observation in relation to the charge.

Portland Hearings On Fluoridation Asked

PORTLAND (AP)—Hearings should be held on the proposal to add fluorine to Portland's drinking water, City Commissioner Fred Peterson said Tuesday. Perhaps the matter should go to a vote of the people, he added.

Dr. Thomas L. Mendor, city health officer, has recommended fluorine for the water.
