Oregon Liquor Receipts Jump

Liquor sale receipts in Oregon during the last half of 1951 jumped more than 9 per cent above sales for the last half of 1950, the Oregon Liquor Commission reported Tuesday.

Receipts of sales for the six months' period from July 1 to Dec. 31, 1951, totaled \$22,775,612. The total net revenue for this period, after deducting cost of goods and operating expenses came to \$6,942,469, compared with a net revenue of \$5,714,281 for the last six months of 1950.

Total earnings of the commission from its beginning to the end of December are \$117,470,213. The commission reported it has a working capital fund of \$8,530,456 and a surplus of \$417,609 invested in fixed assets, together with a cash surplus of \$4,047.

Kiwanis Club Hears Man Who Opened YM's in Russia in 1918

"What I started to learn about communism I got the hard way setting up YMCA's in Russia in 1918," Dr. Ethan Colton told the Salem Kiwanians at their luncheon Tuesday in the Senator Hotel.

Dr. Colton addressed the group on "How Life Goes in Communist Russia" from the knowledge he gained after 30 years in and out of Europe and Asia.

The Russian leaders are difficult to reason with for they believe theirs is "the best program for the masses," Colton explained, and they contend that "we shall either win all the world or lose all"; there will be no compromise." Dr. Colton said the Russians have to live with the national minimum space for four people being 18 by 20 feet. He explained that this failing grew out of the industrial greed of the Russians who imported 25 million persons into their cities from the country without first analyzing how they were to be housed.

"Christian presses are operating out of Paris, to deliver the truth to the people of Russia," Colton said. In memory of those devoted to the cause of truth, Dr. Colton hoped that "we may be worthy of fellowship with those who have kept the Faith in Europe."

Dr. Colton addressed Willamette University students at their chapel Tuesday morning on conditions in Europe. He also met with the YMCA World Service committee of which Ron Hudkins is chairman.
