

Dallas Judge C. Gregory Dies in Sleep

DALLAS—Charles Gregory, 79, widely-known attorney and Dallas city official, died early this morning.

Gregory, justice of the peace here for 25 years, was found dead in his bed at his lodgings at 610 Levens St. He apparently had died in his sleep. He had returned home Thursday from Dallas Hospital where he had been taken early this week.

The deceased was born May 21, 1872, in Minnesota. He came as an infant to Oregon with his parents, Charles and Jane Bird Gregory, who settled near St. Paul.

Gregory moved to McMinnville and was married there in 1900 to the former Sophia Thorpe, who died at Dallas Dec. 11, 1945. They came to Dallas from McMinnville shortly after the turn of the century.

Mrs. Gregory for a while operated a small hospital here. Gregory sold insurance and later entered the profession of law.

He retired from his justice of the peace office June 1, 1951. He had served for several years as Dallas police judge and city auditor and served a short term on the city water commission.

He had served as director and attorney for the Polk County Federal Savings and Loan Association since 1934.

Survivors are a brother, Frank Gregory of Rose Lodge and a sister, Mrs. Lois Buell of Willamina and several nieces and nephews.

Funeral services will be held Tuesday, Feb. 19, at 2 p.m. at the Bollman Funeral Chapel with the Rev. Earl Benbow officiating. Ritualistic services will be held by the Friendship Lodge 6, IOOF of Dallas, of which the deceased was a member. Entombment will be at Mt. Crest Abbey Mausoleum in Salem.

Dry Friends Help Secure Beer License

Backed by her prohibitionist friends, Mrs. Mamie Duby of Baker got her bottled beer license Friday—granted by the State Liquor Commission.

Mrs. Duby, a 60-year-old widow, is struggling along by renting a few rooms and operating a small grocery in Baker. She rents the upper floor of her home to railway mail clerks. Downstairs she operates the store, which nets less than \$100 a month.

The Liquor Commission was inclined to deny her a license Friday because her store is so little. But when L. B. Russell, the commission's license supervisor, told Mrs. Duby's friends had gone to bat for her, the commission granted the license.

She had a petition signed by 91 persons, and more than 20 of them are among Baker's outstanding dries. The city of Baker approved and there wasn't a single protest.

Death Claims W. Lindsay, City Fireman

Warren Lindsay, a member of the Salem fire department since shortly after the first World War I, died Friday night in a local hospital after an illness of three months. He was 55.

His family said Lindsay died of complications resulting from a previous illness, for which he underwent surgery last November.

Lindsay came to Salem in 1902 from Sydney, Ohio, where he was born Jan. 22, 1897. His widow, Mrs. Hazel Lindsay of 995 Garnet St., to whom he was married 25 years ago, survives him.

During most of his time with the fire department, Lindsay worked out of the East Salem station.

He is also survived by his mother, Mrs. Carrie Lindsay of Salem; a sister, Mrs. Paul Nieswander of Salem; two brothers, Ralph of Tacoma, Wash., and Velda of Hermiston.

Funeral arrangements are under the direction of the Virgil T. Golden Co.

Camp Clatsop Training Site Given Approval

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Army has approved the training of more than a thousand Oregon National Guardsmen at Camp Clatsop, Ore., June 14-28, Rep. Walter Norblad (R-Ore.) said today.

The units, which are not members of the 41st division include the 237th Anti-Aircraft Group, the 722nd and 732nd Anti-Aircraft Battalions, a part of the headquarters and headquarters detachment, 367th Ordnance Maintenance Company and the 234th Army Band.

(Affected by the order is Salem's anti-aircraft unit, Battery D, which is attached to the 722nd Anti-Aircraft Battalion.)

Use of Camp Clatsop as an economy measure was proposed by Maj. Gen. Thomas E. Riley, Oregon adjutant general, and Norblad.

The 41st Division will train at Fort Lewis.

Mendez Thrills Salem Audience With Trumpet

A near-capacity audience filled the Salem High School auditorium last evening to hear Mexican trumpeter Rafael Mendez in concert, assisted by the Willamette University band under the direction of Maurice Brennen.

Mendez' playing was distinguished by perfect clarity in the most difficult passages and by a full, rich tone.

The band began the program with the "Sakuntala Overture" by Goldmark, proceeding to "Procession of the Nobles" by Rimsky-Korsakov. Mr. Mendez made his first appearance in his own arrangement of "Mazurka," a number which is traditionally played at bullfights. "Zigeunervalse" by Sarasate arranged by Mendez followed. There was a little "swing and sway" by Sarasate in the middle of this number, originally written for violin, which delighted the audience.

A three-section work entitled "Procession of the Nobles" including "Vienna 1913," "Sea Shanties" and "Bandstand at Hyde Park," contained some of the finest playing of the band and allowed some of its soloists to be heard.

Following the intermission "Carnival Day in New Orleans" by Morrissey and "Mood Mauve" played by the band met with enthusiastic applause. Mr. Mendez returned to play three more of his arrangements, "Mendez Samba," which was repeated as an encore at the audience's request. "Czar," heard in its first world premier performance, and "Chaparracas." Encores were his own arrangements of "Carnival of Venice Variations" which he played with one nimble finger and of course, his "Mendez Lips and Lungs."

In this encore Mendez was assisted by Ann Gibbens at the piano. The band closed the program with an interesting number by Bennett entitled "From Africa to Harlem" which depicted the evolution of jazz from the jungles of Africa to the streets of Harlem. The audience refused to go home until two encores by the band had been played, "Tenderly," and "Army of the Nile March."

A capacity crowd turned out for the annual affair held in Crystal Gardens. Present were many civic and state officials including Mayor Al Loucks, who spoke at intermission.

Proceeds from the dance will go into the department's charity funds.

Businessmen Get Lesson in Government

A tangle of questions from Sunday tavern operation to double parking was handed to Salem city officials Friday by members of Salem Christian Business Men's Committee.

Mayor Alfred W. Loucks, conducting the forum, said it was the 70th group meeting at which city officials have "taken government to the citizens" in the past year, and they have involved some 4,400 persons.

Members who asked why a tavern could operate within 300 feet of a school and why taverns can stay open on Sunday were told that the state law does not prohibit these things. Loucks, however, urged the group to express its interest in the question with a study and recommendations to guide the City Council and the State Liquor Control Commission.

He noted that as long as liquor sales are legal, the city's stand would be for "good, legal places." As to the double-parking problem, Police Chief Clyde Warren said that the city's Traffic Safety Council plans a safety campaign in regard to this as a prelude to increasing arrests. He expressed hope also for a tougher penalty for violations.

The mayor denied that Southern Pacific Railroad exerts any undue influence on the Council. Noting that absence of the railroad might have kept Salem from progress as well as from having many wrecks, he said he hoped to continue to work with SP in cooperation as well as prodding.

Light Firm's Bond Issue Authorized

An order was signed by Public Utilities Commissioner Charles H. Heitzel here Friday permitting the Pacific Power and Light Company to issue and sell \$12,500,000 of first mortgage bonds. The bonds would mature in 30 years.

Money derived from sale of the bonds would be used for improvements including construction of the Yale hydro electric project on the Lewis River.

The bonds would be sold to 17 insurance companies and institutional investors.

O & C Land Issue Up for Action Tuesday

WASHINGTON — The Senate Interior Committee is scheduled next Tuesday to consider legislation that would settle the controverted Oregon and California land grant issue.

Chairman O'Mahoney (D-Wyo.) revealed that the committee in a closed session placed the O & C bill of Sen. Guy Cordon at the top of the agenda for the next meeting.

Cordon's bill would resolve the jurisdictional dispute between the Bureau of Land Management and the Forest Service over administration of some 463,000 acres of O & C timber land scattered through nine of Western Oregon's 18 O & C counties.

Enactment of the bill would give BLM undisputed jurisdiction and provide that the O & C counties would share 75 per cent of timber revenues from the lands as provided by the O & C Act of 1937. Receipts from timber sales on these lands since 1943 have been frozen pending settlement of the dispute, resulting in a fund now greater than \$5 million. Marion County's share is estimated at some \$65,000.

Cordon's bill was once approved by the Senate but died in the House.

"The committee," Cordon explained this week, "will decide whether to hold hearings again on the bill, or just review the past hearings, or approve the bill without further deliberation, or reject it."

Cordon several weeks ago expressed hope that the committee would approve his bill without going through protracted hearings once again and send it to the Senate for general debate and a vote. He feels there is slim chance of passage if hearings are held due to the time factor which hangs over Congress in its plan to adjourn prior to the presidential conventions in July.

Banish Fears, Knife, Fork Audience Told

America's greatest strength in the chaotic world of today is the priceless heritage handed down from "matchless" ancestors, members of the Salem Knife and Fork Club were told Friday night.

Describing that strength as the weapon which can cut down the "legion of steel that is Communism," was Robert Gros, San Francisco businessman making his second appearance before the club.

Gros said Americans must cleanse themselves of the defeatist belief that Communism is invincible and face the fact that Soviet Russia—which he called "a criminal conspiracy of Oriental minds seeking world domination"—understands only power, strength and force.

"Have we not yet learned that appeasement doesn't mean peace," Gros asked his listeners. And he cited the year and a half of Korea as an example of where appeasement is raising its head again.

Gros' topic was "Right Makes Might," in which he summarized for his audience things told to him by national and international figures during several extensive trips throughout the United States and the Far East.
