

Rigid Athletic Controls May Be Handed Colleges

WASHINGTON (AP)-The executive committee of the influential American Council on Education meets Saturday to consider a proposal to clamp rigid controls on intercollegiate athletics. The plan, drafted by a special committee of 11 college presidents,

calls for, among a large number of other things, (A) the abolition of Games Open football bowl games, (B) the ellmination of athletic scholarships and (C) an end to all spring football practice.

Colleges violating the proposed plan would endanger their academic standing. Not unexpectedly, the proposal

has stirred up considerable con-Those who object to it-or to portions of it-will be heard Saturday morning behind closed doors.
