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Polk County Junior Red Cross Active

DALLAS—The Polk County Junior Red Cross has had a busy year, according to the report of Mrs. Edward B. Hamilton, chapter chairman for this project. Twenty-four elementary and three high schools in the county are now enrolled in the work. The largest contribution from elementary schools was \$15.25 from the Perrydale school with 100 pupils. Dallas High School turned in \$11.37 as the largest sum from high schools. The enrollment is 412 students. Some 42 gift boxes have been filled to send to some undetermined place. Last year's boxes were sent to Korea. Other activities include the making of 150 Thanksgiving menu covers for the Roseburg Veterans Hospital and sending 22 dozen cookies, by the Camp Fire Girls, under the leadership of Mrs. Eldon Beutler; pupils at the Henry Hill elementary school at Independence under the leadership of Margaret Perry, sent 100 nut cups and menu covers to the hospital for Christmas and will send more for Easter; The Dallas Junior High will send 150 menu covers for St. Patrick's Day. Marjorie Nelson of Dallas High School attended the camp for junior at Silver Creek Falls last summer and was elected to represent the chapter on the district board. She has been active in JRC enrollment and with Mrs. Hamilton addressed a group at the Henry Hill School at Independence last week.

Willamina—Wendall Wooden is in Portland this week undergoing therapy treatments; Ralph Gardner and Ola Beck have been on the sick list.

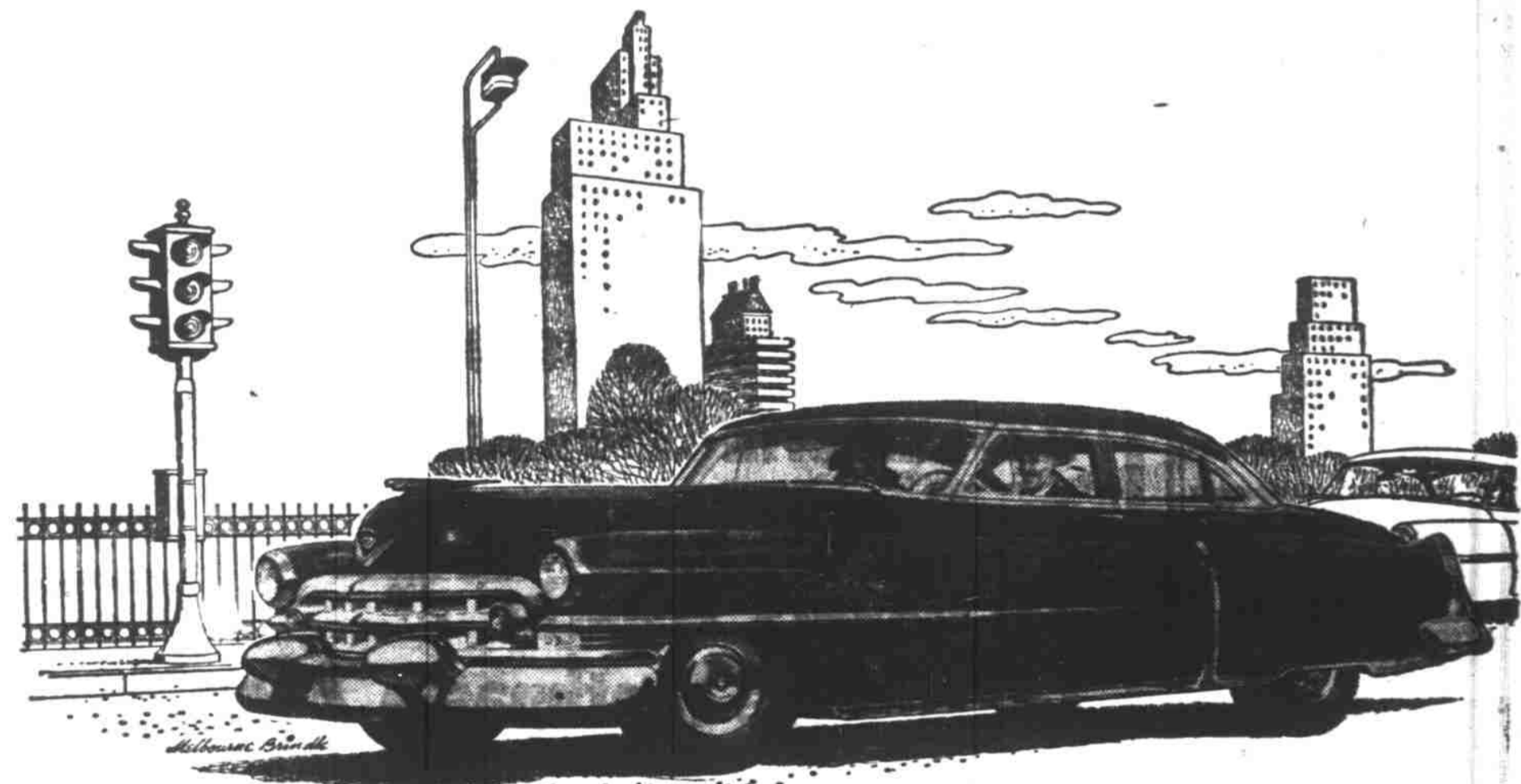
